

Selectmen's Meeting, Monday May 17, 1982

Present, Katherine Ring, Chairman, Leslie MacNeil and John Jones. Dave Grossman of the Messinger and Betty Shaw, secretary were also present.

The selectmen met at 7:30 and signed checks, yield tax assessments and building permits.

Greg Goff arrived and the bids for the insulation of the Old Fire House were opened. Three bids were received and the contract was given to the lowest bidder, as all three selectmen voted for Northeast Insulators.

Ch. Joe Grabowski was in and asked what had been decided in regard to his complaint about the library. He was told as of Friday, May 21 an answer will be available for him. Selectmen were meeting with the library trustees at their regular meeting to see what the problem is and just what, if anything the selectmen could do to correct the problem.

The selectmen asked the secretary to contact the Anderson Nichols firm and ask George Carlson what is to be done to see that the \$32,000 not yet collected from Farmers' Home be kept for the use of the sewer corrections and not be wiped off the books.

Lloyd Henderson was in to discuss the Homicz case with the selectmen. The courts granted Mr. Homicz \$5,000 in damages and Lloyd wanted to check if the selectmen wanted him to appeal. He will try to get a lower settlement out of court, but barring this, what should he do. K. Ring voted to just go along with the court decision and not spend more money fighting the decision. J. Jones and Les MacNeil agreed.
