

September 28, 1972

Chairman Robert Caughey opened the meeting giving a brief outline of what the duties of the Special Committees would be. Selectman Robert Dunlap said he had one matter to bring up before the Board regarding ambulance service. He said we would be without it unless some arrangements were made soon. After discussion he agreed to talk with Hillsboro and see if some permanent service could be obtained from them. Chairman Caughey said he would find someone to head a Committee to study this and report back on it.

Discussion on the various committees were as follows:

Taxation and Revaluation:

Members present: Robert Flanders, William Abbott, Andrew Lane, Richard White and William O'Neil.

Discussions followed on the revaluation of town property and a tax map. The Committee is to study both issues, find out what the estimated cost would be and make their recommendations at a later date.

Zoning:

Members present: Robert Caughey, Harold Webber, David Hurlin, Henry Colton, Dorothy Ellison, and Linda Tenney.

Committee to study the matter, and prepare a zoning plan if they agree to do so. Mobile homes are to be looked into for possible regulations. A Mr. John Lunderville came to the meeting to find out what was required to establish a trailer park on Route #202 on the so-called Cork Plain area where there are several trailers right now. He had talked to the Selectmen and obtained a copy of our Regulations. Tests for septic systems have been made by Charles Gilmore. He was told to present a sketch of his plan at our next meeting in October.

Roads and Highways:

Members present: Stanley Tenney, Smith Harriman, Charles Huntington, Bruce Cuddihy and Robert Bryer.

They are to make a study of all roads in town, and determine if some improvements are necessary to those infrequently used, and possibly to close some if they are no longer of use.

Members present: Harold Grant, and Richard Rablin


Chairman Caughey recently attended a meeting in Manchester on proposed Regional Planning. There are now six regions in the State, and we are in No. 4. Each Region will have an office and a staff. They are in the process now of having meetings to explain the functions they will handle. This involves a means of obtaining Federal grants for housing, sewers, dumps, water pollution and other possible projects. There will be bills presented in the next Session of the Legislature on this program. The Committee will attend future meetings to keep informed, and see what expense the Town will face to be a member of the Region.

Stanley Dutton was present to listen in to see what information might help him on the Conservation Committee.
