# Community Development Block Grant Action Plan Amendment Presentation for 2016-2017 presentation by Jennifer Haines, Director of Planning and Economic Development; Tiffany Beebee, Senior Planner; and Renee Jensen, Senior Planner

The Office of Planning and Economic Development prepared the 2016-2017 Annual Action Plan for the Community Development Block Grant Program (CDBG). This document provided the framework for funding priority projects for the 2016-2017 program year and was adopted by City Council on February 18, 2016. On March 9, 2017, the City of Auburn received a letter from the US Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) outlining a change in procedure in the timeliness standard. Communities that receive entitlement funds from the CDBG program are required to use their funds in a timely manner, called timeliness. The entitlement program rule for timeliness is that grantee cannot have more than 1.5 times their annual allocation sitting in their line of credit at the U.S. Treasury. According to the new timeliness standard, timeliness must be evaluated based on both line of credit and program income balances (including those in revolving loan funds). As we have discussed previously with the Council, staff has significant concerns with this new policy, as it will result in significantly decreased funding availability to respond to large economic development or housing projects. This concern has been expressed to HUD, and we have been told that the policy will stand. Therefore, we are bringing forward this amendment for your consideration.

To achieve timeliness, the Office of Planning and Economic Development reviewed all CDBG accounts and reprogrammed funds from past accounts into projects that are supported by the Five Year Consolidated Plan and highlighted as high priority needs in the community. Therefore, the approved 2016-2017 Annual Action Plan will have a change in projects and funding. A change

in funding for any project that constitutes twentypercent (20%) or more in an Annual Action Plan requires a substantial amendment. The proposed 2016-2017 Annual Action Plan Amendment document provides information on priority projects that will be funded from reprogrammed funds.

As stated in the City's CDBG Citizen Participation Plan a substantial amendment must have a 30 day public comment period which was initiated on April 20, 2017 with a Public Hearing on May 11, 2017 at 6:00pm in the City of Auburn Council Chambers. The public comment period will conclude on May 19, 2017. Citizens may provide comments to the Office of Planning and Economic Development.

Once all comments have been received the Office of Planning and Economic Development will revise the 2016-2017 Annual Action Plan to reflect the proposed amendment changes and will submit it to City Council for review.

The Office of Planning and Economic Development is working with HUD on a Workout Plan to expend the necessary \$3,734,950.35 in CDBG Entitlement and Revolving Loan funds to meet the timeliness standard by February 1, 2018. Currently, the Office of Planning and Economic Development has \$3,925,372.33 in proposed project expenditures, \$2,675,124.82 of which is contained in the proposed 2016-2017 Annual Action Plan Amendment. Other project expenditures include programs and projects within the approved

2016-2017 Annual Action Plan as well as the approved 2017-2018 Annual Action Plan, which will be dependent on the 2018 Federal Budget.

**Auburn Industrial Development Authority (AIDA) and Cayuga Economic Development Agency (CEDA) updates.** Tracy Verrier, Executive Director of the Cayuga Economic Development Agency provided an overview and update of the work being done by AIDA and CEDA.

Downtown Revitilization Initiative 2017 - Christina Selvek, Director of Capital Projects
The NYS FY 2017-18 Budget includes the funding of up to \$100 million for Round II of the
Downtown Revitalization Initiative Program. This new program began in 2016 and awarded 10
grants of \$10 million to 9 Cities and 1 Village throughout New York State for transformational
projects within urban centers. The City of Auburn did submit such an application and although
scored well in the program, was not selected for funding.

In order to prepare for Round II, the City Manager thought it best to get out in front of the program and begin an open public dialog with City Council. The FY 2017 Downtown Revitalization Initiative grant guidelines have not yet been released. There is mention of the 2017 DRI program in the REDC Guidebook that outlines the following:

"In 2017, the DRI will again support a community planning process where each community develops the key ingredients needed for successful downtown revitalization; A clear vision for the downtown; Goals and strategies to accomplish the vision; An action plan with a timeline for projects, initiatives, and actions; and a strategic investment plan with catalytic projects to implement the plan.

This is intended to begin a dialog with City Council and Auburn community on what is the 2017 vision for downtown, goals, and objectives for Round II DRI.
