Meeting called to order at 7:00. Executive Session was voted to
discuss a pending court case with Town Council, Bart Mayer.

Meeting called to order. No information from the executive

A trailer was been placed on the Gregg Lake property owned by
Tom Hickey on Sunday, July 16th. This trailer is to be removed
within 21 days as per zoning ordinance.

The Gregg Lake Association received a letter from WPOC regarding
water quality and testing of lakes. Communities are forming
volunteer committees to test the water during the summer months.
The test cost would be \$60 a month. A copy of the letter and
information will be sent to Parks and Recreation Dept. to see if
they want to add the cost to next year's budget. There is no
extra money in the park budget for testing this year. Selectmen
will check with the Gregg Lake Association to see if they will
fund the tests for the remainder of this year.
Scott Bowden submitted an updated report on the water tests from
Gregg Lake. It was found to be in a safe condition.

All three Selectmen have voted to have their pay in two
payments. One in September and the final payment in March in
order to be covered for time worked and not in advance as has
been the practice for many years.
