1. Pledge of Allegiance, Roll Call, Public Comment

Chairman Bob Mezzo called the meeting to order at 12:10 p.m. Those present recited the Pledge of Allegiance and the roll was called. There was no public comment.

2. Administrative Items

a. Minutes of November 18, 2011 Meeting — On a motion by Bob Chatfield, seconded by Ed Mone, it was unanimously

VOTED: To approve the minutes of the November 18, 2011 COGCNV meeting.

b. Financial Report — Peter Dorpalen reported that as of November 30, 2011 COGCNV was 42% through the fiscal year and had expended 37% of its operating budget. Including pass-through funds, 36% of the total budget has been expended.

Mr. Dorpalen also mentioned ongoing issues with the landlord's maintenance of the building where the COGCNV offices are located. New office space is being looked at.

Also, a request for proposals for a new server and technical maintenance for COGCNV's computer system garnered 10 responses. With assistance from a technical committee consisting of Cheshire and Southbury's IT staff, the proposals were reviewed and reduced to four. A revised, supplemental RFP, based on the committee's recommendations, is being prepared.

On a motion by Jerry Stomski, seconded by Ed Mone, it was unanimously

VOTED: To approve the financial report.

4. WalkCT - What Is It? What Are the Benefits to Your Community?

Leslie Lewis, Director of WalkCT spoke about the program, which was launched by the Connecticut Forest & Park Association to connect people to the outdoors, build awareness of valuable resources, develop routes for non-motorized transportation, and promote healthy living in Connecticut. She said the cornerstone of the program is the WalkCT website, which currently has over 115 walking locations around the state. She said that the program is more than hiking trails and walks in the woods, noting Thomaston's own Clock Walk. She requested that each town authorize someone as an ambassador who can register the municipality's walking locations, including town centers, on WalkCT's website.

5. Emergency Planning

a. Purchase of Variable Message Signs Using GSA Price List — Virginia Mason said COGCNV is in the third year of doing emergency planning in the region, and this is the first full year it will be done under the auspices of the Department of Emergency Services and Public Protection. Ms. Mason requested authority from COGCNV to participate in cooperative agreements or piggyback from contracts such as the purchase of variable message signs using GSA price lists. On a motion by Bob Chatfield, seconded by Jerry Stomski, it was unanimously

VOTED: To authorize COGCNV to participate in cooperative agreements or piggyback from contracts, such as the purchase of variable message signs using GSA price lists.

Additionally, Ms. Mason reported that on December 12 a planning team meeting will take place in Watertown to reallocate funds.

Also at a recent council meeting of DESPP, it was mentioned that there are hazard mitigation grant program funds available for towns that have pre-disaster mitigation plans in place. This qualifies all COGCNV municipalities.

6. Regional Performance Incentive Program – Regional Animal Control Feasibility Study Application

Peter Dorpalen provided an update on the Regional Animal Control Feasibility Study. At its October meeting, COGCNV decided to pursue an OPM Regional Performance Grant to study options for a regional animal control facility. COGCNV staff has completed a preliminary draft of the OPM application describing the proposed study. Cost benefit analysis has also been completed. Municipal resolutions will be needed from each participating municipality. The deadline for the application is December 31, 2011. On a motion by Bob Chatfield, seconded by Jerry Stomski, it was unanimously

VOTED: To endorse the Regional Performance Incentive Program proposal for a Regional Animal Control Facility Feasibility Study, and to authorize Chairman Robert A. Mezzo to sign the application's certification.

Bob Mezzo requested that the COGCNV meeting scheduled for January 13, 2012 be postponed until January 20, 2012 to allow additional time for submittal and review of CMAQ and transportation enhancement projects. On a motion by Bob Chatfield, seconded by Ed Mone, it was unanimously

VOTED: To add a change to the January 2012 meeting date to the agenda.

On a motion by Bob Chatfield, seconded by Ed Mone, it was unanimously

VOTED: To change the date of the January 2012 COGCNV meeting from January 13 to January 20.

Jerry Stomski opened discussion concerning clean-up from the October storm. He said there is an enormous amount of tree debris in the woods, a lot of it lumber sized. There is a possibility of forest fires once the debris dries up. He would like the appropriate authorities to give consideration to what is going on in the woods. Peter Dorpalen said DEEP Commissioner Esty is scheduled to speak at the January COGCNV meeting, although this must be confirmed now that the meeting date has been changed to January 20.

Carla lezzi of CTDOT said that she has been reassigned and that sometime over the next two months a new liaison to COGCNV will be appointed.

10. Adjournment

At 1 p.m., on a motion by Ed Mone, seconded by Jerry Stomski, it was unanimously

VOTED: To adjourn the meeting.



Draft Transportation Improvement Program – Public Review and Meeting

The draft 2012-2015 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP), prepared by the Council of Governments of the Central Naugatuck Valley (COGCNV) in coordination with the State Department of Transportation (CTDOT), is now available for review and comments. The TIP is a four-year funding schedule of transportation improvement projects paid for by federal, state, and local funding sources. Highway and road improvements, bridge repairs, commuter services, and bus and train operating and capital funds are included in the TIP. Some of the projects in the TIP are:

- Upgrade of I-84 in Waterbury from Washington Street to Pierpont Road
- Reconstruction of Chase Avenue in Waterbury
- Reconstruction of Christian Street in Oxford
- Reconstruction of Scott Road in Prospect (Phase II)
- Naugatuck River Greenway project along S. Main Street in Waterbury
- Realignment and drainage improvements on Route 42 in Cheshire
- Construction of a new bus maintenance facility for CT Transit-Waterbury
- Replacing paratransit vehicles for the Greater Waterbury Transit District
- Repair of railroad bridges and positive train control on the Waterbury Branch Rail Line

The draft TIP will be available for public review and comment for 30 days beginning on December 5, 2011 and ending on January 4, 2012. Written comments may be mailed to COGCNV at 60 North Main Street, 3rd Floor, Waterbury, CT 06702, or e-mailed to comments@cogcnv.org. Oral comments will be taken at the public meeting.

Copies of the TIP will be available at the COGCNV office and online at www.cogcnv.org. Enclosed is a copy of the TIP for your own records. We ask that you make this copy available at your office for public review. Copies of the Air Quality Conformity Determination for ozone and PM_{2.5} will be available for public review at the COGCNV office.


Public Participation Process

The draft TIP 2012–2015 is posted on the COGCNV website and distributed to municipal clerks in the region. The document is also available for public review at the COGCNV office. In an effort to ensure a widespread review of the CNVR TIP, COGCNV sent notice of the document's availability to over 300 interested officials, organizations, and individuals. The list included local officials, planners, public works directors, minority groups, transit providers, economic development organizations, and conservation groups. Notice of the public review process was placed in the *Republican-American* to ensure a wide distribution.

The meeting for the public will be held at the COGCNV office during the thirty-day comment period, from 3:00 p.m. – 5:00 p.m. on December 14, 2011.

TIP 2012-2015 Approval

COGCNV will vote on approval of the 2012–2015 TIP at its monthly meeting held on January 13, 2012. Following COGCNV approval, the TIP will be submitted to CTDOT for review and acceptance, and then forwarded as part of the STIP to the Federal Highway Administration and the Federal Transit Administration for review and approval. Along with the TIP endorsement, COGCNV will vote on approval of CTDOT's air quality conformity statements, which are in Appendix A.

any type of transportation project. CTDOT determines where the funds will be spent. The funding ratio for the STP-Anywhere Program is 80% federal funds to be matched by 20% state funds or 20% local funds for rural minor collector roads.

FHWA Safety Program, HSIP Rural & Other (HSIP) (90/10)

The program authorizes a new Federal-aid funding program to achieve a significant reduction in traffic fatalities and serious injuries on all public roads.

FHWA Surface Transportation Program - Reinvestment and Recovery (STRR) (100)

The program provides MPOs federal funds under the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act. Funds are allocated to the MPOs according to a formula that is based on the population of the urban area. These funds may be used by states and municipalities for roadway improvements on roads that are functionally classified as rural major collector or above. Functional classification of rural minor collector or local road is not eligible. Funds can be used for a wide range of projects, such as roadway widening, roadway reconstruction, transit projects, and ridesharing projects.

FHWA Surface Transportation Program

The Surface Transportation Program is intended to benefit collector and minor arterial roads, rather than the principal arterials funded by the Interstate Maintenance and National Highway System Programs. In order to be eligible for funding, a road must be classified as a collector or arterial; local roads are not eligible. Fifty percent of all STP funds are reserved for the Urban Surface Transportation Program (STP-U), the largest of all the STP programs. Funds are allocated to states and regions according to a formula based on the population of the urban area. Funds can be used for a wide range of projects, such as road widening, reconstruction, transit projects, and ridesharing projects. Funding for STP-U projects comes from federal funds (80%) matched by state and/or local funds (20%).

The FHWA distinguishes between large urban areas (with populations of over 200,000 people) and small urban areas (with populations between 50,000 and 200,000 people). The Waterbury Urbanized Area, the major urban area in the Central Naugatuck Valley Region (CNVR) is considered a small urban area. The STP-Other Urban is the subcategory of the STP-U Program for small urban areas. All other program guidelines are the same as for the STP-U program. The CNVR also has portions of the Bridgeport-Stamford, New Haven, and Hartford Urbanized Areas. Each of these has its own STP-U allocation. After the 2010 US Census is released, the federal Office of Management and Budget will redraw urbanized area boundaries based on urban population.

COGCNV ranks projects based on the functional classification of the road, its condition, its accident history, the amount of use, and the proposed project's impact on surrounding land uses. COGCNV's prioritized list of projects also reflects each town's proportional share of the region's STP-Other Urban allocation and the amount of funding a town has already received. In order to be eligible for STP-Other Urban funds, roadways must be classified as minor collectors or higher in urban areas and major collectors or higher in rural areas. Local roads are not eligible.

FHWA Surface Transportation Program - Rural (STP-R)

The Surface Transportation Program-Rural is a subcategory of the STP-A program. A certain proportion of the STP-A funds must be spent in rural areas with a population of less than 5,000 people. The amount of funding allocated for rural areas is based on miles of roadway that were part of a previous federal program known as the rural secondary program. STP-Rural program funds can be used for any type of transportation project.

The FHWA Off-System Bridge Program provides funds to replace or rehabilitate bridges that are not on the federal-aid road system. CTDOT inspects and rates the condition of local as well as state bridges. Projects are selected the same way as in the On-System Bridge Program. Since most state roads are on the federal aid road system, they usually do not qualified for the program. Many of the funded projects are municipal bridges. Funding comes from federal sources (80%) matched by state sources (20%).

The Local Bridge Program is a subset of the FHWA Off-System Bridge Program. To qualify for the Local Bridge Program, a bridge must carry a certified local road and be structurally deficient according to Federal Highway Administration criteria. Bridges must be located on roads functionally classified as "rural local roads," "rural minor collectors," or "urban local roads." Bridges are qualified if the physical condition of the deck, superstructure or substructure (piers and abutments and surrounding areas), or culverts are rated "poor" or worse ("serious," "critical," or in "imminent failure"). The carrying capacity of the bridge and structural integrity are the most heavily weighted factors in calculating the bridge's sufficiency rating. Serviceability, functional obsolescence, and essentiality for public use are also considered in CTDOT's numerical formula. Bridges over 20 feet in length are inspected biannually. When a local bridge is included in the program, the municipality retains responsibility for survey studies, preliminary and final design, material testing, right-of-way activities, and construction supervision and inspection. Grants are available based on an assessment of a town's ability to pay. The town's contribution ranges from 10 to 33% of the total cost of the project depending on the ranking of the bridge. Funding is available at the construction phase, with reimbursement of preliminary studies, engineering, and property acquisition costs.

FHWA Recreational Trails Program (RT) (80/20)

The program provides funding to the Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) to develop and maintain recreational trails for motorized and nonmotorized recreational trail users. The DEP will forward applications to park and recreation directors or chief elected officials in each municipality.

Safe Routes to School (SRSN) (100/0)

The program is designed to enable and encourage children, including those with disabilities, to walk and bicycle to school, and to help plan, develop, and implement projects that will improve safety, reduce traffic, fuel consumption, and air pollution in the vicinity of schools. Funds will be administered by CTDOT, and state, local, and regional agencies, including non-profit organizations, will be eligible to apply for funding for proposed projects.

Federal Transit Administration

The Federal Transit Administration (FTA) is the federal funding source for transit projects:

FTA Section 5307 Transit Capital and Operating

FTA Section 5307 funds are primarily for capital assistance projects, such as the purchase of new buses. A small portion of the funds are reserved for operating assistance; federal regulations restrict the amount that can be used for operating assistance. Section 5307 funds are pooled and applied first to the highest priority bus needs as identified in regional TIPs and the STIP. The FTA provides 80% of Section 5307 funds, and CTDOT provides the non-federal share for all local bus systems in Connecticut.

FTA Section 5309 Capital (5309) (80/20)

With Section 5309 funds, the FTA provides capital funding to establish new rail projects ("New Starts"), improve and maintain existing rail and other fixed guideway systems, and rehabilitate bus systems. New Start funds are awarded on a discretionary basis. Proposed new rail services must compete against proposals

IV. FINANCIAL PLAN

All projects contained in the CNVR *Transportation Improvement Program: 2012–2015* (TIP), prepared by COGCNV in cooperation with the CTDOT, are consistent with the fiscally-constrained *Long Range Regional Transportation Plan: 2011-2040*, prepared by COGCNV, and the *2009 Long Range Transportation Plan* (LRP), prepared by CTDOT. CTDOT developed a 20-year revenue estimate for its *LRP*. This serves as the basis for TIP development. The CNVR TIP is prepared through an ongoing planning process in cooperation with CTDOT.

The CNVR TIP: 2012-2015 is financially constrained as required by Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) and Federal Transit Administration (FTA). Non-federal matching funds are provided by the state and the municipalities. Where local funds are indicated in the TIP, the municipality or sponsoring agency has made a financial commitment to provide the necessary project funds for the match. This TIP contains a listing of transportation projects, organized by federal funding categories, to be financed in federal fiscal years 2012-2015. Projects listed as FYI may begin or continue in future years beyond 2015.

The federal funds identified in the TIP are the CNVR's portion of expected authorizations to the State of Connecticut and federal funds for statewide and CTDOT maintenance district projects which have components within the CNVR. Each Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) in Connecticut schedules federal funding through its regional TIP. When all of these funds are summed, the total equals the expected federal authorization to the State of Connecticut. The State and COGCNV have concurred in the use of these federal funds for the projects listed in the TIP. A detailed description of this process is provided in the STIP.

The majority of the federal funds indicated in this TIP will be matched by state funding. The State of Connecticut's Special Transportation Fund (STF) was established by the 1983 State Legislature to provide a dedicated fund for the financing of investment in Connecticut's transportation system and to cover the operating costs of CTDOT. The principal source of the STF revenues are the motor fuel tax and motor vehicle receipts which, combined, make up approximately 65% of the total fund revenue.

The CNVR TIP: 2012-2015 and the STIP: 2012-2015, which includes the CNVR TIP, are financially constrained, and the spending plan is based on reasonable projections of available statewide resources. As program and schedule changes are made to the TIP, the total expected federal authorizations and matching funds will be reallocated to reflect total statewide and regional program needs.

September 28, 2011	Email from Peter Dorpalen with Benedetti's responses to questions from town officials on the capital and operating costs of the pavement recycling equipment and other issues.
October 2, 2011	Email from CRRA extending the deadline for municipal service agreements to December 31.
October 13, 2011	Email from OPM with Governor's announcement of grant awards for the Transit Oriented Development Pilot Program (Naugatuck and Waterbury were not selected).

3. Central Connecticut Rall Study

Andrew Davis, Rail Planning, CTDOT, said the state has determined the need to conduct a feasibility study concerning the implementation of fixed-guideway rail or bus transit service in the Central Connecticut Corridor, directly serving the cities of Waterbury, Bristol, and Hartford, and the adjacent towns of Plainville, Berlin, and Plymouth. He reviewed the draft Scope of Work. Comments on the draft scope of work are being solicited and will be accepted until October 28.

4. Discussion of CL&P Storm Response

William Quinlan, Vice President of Customer Solutions at CL&P spoke about the company's response to Storm Irene. Current improvement objectives with municipalities include strengthening municipal partnerships, improving communications and coordination, enhancing the town liaison process through people, processes, and technology, and conducting municipal outreach. He also discussed restoration response process enhancements, vegetation management, and resource planning. Feedback from those present was solicited, and several mayors and first selectman spoke about their town's experience and offered recommendations to improve future storm response.

5. Transportation Improvement Amendment

Joe Perrelli summarized the October 2011 Amendment to the 2010-2035 Transportation Improvement program, as outlined in Memorandum 100711TIP. On a motion by Bill Davis, seconded by Tom Gormley, it was unanimously

VOTED: To approve the October 2011 amendment to the 2010-2013 Transportation Improvement Program listed in Memorandum 100711TIP.

6. Sustainable Communities Regional Planning Grant

Samuel Gold said a grant application was recently submitted to HUD for a Sustainable Communities regional planning grant. If awarded, the grant would facilitate greater coordination and planning and would include a demographic study for the region, a housing assessment, an economic strategic plan, and a sustainable land use analysis. COGCNV members will be kept appraised of the status of the grant application.

7. Contractor Fraud

FBI Special Agent Ron Offutt spoke about contractor fraud and public officials. He reviewed common fraudulent schemes and general fraud indicators. He also discussed what federal regulators look for and provided general guidelines to follow when working with contractors. He noted that 95% of contractors are honest and that the best policy is to have a pro-active approach in place concerning fraud, including a system of checks and balances. A question and answer period followed.

8. Emergency Planning

Virginia Mason said there are still outstanding memorandums of understanding for the 2010 state homeland security grant program. She also mentioned that the coordinating council had recently met.

9. Regional Business

a. Benedetti Pavement Recycling Equipment – Level of Interest, Next Steps
Susan Cable said there was some interest in visiting the Ohio Benedetti facility to see a
demonstration of the equipment. She felt it might be advantageous to do so after the
first of the year. Mary Ann Drayton-Rogers suggested the CEOs work with their town
engineers in order to determine the percentage of roads on which the equipment would
work. Several CEOs felt the recycling equipment would be an opportunity to put
regionalization into action.

10. Other

a. Brownfield Inventory – Municipal Survey
Peter Dorpalen said there are state grants available for brownfield revitalization. The
DECD is interested in adding to the list of known brownfields and establishing priorities.

b. Upcoming Household Hazardous Waste Events

Joe Perelli stated that a household hazardous waste event will take place in Middlebury on Saturday, October 22. This will be the last event of the year. On the product stewardship level, mattress legislation is being looked at for the future. This would be similar to the e-waste bill that was passed, in which electronics recycling became the responsibility of the manufacturer. A meeting for stakeholders in the mattress legislation will be held on November 4.

c. Water Distribution

Virginia Mason said that as part of a Connecticut Community Foundation grant, a meeting would be held in Waterbury with the Pomperaug River Watershed Coalition and other speakers concerning water distribution and efficiency. She encouraged interested parties to register for the event at PRWC's website.

d. Storm Irene Testimony

Chair of COGCNV's Regional Emergency Planning Committee, Naugatuck Fire Chief Ken Hanks spoke about testifying at a state legislative hearing in Hartford about Storm Irene.



4. Change in Subdivision Bonding Requirements

a. On a motion by Ruth Mulcahy, seconded Richard Minnick, it was unanimously

VOTED: To move Item 8. Change in Subdivision Bonding Requirements up on the agenda.

Chris Wood discussed the changes in boding requirements under Public Act 11-79 and the impact that it will have on small towns and their planning and zoning commissions. The law, which goes into effect October 1, included the following provisions:

- Mandate of acceptance of surety bonds. Costs are higher and harder to collect.
- Prohibits the extension of a maintenance bonds beyond the acceptance of the improvements. Municipalities now have the option of requiring bonds that end beyond the date of acceptance in case any problems arise with the improvement within months or a year.
- No more than a 10% contingency beyond the cost calculations. Only affects site plans; not subdivisions. Towns will have to be more careful in their calculations for site plans, particularly where there are tie-ins with existing infrastructure.
- The timing of the bond posting is at the developer's discretion.
- Bonds must be released within 65 days of a written request by the developer or the provision of a written explanation by the developer of what needs to be done.
- Towns have to accept the "form" of the bonds. Commissions should carefully consider and define the "form" of bond that is acceptable.

5. Sustainable Communities Regional Planning Grant Program

Samuel Gold reported that staff is preparing an application to the federal Sustainable Communities Regional Planning Grant program for \$660,000 to conduct four plans: Demographic Analysis and Population Projections, Housing Assessment and Plan, Economic Strategic Plan, and Sustainable Land Use Plan. COG is reaching out to partners to assist with the planning project if the grant is successful. The grant is due to HUD in October.

6. Regional Parcel Level Land Use Study

Mark Berube presented the results of COGCNV's land use mapping project, which included the creation of 13 parcel-based municipal land use maps for the CNVR. Assessor's information was compared with the current land use. In some cases, large parcels were divided into more than one land use category (for instance, parcels that include undeveloped land and residential land). The new maps will provide more precise land use boundaries for an area, along with more accurate percentages of different land use categories for each town and for the region as a whole.

7. Bus Route Ridership Study

Sam Gold presented the findings of COGCNV's bus ridership study. Data was collected for each run of each route, including weekend service in Spring 2009. The study found an average of 6,181 passengers per weekday. The system saw an overall increase in ridership since 2001 with only some routes showing a decrease. The study showed variability in ridership during different times of the month, which can be attributed to the availability of benefits at the beginning of the month. A public meeting will be held to discuss the findings with the public and receive suggestions on routes and scheduling.

Herman is working with the Governor's staff on the airport enterprise zone. The state wants to
make sure that certain areas are not part of the enterprise zone. Adjacent towns should be
identifying areas that they want to include in the enterprise zone. He has been asked to engage
with motor and air freight operators in the enterprise zone, which would be not go over well
with adjacent landowners. The town wants to focus on light manufacturing and having cheap
energy available to local businesses.

Wolcott

Val Bernardoni reported that

- The Economic Development Committee has heard complaints from local businesses around Tosun and Town Line Roads that are frequently flooded. Local streams are filled with silt and vegetation. The businesses have had to close several times after rainstorms. The stream was dredged years ago, which seemed to alleviate the problem at that time. The committee is working with these businesses to have this done again.
- The EDC is just starting to hold meet & greet sessions with town businesses, beginning at the end of the month.

Thomaston

Robert Flanagan reported that

- Mary Barton has moved on. The position was filled briefly, but that person has since moved on.
 The town promoted the WEO, Jeremy Leifert, to cover the ZEO position.
- Thomaston had challenges with their emergency radio system in the last storm. The system can really benefit from much-needed upgrades.
- The high school, which is supposed to function as an emergency shelter, doesn't have a generator. The town was unable to use the high school as a shelter in the last storm, because of the lack of a generator. Virginia Mason mentioned a state grant to provide generators for emergency shelters and said she would look into whether that grant is still available.

Naugatuck

Joseph McEvoy reported that

The borough passed an \$85 million bond to renovate the high school.

Watertown

Ruth Mulcahy reported that

- There was a zone change on Commercial Street, which runs behind Straits Turnpike (Rte. 63).
- There was a zone change for the former Griffin School site to make way for a CVS. The Litchfield Bancorp on Main Street (Rte. 73) will also be razed in the process.
- There was a zone change on Straits Turnpike (Rte. 63) next to Carvel to make way for a new bank.
- There are two more car dealerships on the agenda. Shakers is renovating their dealership, which
 is partially in Middlebury. There will be a site walk on the property tomorrow night. The new
 Hyundai dealership at the site of the old State dairy is on the agenda now.
- There is a new project on the agenda for 62 units in an RG zone on a linear piece of property where the town would like to run the greenway.
- Regulations for the IHZ are ready. The town is ready to go to a public hearing, but the property
 owners in the selected zones, like the Griffin School, no longer seem interested in participating.
- There are two subdivision applications on the agenda and two more that should be coming in tomorrow.



3. Issues of Concern to Municipalities

Connecticut Secretary of the State Denise Merrill spoke about standards in the procedures of the election process. She hopes to modernize and streamline the current election process. All registrars of voters should have internet access for transmittal of election results. Ms. Merrill said she has staff willing to come out and help with connecting a registrar's computer to the town's network, if necessary. She also spoke about federal funds, received by the state approximately 10-15 years ago, for the purchase of new optical scan voting machines. The state has been paying for the maintenance contracts on these machines from the federal money. The agency that supplied the funds has now been abolished and there are no more federal funds. However, the state will pay for the maintenance of the optical scan voting machines for the next two or three years. If a town has already paid for a maintenance program for this year, it can get reimbursed. It is critical that the machines be maintained properly and town's should budget accordingly. Ms. Merrill is also concerned about registrar, moderator and poll worker training and consistency. Within the next four months, an online training system will be offered to new registrars. She also spoke about pilot initiatives, including electronic poll books. Ms. Merrill will be introducing a constitutional amendment which will enable Connecticut to look at things like early voting, no fault absentee ballots, and same day registration. She also spoke about initiatives on the business side of the registry including legislation to create an e-business portal to help businesses navigate state government.

4. Transportation Planning

a. Transportation Improvement Program - September 2011 Amendment — Joe Perrelli summarized the September 2011 amendments to the 2010-2013 Transportation Improvement Program, as outlined in Memorandum 090911TIP. On a motion by Bob Chatfield, seconded by Jeff Hamel, it was unanimously

VOTED: To approve the September 2011 amendments to the 2010-2013 Transportation Improvement Program listed in Memorandum 090911TIP.

b. Waterbury Rail Line Backup Plan — Peter Dorpalen reviewed Samuel Gold's Memorandum 090211-Rail. The memo concerns recent disruptions in commuter rail service on the Waterbury Branch Line due to the winter storms, rail maintenance, and Hurricane Irene. The disruptions have inconvenienced and stranded passengers and discouraged ridership.

road, and if something isn't done correctly, the town will end up paying the bill. Tom Gormley concurred and agreed that chief elected officials should check with their town counsel, planners, consulting engineers, or other appropriate parties for further information.

b. Aftermath of Irene - How did your town fare? Chairman Mezzo opened the floor for any comments concerning Hurricane Irene and how the communities responded. Tom Gormley spoke about the response of CL&P. Jeff Hamel added comments about how Bethlehem managed. Mary Ann Drayton-Rogers spoke about the critique meetings that would be taking place with CL&P and points that would be raised. Tom Dunn discussed Wolcott's response and experience with CL&P, as did Bob Chatfield and Bob Mezzo concerning Prospect's and Naugatuck's experience. It was agreed that information and communication are key. FEMA's distribution of supplies was also discussed, including weaknesses in the state's ability to distribute the supplies locally. Virginia Mason said there is a state distribution plan, but it was not followed. She anticipates there will be DEMHS/DESPP discussion as to why this happened. Bob Chatfield praised COGCNV and its regional emergency planning work with DEMHS/DESPP. Without the coordination and preplanning in place, he feels the overall response would have been a lot worse.





b. Financial Report — Virginia Mason reported that as of June 30, 2011, COGCNV was 100% through the fiscal year and had expended 88% of its operating budget. Including pass through funds, 86% of the total budget has been expended. On a motion by Mary Ann Drayton-Rogers, seconded by Tamath Rossi, it was unanimously

3. Transportation Planning

a. Memorandum of Understanding Concerning Transit-Oriented Development Pilot Projects
— Sam Gold said Naugatuck and Waterbury are applying for this state program. As part
of the application requirement for this program, the municipalities must enter into a
Memorandum of Understanding with COGCNV. David Prendergast, CEO of the
Naugatuck Economic Development Corp., spoke about Naugatuck's proposed project.
Sam Gold described Waterbury's proposed project. On a motion by Mary Ann DraytonRogers, seconded by Terry Caldarone, it was unanimously

VOTED: To authorize Vice Chairman H. William Davis to sign the Memorandum of Understanding between the Council of Governments of the Central Naugatuck Valley (COGCNV) and the City of Waterbury and the Borough of Naugatuck concerning a Transit-Oriented Development Pilot Program.

b. STP-Urban Highway Project Process — Joe Perrelli said a meeting with local officials was recently held to discuss the future of the STP-Urban program. The region's project funding is programmed to 2013. New projects need to be developed for 2014 and beyond. Recent projects have far exceeded the Waterbury Urbanized Area's annual allocation, creating a need for multi-year financing of projects and causing a severe backlog in the program. Any new projects should be low cost, focused, spot improvements. Joe Perrelli reviewed a draft list of criteria for ranking new and existing projects and the draft STP-Urban Program Guidelines. COGCNV will be soliciting new projects for the program in September, with an October deadline. Pavement rehabilitation projects will have an earlier deadline. The new guidelines and revised criteria will provide a framework for scheduling new projects for the program. On a motion by Susan Cable, seconded by Tamath Rossi, it was unanimously

VOTED: To approve the new criteria and guidelines for ranking STP-Urban projects as presented in Memorandum 072011STP.

the Waterbury and New Canaan Branch Line Needs and Feasibility Study in 2010. The study investigated transportation options along the Waterbury Branch Line corridor and made recommendations for improvements that would allow for increased commuter rail service and train station improvements at Waterbury, Naugatuck, and Derby. In June 2011, the Greater Bridgeport Regional Planning Agency and the Valley Council of Governments approved a resolution requesting that the state take action to increase train service on the Waterbury Branch Line and to start the environmental studies required for some of the recommendations of the Needs and Feasibility Study. Sam Gold said the state's budget problems make major capital projects on the Waterbury Branch Line unlikely in the short tem, but COGCNV staff sees value in making sure that CTDOT is planning for these improvements and conducting the necessary environmental studies for recommended capital projects. A request would be made of CTDOT to identify next steps and create an implementation time line for the recommendations of the Waterbury and New Canaan Branch Lines Needs and Feasibility Study.

Following discussion, on a motion by Tom Gormley, seconded by Susan Cable, it was unanimously

VOTED: To table the *Waterbury Rail Line Improvements Implementation* motion until such time that further information has been gathered.

4. Emergency Planning

- a. ESF Priorities for New DEMHS Region 5 Strategic Plan Virginia Mason said the four RPOs in Region 5 are working on a questionnaire for ESF chairs and municipal CEOs in order to develop a strategic plan for priorities in the coming years, as funding decreases.
- b. Pre-Disaster Mitigation Virginia Mason said pre-disaster mitigation was done by seven towns five years ago. The plans need to be updated every five years. An application for funding of the updates was turned down by FEMA. The newly created Department of Emergency Services and Public Protection will be applying for grants and has advised that multiple town groups or regions have a better chance of funding, as do towns that were turned down last year. COGCNV will work with the towns on the applications and consultant selection, however due to lack of funding from OPM, COGCNV's involvement will need to be minimal.

5. Regional Business

a. Asphalt Pavement Recycling Equipment — Susan Cable said that on September 14, in the Beacon Falls Town Hall assembly room, representatives from the Benedetti Company will give a presentation on their asphalt pavement recycling equipment.

6. Other

Straits Turnpike Bus Service — Sam Gold said Sunbeam Partners requested that CTT ransit a. - Waterbury provide bus service to Straits Turnpike (Route 63) and Park Road in Middlebury. Sunbeam Partners is seeking service to three office buildings. Sam said no existing bus route could be modified to serve these buildings on an hourly basis. Instead, the twice daily runs of 42 Chase Parkway to Judd's Corner could be rerouted to serve Straits Turnpike. In 2009, one passenger a day was counted on the Judd's Corner (Store Ave.) portion of the 42 Chase Parkway route. Using information from the ITE's Trip Generation, 8th Edition, and the U.S. Census Bureau's American Community Survey, it is estimated that 31 trips to the three office buildings would be made by bus on an average weekday. The limited runs (one a.m. and one p.m.) of a rerouted Judd's Corner trip would probably reduce ridership to around 10-15 trips, still significantly higher than current ridership. Also, the infrequency of the proposed service would not trigger any new ADA paratransit obligation. The office buildings are already accessible via existing non-ADA paratransit and Dial-A-Ride services operated by CTTransit - Waterbury. Tom Gormley provided additional information and asked for COGCNV support for the bus route change. On a motion by Tom Galvin, seconded by Ray Primini, it was unanimously

VOTED: To support the change of routing of 42 Chase Parkway to serve Straits Turnpike and Park Road instead of Judd's Corner.







the Council of Governments of the Central Naugatuck Valley is required to submit an Air Quality Conformity Statement to the US Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) and to the US Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) in accordance with the final conformity rule promulgated by EPA (40 CFR 51 and 93) when adopting an annual Transportation Improvement Program or when effecting a significant revision of the Region's Transportation Plan; and

WHEREAS,

Title 42, Section 7506 (3) (A) states that conformity of transportation plans and programs will be demonstrated if:

- 1. the plans and programs are consistent with recent estimates of mobile source emissions;
- 2. the plans and programs provide for the expeditious implementation of certain transportation control measures;
- 3. the plans and programs contribute to annual emissions reductions consistent with the Clean Air Act of 1977, as amended; and

WHEREAS,

it is the opinion of the Council of Governments of the Central Naugatuck Valley that the plans and programs approved today, May 13, 2011 and submitted to FHWA and EPA conform to the requirements of Title 42, Section 7506 (3) (A) as interpreted by EPA (40 CFR 51 and 93); and

WHEREAS,

the Connecticut portion of the New York - Northern New Jersey - Long Island Nonattainment area (Fairfield, New Haven and Middlesex counties) and the Greater Connecticut area (Hartford, New London, Tolland, Windham and Litchfield counties) have been designated as Moderate Nonattainment areas and the Connecticut Department of Transportation has jointly assessed the impact of all transportation plans and programs in these Nonattainment areas (Ozone Air Quality Conformity Report March 2011); and

WHEREAS,

the results of the required emissions analysis performed by the Connecticut Department of Transportation on the Long Range Regional Transportation Plan 2011-2040 and the Transportation Improvement Program: 2010-2013 show that the implementation of the projects contained therein will result in emissions of ozone in each analysis year that are less that the emissions of the baseline year as stated in the Connecticut Department of Transportation Ozone Air Quality Conformity Determination of the 2011 Regional Transportation Plans and the 2010-2013 Transportation Improvement Programs for the Connecticut portion of the New York - Northern New Jersey - Long Island, NY-NJ-CT Ozone Nonattainment Area and the Greater Connecticut Ozone Nonattainment Area.

Now, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED,

That the Council of Governments of the Central Naugatuck Valley finds that the Long Range Regional Transportation Plan 2011-2040 and the Transportation Improvement Program: 2010-2013 (TIP) conform to air quality requirements of the U.S. Environmental Protection Administration (40 CFR 51 and 93), related U.S. Department of Transportation guidelines (23 CFR 450) and with Title 42, Section 7506 (3) (A) and hereby approves the existing March 2011 Ozone Air Quality Conformity Determination.

VOTED: Resolution on Conformity with the Clean Air Act - PM 2.5

WHEREAS,

the Council of Governments of the Central Naugatuck Valley is required to submit an Air Quality Conformity Statement to the US Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) and to the US Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) in accordance with the final conformity rule promulgated by EPA (40 CFR 51 and 93) when adopting an annual Transportation Improvement Program or when effecting a significant revision of the Region's Transportation Plan; and

WHEREAS,

Title 42, Section 7506 (3) (A) states that conformity of transportation plans and programs will be demonstrated if:

- 1. the plans and programs are consistent with recent estimates of mobile source emissions;
- 2. the plans and programs provide for the expeditious implementation of certain transportation control measures:
- 3. the plans and programs contribute to annual emissions reductions consistent with the Clean Air Act of 1977, as amended; and

WHEREAS,

it is the opinion of the Council of Governments of the Central Naugatuck Valley that the plans and programs approved today, May 13, 2011 and submitted to FHWA and EPA conform to the requirements of Title 42, Section 7506 (3) (A) as interpreted by EPA (40 CFR 51 and 93); and

WHEREAS,

The New York - Northern New Jersey - Long Island, NY-NJ-CT area is designated a PM 2.5 Nonattainment area; and

WHEREAS,

The State of Connecticut has elected to jointly assess conformity in all PM 2.5 nonattainment areas in Connecticut (Fairfield County and New Haven County); and

WHEREAS,

The results of the required emissions analysis performed by the Connecticut Department of Transportation on the Long Range Regional Transportation Plan 2011-2040 and the Transportation Improvement Program: 2010-2013 show that the implementation of the projects contained therein will result in emissions of PM2.5 in each analysis year that are less that the emissions of the baseline year as stated in the Connecticut Department of Transportation PM 2.5 Air Quality Conformity Determination of the 2011 Regional Transportation Plans and the 2010-2013 Transportation Improvement Programs for the Connecticut portion of the NY-NJ-CT PM2.5 Nonattainment Area, March 2011.

Now, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED,

That the Council of Governments of the Central Naugatuck Valley finds that the Long Range Regional Transportation Plan 2011-2040 and the Transportation Improvement Program: 2010-2013 conform to air quality requirements of the U.S. Environmental Protection Administration (40 CFR 51 and 93), related U.S. Department of Transportation guidelines (23 CFR 450) and with Title 42, Section 7506 (3) (A) and hereby approves the existing March 2011 PM2.5 Conformity Determination contingent upon no major adverse comments were received during said period.

c. Certification of the Urban Transportation Planning Process — Joe Perrelli said that each year the U.S. Department of Transportation requires COGCNV to certify that the terms and provisions of the March 16, 2007 Metropolitan Transportation Planning regulations are satisfied. In addition, COGCNV must demonstrate that the provisions relative to involvement of public and private providers of mass transit, Civil Rights, involvement of

minority business enterprises, special efforts for elderly and disabled persons, the Clean Air Act, 23 U.S.C. and 49 U.S.C. have also been satisfied. Joe stated that COGCNV has successfully met these requirements. On a motion by Bob Chatfield, seconded by Tom Gormley, it was unanimously

VOTED: The Council of Governments of the Central Naugatuck Valley, the designated Metropolitan Planning Organization for the Central Naugatuck Valley Region, hereby certifies that the metropolitan planning process has been conducted in accordance with the terms and provisions of the March 16, 2007 Metropolitan Transportation Planning regulations and that all applicable provisions relative to involvement of public and private providers of mass transit, Civil Rights, involvement of minority business enterprises, special efforts for elderly and handicapped persons, the Clean Air Act, 23 U.S.C. and 49 U.S.C. have been satisfied.

d. FTA Section 5310 Minibus Grant Priority List — Virginia Mason said COGCNV received three applications for FY 2011. Ranking criteria are set by CTDOT and continue to include questions relating to the Locally Coordinated Public Transit Human Services Transportation Plan (LOCHSTP). Staff evaluated the applications based on CTDOT criteria, as described in the application, including a specific requirement of public notices. The criteria and point system are described in Memorandum 042511. Table 1 of Memorandum 042511 details the evaluation of the applications with the ranking results. On a motion by Bob Chatfield, seconded by Tom Gormley, it was unanimously

VOTED: To approve the FY 2011 Federal Transit Administration Section 5310 priority list as presented in Memorandum 042511.

e. Transportation Improvement Program Amendments — Joe Perrelli summarized the May 2012 amendments to the 2010-2013 Transportation Improvement Program listed in Memorandum 050611TIP. On a motion by Bob Chatfield, seconded by Tom Gormley, it was unanimously

VOTED: To approve the May 2011 amendments to the 2010-2013 Transportation Improvement Program listed in Memorandum 050611TIP.

6. Emergency Planning

a. DEMHS Grant — Virginia Mason said the steering committee met and adopted a spending plan, including three changes for the FY 09 grant that will be voted on at the REPT meeting in June. The 2010 plan will have more monies for RPOs, due to additional responsibilities. A memorandum detailing the 2010 spending plan will follow.

Also, Virginia Mason said FEMA will be sending out application toolkits to towns for the 2011 snow storms. These applications will be due in August.

On a motion by Bob Chatfield, seconded by Jerry Sitko, it was unanimously

VOTED: To authorize COGCNV to serve as fiduciary agent for Region 5 for the 2010 DEMHS grant, and to authorize its chair to enter in to any contracts and MOUs related to the grant.

b. Traffic Diversion Plan Exercise: Hotwash Evaluation — Virginia Mason said participating towns found the exercise useful. Additionally, a desire for web based training has been identified, and a web EOC training event will take place in June. Further details will follow.

7. Regional Business

There was no regional business.

8. Other

a. RPC Operating Procedures — Peter Dorpalen explained the proposed RPC operating procedures seek to balance the need for RPC review against the need for quick action and the incidence of many routine referrals. The importance of the RPC comes into play with proposals referred to COGCNV for review and comment or referred for support, where conformity with regional plans is uncertain or there is a perceived conflict. The proposed operating procedure changes would result in corresponding changes to the COGCNV bylaws. On a motion by Bob Chatfield, seconded by Susan Cable, it was unanimously

VOTED: To approve the changes to the RPC operating procedures and to consider the COGCNV bylaws changes (which require two meetings) at a future meeting.

b. Bethlehem Small Cities Application - North Purchase Housing Rehabilitation — Virginia Mason explained that Bethlehem is seeking endorsement of its small cities application. On a motion by Bob Chatfield, seconded by Bill Davis, it was unanimously

VOTED: To endorse Bethlehem's small cities application - North Purchase Housing Rehabilitation.

On a motion by Bob Chatfield, seconded by Susan Cable, it was unanimously

VOTED: To add Item 8b1. - Naugatuck Valley Health Department Lead Program and Item 8b2. - Naugatuck River Valley National Heritage Area Study Bill to the agenda.

b1. Naugatuck Valley Health Department Lead Program — Virginia Mason said Naugatuck is seeking endorsement to continue this existing program. On a motion by Susan Cable, seconded by Tom Gormley, it was unanimously

VOTED: To endorse the Naugatuck Valley Health Department Lead Program.

b2. Naugatuck River Valley National Heritage Area Study Bill — Peter Dorpalen said the Greater Valley Chamber of Commerce is requesting COGCNV support for a Naugatuck River Valley National Heritage Study bill, introduced by Congresswoman Rosa DeLauro and encompassing the 14 municipalities along the Naugatuck River. The bill emphasizes the river's heritage as a center of brass, clock-making, and rubber. On a motion by Susan Cable, seconded by Jerry Sitko, it was unanimously

VOTED: To support the Naugatuck River Valley National Heritage Area Study Bill.

c. Upcoming Events

- i. Five Town Naugatuck River Greenway Cleanup Samuel Gold said this event will take place on May 14.
- ii. CRRA Electronics Recycling Event Samuel Gold said the event will take place on May 21 at the Watertown CRRA facility. It will also include paper shredding.
- iii. Regional Housing Forum Virginia Mason said the May 26 forum in Waterbury is being sponsored with the Partnership for Strong Communities. It is the first of several housing forums to be held around the state.





5. Points of Interest / Local Activities

Waterbury — Jeff Green reported that:

- The City adopted new zoning regulations based on the 2005 city plan of conservation and development.
- The Waterbury Housing Assistance Program has been resurrected. It is in ownership of several properties and has some funding that the City is looking to spend.
- · Cherry Street Industrial Park deconstruction project is moving forward. Some of the

materials will be reused.

- The Harper Leader property on South Main Street and the PAL Park in the north end both are moving forward towards demolition.
- The Chase Avenue widening project and some of the homes that were taken are being demolished.
- Cooke Street sidewalk project has started.
- The Rev. Reed School construction project has begun in the North End.
- The façade improvement program has started up again in downtown and has branched out into the Brooklyn neighborhood.

Watertown — Rosalie Loughran reported that:

- The charter revision commission is wrapping up five months of work. A draft will be ready for the town council by June. The last charter revision was since 1984.
- A walking trail has been completed around Echo Lake by a developer.

Ruth Mulcahy reported that:

- Planning and zoning has been very busy. The commission is considering an amendment to the zoning regulations to allow a developer to build 62 homes where only 30 are now allowed.
- An application for a Hyundai dealership at the site of the old State Dairy is under review
 with the wetlands commission. The State Dairy site has been vacant for at least 40
 years.
- Two areas have been identified for incentive housing zones.
- A commercial project is in the preliminary process on Main St.
- Four new businesses are seeking permits to open in town.
- A number of first cuts and subdivisions are in process and the lots created are selling.

Southbury — Harmon Andrews reported that:

- Route 188 in the vicinity of I-84, Exit 16, needs to be widened in order for the area to develop but neither the town nor state has the money.
- Southbury is still looking for guidance on columbariums.

Beacon Falls — Rich Minnich reported that:

- The Region 16 school budget was approved.
- Town budget is still in the planning stage. It was rejected once.
- A new plan of conservation and development is being worked on.
- The inland wetlands commission is updating its regulations. A public hearing is expected in June.
- Completed the river race.

Oxford — Herman Schuler reported that:

• Had difficulty with STC certificate around I-84, Exit 16 that requires widening of the intersection.

- Approved a 10,000 sq. ft. addition to the brewery in town.
- Approved a 30,000 sq. ft. in Fox Hollow machining company.
- Started construction of the 800 feet of road that straightens out Jacks Hill Road from the golf community to Christian Street.
- Grayhill Road reconstruction of one mile was approved by town Finance Board.
- Airport project may start in June.
- Technology Park is in limbo because of the death of a principal in the project.

Thomaston — Robert Flanagan reported that:

• Planning and Zoning Commission is reviewing home occupation regulations.

Middlebury — Ken Long reported that:

- The first six houses in Triangle Hills have been demolished.
- Long Meadow Bridge is close until the reconstruction project is completed.

6. Other

- a. Bus Route Study and Route Proposals Sam Gold reported that the Regional Bus Ridership Study is almost complete and will be presented at the next RPC meeting.
- b. Regional Gridlock II Functional Exercise Virginia Mason reported on the April exercise. The exercise was successful in testing the new traffic diversion plan and emergency responses to the hypothetical shut-down of the I-84 and Route 8 interchange in Waterbury
- c. Virginia Mason reported that on May 26, 8:30 to 10 AM, at Waterbury City Hall, the Partnership for Strong Communities and COGCNV is sponsoring workforce housing event.
- d. Virginia Mason reported that on May 14 at 8:30 AM the Connecticut Land Use Academy is holding a one day introduction to land use course at the University of Connecticut in Storrs.
- e. Sam Gold reported that on May 14 from 8:30 to 11:30 AM the COGCNV and towns are sponsoring a Naugatuck River Greenway River Cleanup of the Naugatuck River and Steele Brook. There will be locations in each of the five CNVR towns along the Naugatuck. Frankie's on Chase Ave. has donated lunch to all the volunteers.
- f. Sam Gold reported that on May 21 CRRA will be holding an electronics and paper shredding event in Watertown at their facility. The event is free and open to residents of CRRA municipalities.



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

1. Pledge of Allegiance, Roll Call, Public Comment

Chairman Tom Dunn called the meeting to order at 12:07 p.m. Those present recited the Pledge of Allegiance and the roll was called. There was no public comment.

2. Administrative Items

a. Minutes of the March 11, 2011 Meeting — On a motion by Ed Mone, seconded by Mary Ann Drayton-Rogers, it was unanimously

VOTED: To approve the minutes of the March 11, 2011 COGCNV meeting.

b. Financial Report — Peter Dorpalen reported that as of March 31, 2011, COGCNV was 75% through the fiscal year and had expended 65% of its operating budget. Including pass-through funds, 62% of the total budget has been expended. On a motion by Bob Chatfield, seconded by Tom Gormley, it was unanimously

VOTED: To approve the financial report.

Correspondence — Peter Dorpalen summarized recent correspondence:

March 15, 2011	Letter to North East Transportation stating that COGCNV voted to support extending bus service to Rte 63 and Park Rd in Middlebury, but noting that there are operational issues that will have to be overcome
March 15, 2011	Letter to Thomaston First Selectman in support of Thomaston's Small Cities Block Grant application to fund housing rehabilitation
March 21, 2011	Letter from Joe Perrelli transmitting a CD with the COGCNV- approved I-84 traffic diversion plan to local emergency management officials
March 21, 2011	Memorandum from Mark Berube to CTDOT on the use of commuter parking lots in 2010
March 25, 2011	Email from Sam Gold reporting that CTDOT will support evening bus service for the Waterbury service area
March 25, 2011	Email to COG, RPC, and municipal planners with preliminary data and findings from the 2010 US Census
March 31, 2011	Letters to public works directors from Joe Perrelli requesting road data for selected local road segments for a federal evaluation of roads in the US.

3. Transportation Improvement Program Amendments

Joe Perrelli summarized the April 2011 amendments to the 2010-2013 Transportation Improvement Program, as outlined in Memorandum 040111TIP-REVISED. On a motion by Bob Chatfield, seconded by Ed Mone, it was unanimously

VOTED: To approve the April 2011 amendments to the 2010-2013 Transportation Improvement Program listed in Memorandum 040111TIP-REVISED.

4. Siting Cell Towers and Wind Generators

Linda Roberts, Executive Director of the CT Siting Council, gave a presentation that included the history of the Council, its make up, mission, jurisdiction, and responsibilities. She also spoke about the application process, decision-making criteria, and final reviews and decisions.

Tom Gormley, Tom Dunn, and Bob Chatfield commented on Siting Council procedures. Kathy McNamara had questions concerning economic impacts.

5. Emergency Planning

- a. Emergency Shelters Natalie Dos Santos, Senior Director of Area 5 Emergency Services for the American Red Cross, discussed the four different sheltering options available for local governments to fulfill their legislated responsibility to protect the health, welfare, and safety of their residents. The Red Cross will assist with or manage sheltering options other than the independently managed model. She spoke about key shelter tasks, staff and facility needs, equipment needs; and she provided local contact information for the American Red Cross.
- b. Rescheduled Traffic Diversion Plan Exercise Virginia Mason said the exercise will take place on April 15. Controller/Evaluators will arrive in each town's emergency operations center at approximately 8 a.m. The exercise should be complete by 11:30. A debriefing will follow at the Middlebury Fire House.
- c. Airport Crash Plan In lieu of Tom Vannini, who was unable to attend, Virginia Mason asked the towns in attendance that will be affected by the airport crash plan to sign off on an agreement to put a section concerning it in their town plans, and ensure the town's emergency management people have a copy of it.

Additionally, Virginia has a list of towns that are not participating in the emergency planning program grant. Towns may contact her or Tom Vannini to get started on obtaining funds from the grant.

6. Regional Business

- a. Police Communications Chief Richard Guisti of the Middlebury Police Department spoke about regionalization and consolidation of 911 systems. The state recently passed legislation to reduce the number of public safety call centers (police, fire, and ambulance) from 109 to no more than 60. A study by a state hired consultant is currently being conducted in order to determine how best to consolidate. Chief Guisti discussed some questions and concerns that have been raised by police officers and dispatchers concerning the consolidation.
- b. Regional Planning Legislation Peter Dorpalen discussed a provision within House Bill 5782, an Act Concerning the Hotel Tax, that would redraw the boundaries of regional planning organizations (RPOs) such as COGCNV to match designated economic development districts. The legislation would consolidate the existing fifteen RPOs into eight regions along the lines of the yet-to-be formed EDDs. Presently, OPM is conducting a statewide RPO boundary study (as directed by the state legislature). The proposed bill would circumvent this careful, comprehensive analysis of regional planning boundaries. Mr. Dorpalen said the RPO legislation within the bill is not well thought out, and legislation of this significance should not be buried within a hotel tax bill.

During a discussion by COG members on the bill, Bob Mezzo stated that the proposed consolidation would benefit Naugatuck.

Following discussion, on a motion by Tom Gormley, seconded by Ed Mone, with Bob Mezzo, opposing, it was

VOTED: To oppose the provision regarding RPO redesignation as proposed within House Bill 5782, An Act Concerning the Hotel Tax. COGCNV does support the statewide RPO boundary study being conducted by OPM and encourages transparency and municipal input for the process.

c. Municipal Recreational Liability Legislation — Peter Dorpalen said the legislation seems to be moving forward, having gone through three different committees, and may go to the floor for a vote.

7. Other

- a. Regional Transportation Plan Peter Dorpalen stated that the Regional Transportation Plan is a key document covering, over the long term, highway and transit issues and needs. Meetings have been held with the RPC, public works directors, and town planners. A 30 day public review process is now starting. A revised plan for COGCNV review and action is anticipated for the next meeting.
- b. Annual Report Joe Perrelli said the 2010 COGCNV Annual Report has been finalized and is in the process of being mailed.
- c. Watertown Small Cities Application Virginia Mason said Watertown has requested COGCNV endorsement of its grant request to continue its rehabilitation program. On a motion by Tom Gormley, seconded by Bob Mezzo, it was unanimously

VOTED: To endorse Watertown's grant request to continue its rehabilitation program.

- d. Naugatuck River Clean-Up Sam Gold said a regional Naugatuck River clean-up day will take place on May 14.
- e. CRRA Mid-Connecticut Project Paul Nonnenmacher of CRRA said Senate Bill 1167 would take the mid-Connecticut trash-to-energy plant from CRRA and assign it to an unspecified public entity. On a motion by Bill Davis, seconded by Susan Cable, it was unanimously

VOTED: To write a letter to the state legislature opposing Senate Bill 1167 that would remove management of the mid-Connecticut trash-to-energy plant from CRRA and assign it to an unspecified public entity.

f. *Middlebury Enterprise Zone* — Tom Gormley said Middlebury is trying to move forward on an enterprise zone that would benefit Oxford, Southbury, and Middlebury. He asks for general support of the endeavor, which he believes will benefit the entire region.

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

1. Pledge of Allegiance, Roll Call, Public Comment

Chairman Tom Dunn called the meeting to order at 12:10 p.m. Those present recited the Pledge of Allegiance and the roll was called. There was no public comment.

2. Administrative Items

a. Minutes of the February 11, 2011 Meeting — On a motion by Bill Davis, seconded by Mary Ann Drayton-Rogers, it was unanimously

VOTED: To approve the minutes of the February 11, 2011 COGCNV meeting.

b. Financial Report — Peter Dorpalen reported that as of February 28, 2011, COGCNV was 67% through the fiscal year and had expended 58% of its operating budget. Including pass-through funds, 45% of the total budget has been expended. On a motion by Mary Ann Drayton-Rogers, seconded by Jeff Hamel, it was unanimously

VOTED: To approve the financial report.

4. Transportation Activities

Transportation Improvement Program Amendments – Joe Perrelli summarized the March 2011 amendments to the 2010-2013 Transportation Improvement Program, as outlined in Memorandum 030411TIP. On a motion by Tom Gormley, seconded by Jeff Hamel, it was unanimously

VOTED: To approve the March 2011 amendments to the 2010-2013 Transportation Improvement Program listed in Memorandum 030411TIP.

b. Air Quality Conformity Determination – New Haven, Route 34 – Joe Perrelli said the State completed a new air conformity model for the Route 34 project in New Haven. It was necessary to update the particulate matter analysis and the ozone conformity analysis. This information is also used in the Long Range Regional Transportation Plan 2007-2035. On a motion by Tom Gormley, seconded by Bill Davis, it was unanimously

VOTED: Resolution on Conformity with the Clean Air Act - PM 2.5

WHEREAS,

the Council of Governments of the Central Naugatuck Valley is required to submit an Air Quality Conformity Statement to the US Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) and to the US Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) in accordance with the final conformity rule promulgated by EPA (40 CFR 51 and 93) when adopting an annual Transportation Improvement Program or when effecting a significant revision of the Region's Transportation Plan; and

WHEREAS,

Title 42, Section 7506 (3) (A) states that conformity of transportation plans and programs will be demonstrated if:

- the plans and programs are consistent with recent estimates of mobile source emissions;
- 2. the plans and programs provide for the expeditious implementation of certain transportation control measures;
- 3. the plans and programs contribute to annual emissions reductions consistent with the Clean Air Act of 1977, as amended; and

WHEREAS,

It is the opinion of the Council of Governments of the Central Naugatuck Valley that the plans and programs approved in March 2011 and submitted to FHWA and EPA conform to the requirements of Title 42, Section 7506 (3) (A) as interpreted by EPA (40 CFR 51 and 93); and

WHEREAS,

The New York – Northern New Jersey – Long Island, NY-NJ-CT area is designated a PM 2.5 Nonattainment area; and

WHEREAS,

The State of Connecticut has elected to jointly assess conformity in all PM 2.5 nonattainment areas in Connecticut (Fairfield County and New Haven County); and

WHEREAS,

The results of the required emissions analysis performed by the Connecticut Department of Transportation on the Long Range Regional Transportation Plan 2007-2035 and the Transportation Improvement Program: 2010-2013 show that the implementation of the projects contained therein will result in emissions of PM 2.5 in each analysis year that are less that the emissions of the baseline year as stated in the Connecticut Department of Transportation PM 2.5 Air Quality Conformity Determination of the 2007 Regional Transportation Plans and the 2010-2013 Transportation Improvement Programs for the Connecticut portion of the NY-NJ-CT PM 2.5 Nonattainment Area, January 2011.

Now, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED,

That the Council of Governments of the Central Naugatuck Valley finds that the Long Range Regional Transportation Plan 2007-2035 and the Transportation Improvement Program: 2010-2013 conform to air quality requirements of the U.S. Environmental Protection Administration (40 CFR 51 and 93), related U.S. Department of Transportation guidelines (23 CFR 450) and with Title 42, Section 7506 (3) (A) and hereby approves the existing January 2011 PM2.5 Conformity Determination contingent upon no major adverse comments were received during said period.

VOTED: Resolution on Conformity with the Clean Air Act - Ozone

WHEREAS.

the Council of Governments of the Central Naugatuck Valley is required to submit an Air Quality Conformity Statement to the US Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) and to the US Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) in accordance with the final conformity rule promulgated by EPA (40 CFR 51 and 93) when adopting an annual Transportation Improvement Program or when effecting a significant revision of the Region's Transportation Plan; and

the Connecticut portion of the New York - Northern New Jersey - Long Island Nonattainment area (Fairfield, New Haven and Middlesex counties) and the Greater Connecticut area (Hartford, New London, Tolland, Windham and Litchfield counties) have been designated as Moderate Nonattainment areas and the Connecticut Department of Transportation has jointly assessed the impact of all transportation plans and programs in these Nonattainment areas (Ozone Air Quality Conformity Report January 2011); and

WHEREAS,

the results of the required emissions analysis performed by the Connecticut Department of Transportation on the Long Range Regional Transportation Plan 2007-2035 and the Transportation Improvement Program: 2010-2013 show that the implementation of the projects contained therein will result in emissions of ozone in each analysis year that are less that the emissions of the baseline year as stated in the Connecticut Department of Transportation Ozone Air Quality Conformity Determination of the 2007 Regional Transportation Plans and the 2010-2013 Transportation Improvement Programs for the Connecticut portion of the New York - Northern New Jersey - Long Island, NY-NJ-CT Ozone Nonattainment Area and the Greater Connecticut Ozone Nonattainment Area.

Now, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED,

That the Council of Governments of the Central Naugatuck Valley finds that the Long Range Regional Transportation Plan 2007-2035 and the Transportation Improvement Program: 2010-2013 (TIP) conform to air quality requirements of the U.S. Environmental Protection Administration (40 CFR 51 and 93), related U.S. Department of Transportation guidelines (23 CFR 450) and with Title 42, Section 7506 (3) (A) and hereby approves the existing January 2011 Ozone Air Quality Conformity Determination contingent upon no major adverse comments were received during said period.

5. Goals and Initiatives for Municipalities

Kevin Lembo, Connecticut State Comptroller, spoke about the State's pharmaceutical initiative, which authorizes the Office of the State Comptroller (OSC) to administer a joint prescription program called the CT Prescription Partnership. The partnership enables towns and cities to join the state's self-insured pharmacy benefit program and achieve savings by harnessing the state's purchasing power.

Comptroller Lembo also discussed the Electronic Fund Transfer (EFT) initiative as an effective and efficient payment method to ensure state funds are promptly and directly deposited into a municipal checking or savings account to avoid mailing and handling delays.

Also, in 2005, in order to guarantee that businesses pay their quarterly taxes, the federal government passed a law that will require the state and large municipalities to withhold 3% of vendor payments. Comptroller Lembo stated that he objects to this, as some vendors, for a variety of reasons, may not owe taxes, and would need to wait until the end of the year to get the money back. Also, some vendors may build an extra 3% into their bids to cover the withholding. Mr. Lembo said he contacted the delegation concerning this and has received positive feedback. He invited COGCNV members to also contact their delegation.

6. Airport Crash Plan

In lieu of Tom Vannini, who was unable to attend, Virginia Mason said the Waterbury-Oxford Airport plane crash plan needs to be signed off on by the towns affected by it. Details will follow.

7. Regional Business

Tom Dunn reported on the meeting that Susan Cable and he had with Governor Malloy. Budget and revenue issues were topics of discussion.

Sam Gold said he has been working with the City of Waterbury and Naugatuck Valley Community College on a proposal for evening bus service in Waterbury. Surveys done by the college and bus company have shown a strong demand for evening bus service. As full state funding is unlikely at this point, other sources of raising monies for evening bus service are being explored.

Sam reported the Naugatuck River Regional Greenway Committee is organizing a five town Naugatuck River Greenway clean up day scheduled for Saturday, May 14.

Virginia Mason was contacted by Lou Mangini of Congresswoman Rosa DeLauro's office who said he is working with FEMA concerning disaster funds for the snow and storm cost roof collapses. There will be funds in excess of damage payments available to towns with pre-disaster mitigation plans, as all CNVR towns have.

8. Other

Virginia Mason said COGCNV received a request for endorsement from Thomaston for its small cities grant, and a request from Oxford for endorsement of its STEAP application. On a motion by Terry Caldarone, seconded by Bob Mezzo, it was unanimously

VOTED: To write COGCNV letters of support for Thomaston's small cities grant and Oxford's STEAP application.

Peter Dorpalen noted that the 2010 census figures were recently released. The region as a whole is growing faster than it did a decade ago, and at a faster rate than the state. Suburban towns are growing at a slower rate than they did in the past, while Waterbury, which lost population in the 1990's, has now gained population. Oxford is the fastest growing community, followed by Middlebury and Beacon Falls. Staff will provide further information in the weeks to come.

Tom Gormley reported that he and other officials met with legislators recently about developing an enterprise zone for Oxford, Southbury, and Middlebury.

Mr. Gormley also said Middlebury is in the process of trying to develop the former Timex headquarters building and is looking for COGCNV support to have bus service brought to the site. On a motion by Jeff Hamel, seconded by Ed Mone, it was unanimously

VOTED: To add to the agenda Middlebury's request for a COGCNV letter of support for bus service to the old Timex building.

Peter Dorpalen suggested that the proposal be analyzed to determine the feasibility of service to the site. Sam Gold offered to work with the bus company to assess options and feasibility.

On a motion by Bob Mezzo, seconded by Ed Mone, it was unanimously

VOTED: To write a COGCNV letter of support for bus service to the former Timex facility.

Sam Gold said electronics recycling events are scheduled for May and September. He mentioned that since town-by-town recycling has now been implemented, these events may not be relevant in the future.

Ed Mone spoke about elimination of the Manufacturing, Machinery & Equipment (MME) program. He testified in Hartford about the impact this would have on Thomaston. He suggested that other towns affected by the MM&E contact their state representatives.

9. Adjournment

At 1 p.m., on a motion by Mary Ann Drayton-Rogers, seconded by Tom Gormley, it was unanimously

VOTED: To adjourn the meeting.

The meeting opened at 7:06 P.M. with the reciting of the Pledge of Allegiance. RPC representatives, presenters, and staff introduced themselves.

3. Transportation Planning

- a. Regional Transportation Plan Update An overview of the draft Long Range Transportation Plan was presented by COGCNV staff. The draft plan can be found on the COGCNV website www.cogcnv.org/draftLRTP.html. Questions and discussion followed the presentation concerning taxi service and transportation issues related to the growing elderly population in the region.
- b. Traffic Diversion Plan for I-84, Route 8, and Route 7 Joe Perrelli discussed the plan, designed to divert traffic onto arterial routes when a major incident closes down part of an expressway. The plan covers Route 8 from Beacon Falls to Torrington, I-84 from the New York state line to Cheshire, and the expressway portion of Route 7. The objective is to shorten response times and achieve lane clearance with the greatest possible speed, efficiency, and coordination. The plan can be found on the COGCNV website www.cogcnv.org/diversionplan.html.

Virginia Mason added that a functional exercise to try out the plans in the Central Naugatuck Valley is scheduled for March 15.

c. Evening Bus Service – Sam Gold said he has been working with the City of Waterbury and Naugatuck Valley Community College on a proposal for evening bus service in Waterbury. NVCC is adding evening classes to accommodate increased demand, and surveys have shown a strong need for evening bus service among students. This service was planned for funding in 2008, but was later rescinded by the governor in order to cut costs. As full state funding is unlikely at this point, other sources of raising monies for evening bus service are being explored. There was an article in the Republican-American about the evening bus service.

4. Regional Planning Commission Operating Procedures

Peter Dorpalen discussed the draft RPC operating procedures. While drafting the new document, other RPOs were polled to compare their procedures for handling referrals. Some RPAs will review every referral that comes in, while others turn them over to their respective COG. Jim Sequin recommended that staff reports in response to referrals be clearly labeled as "Staff" reports. Reports that are said to come from the RPC should be approved by at least 50% of the members.

Staff will get an advisory opinion from the FOI commission and a land use attorney on reporting requirements if RPC members want to discuss a referral via email or telephone.

Staff will continue using the new process that was developed and see how it works out.

Virginia Mason reported there will be a workshop on March 24 on the new *State Plan of Conservation and Development* at Veterans Memorial Hall in Waterbury City Hall.

5. Points of Interest / Local Activities

Waterbury — James Sequin reported that:

Waterbury's land use regulations are being revised. The zoning regulations should be
adopted at the end of March. Mr. Sequin asked the other RPC members about the
public hearing notice requirements in their towns, since Waterbury is interested in
updating its requirements. Most reported using 500 feet as the requirement for
notifying abutters and having the applicant present certified return receipts as proof of
mailing.

Naugatuck — Joe McEvoy reported that:

- The borough is looking to revise its charter.
- The former Peter Paul factory is almost completely demolished. No one seems to know what will occupy that space.
- Walmart on New Haven Road will be expanding to become a Super Walmart. Accidents
 on Route 63 are already a serious issue from the Route 8 NB offramp out to the Bethany
 town line. Increased traffic on New Haven Road will only add to the problem.

Southbury — Nancy Clark and Harmon Andrews reported that:

- The town is updating its plan of conservation and development. Planimetrics was selected to work on the plan, which is expected to be complete in 2012.
- A subcommittee was created to draft outdoor lighting regulations. The regulations are now in draft form. There will be a public hearing, and the regulations should be adopted by the end of March.
- Borders is leaving town. The store is an anchor in the Southbury Plaza.
- There was a fire in town at a commercial plaza on Main Street South, which has led to concerns about whether buildings have sufficient protections to control the spread of fires. The plaza's owner brought in trailers to keep businesses running in the interim.
- Southbury Training School applied for a conservation easement for 900 of 1,400 acres so
 it can remain in agricultural use. The State should have a plan in place for the 14
 buildings at the school. STS is the largest land area in all of Southbury. The State
 provided funding to Heritage Water Company to provide sewer service to STS.
- The EDC stepped up and explored all vacancies in town. They are looking to get business moving again.
- A local church has started building a columbarium. They feel that it is allowed under regulations as a "wall." Mr. Andrews asked if any towns had experience with drafting regulations for columbaria.

Oxford — Herman Schuler reported that:

- There have been a number of accidents on Route 67.
- The Planning & Zoning Commission will be discussing legal challenges in town, regarding a propane tank proposal, a Sec. 830(g) affordable housing proposal, manufactured homes near the airport, and the development of a medical building.

Thomaston — Robert Flanagan reported that:

- Budget season has been especially difficult.
- Things have been quiet in terms of land use.
- The Opera House has closed down.

Watertown — Rosalie Loughran reported that:

- The town has formed a Charter Revision Commission. This is the first update since 1984.
 There was controversy at the public hearing around having planning & zoning board members elected. They are currently appointed.
- The proposed medical building on Buckingham Street (Route 262) is not moving forward.
- The town is planning for another tough budget season.

Middlebury — Ken Long reported that:

- The bridge project on Long Meadow Road is expected to be complete in April. Construction was on hold through the winter.
- The Route 188 commercial district near I-84, Exit 16 is all set. The project is ready-to-go with all of the approvals in place. It will include a gas station and car wash.
- The plan of conservation and development is being reviewed by the Miller, Turner Group. They are mainly looking at regulations for commercial areas. Some planning and zoning board members are concerned about a proposal for a mixed-use zone in town.
- The town is undergoing its revaluation now.
- The voluntary acquisition of properties in the Triangle Hills neighborhood has begun.
- Long Meadow Pond has seen a buildup of gases over the winter, because of ice.
 Residents in the area have complained about the smell. CT DEP came and examined the pond. They reported that the odor (H₂S) is causing by decaying vegetation trapped under the ice. This problem occurs in other wetlands around town.

6. Other

- a. Sustainable Communities Virginia Mason reported that staff applied for the grant in cooperation with the City of Waterbury, but didn't get it.
- b. Regional Gridlock II Exercise Virginia Mason reported that the functional exercise will be held next Friday. CNVR towns will open up their emergency operations centers (EOC) to confront a regional gridlock problem. They will all gather to go through a "hot wash" prior to the COGCNV meeting at Middlebury Firehouse.
- c. CT Community Foundation and Rivers Alliance Sam Gold reported on the Naugatuck River forum held by the CCF and Rivers Alliance last Thursday. At the forum, he presented the greenway proposals along the corridor.

5. Regional Housing Forum

David Fink said the Partnership for Strong Communities received a grant in conjunction with the Connecticut Association of Realtors that will allow them to hold housing and housing market forums in each of the 15 state regions. These forums will allow home builders, realtors, planners, and municipal officials to discuss housing options with input from regional economists and other experts. The goal is to offer information, contacts, and other resources to municipalities that want to create additional housing options for their residents, and to come to a common understanding of what workforce housing is and isn't. Mr. Fink would like feedback from the chief elected officials as to preferred time of day for these forums.

5a. Drought Issues

James Belden of the Pomperaug River Watershed Coalition spoke about the Coalition's drought related work. Prioritizing water needs is a key element in the water planning process. The availability of water depends on what is considered an acceptable cost for obtaining it, and includes factors such as environmental damage, rate increases, and infrastructure changes. Emergency management and human health are at the top of the priorities for water resource management. At three times in 10 years, the region has had low water conditions where, most likely, habitat could not recover, at least in the near future. The passage of municipal ordinances, as Southbury has done, allows the town to prepare for water scarcity and minimize drought emergencies. Mr. Belden stated that more information could be obtained at www.pomperaug.org.

6. Regional Hazardous Waste Program Update

a. Renewal of HHW Vendor Contract — Joe Perrelli said COGCNV entered into a contract in 2010 with Care Environmental Services for household hazardous waste (HHW) collection. The HHW program provides three HHW drop-off events each year. The contract included two one-year renewals, 2011 being the first year. The Central Naugatuck Valley HHW Committee met on January 14, 2011 and recommended renewing the contract with Care Environmental Services for 2011. On a motion by Mary Ann Drayton-Rogers, seconded by Roy Cavanaugh, it was unanimously

VOTED: To renew the household hazardous waste contract with Care Environmental Services for 2011.

b. Support for CT Product Stewardship Paint Initiative — Joe Perrelli explained that the Connecticut Product Stewardship Council is seeking support for legislation creating a paint product stewardship program in Connecticut. Paint disposal is the largest household hazardous waste expense for towns, and the paint initiative will significantly reduce these costs by holding producers responsible for the end-of-life costs of managing their products. VOTED: To authorize Chairman Thomas G. Dunn to sign a letter of support for the CT Product Stewardship Paint Initiative.

1. Pledge of Allegiance, Roll Call, Public Comment

Vice Chairman Susan Cable called the meeting to order at 12:06 p.m. Those present recited the Pledge of Allegiance and the roll was called. There was no public comment.

2. Administrative Items

a. Minutes of the November 19, 2010 Meeting — On a motion by Tom Gormley, seconded by Gerald Stomski, it was unanimously

VOTED: To approve the minutes of the November 19, 2010 COGCNV meeting.

b. Financial Report — Peter Dorpalen reported that as of November 30, 2010, COGCNV was 42% through the fiscal year and had expended 37% of its operating budget. Including pass-through funds, 25% of the total budget has been expended. On a motion by Gerald Stomski, seconded by Mary Ann Drayton-Rogers, it was unanimously

VOTED: To approve the financial report.

c. FY2011-12 COGCNV Municipal Dues — Peter Dorpalen said dues have not changed in four years; he recommended the rate remain at 42.7¢ per capita, adjusted to the 2009 population estimates from the Department of Public Health. On a motion by Tom Gormley, seconded by Gerald Stomski, it was unanimously VOTED: To approve the December 2010 amendments to the 2010-2013 Transportation Improvement Program listed in Memorandum 121010TIP.

4. Legislative Discussion with State Representative Craig Miner

State Representative Craig Miner discussed the State budget and funding at the local level. Other points of interest included reducing the size and cost of government, controlling spending and taxes, and the possibility of new revenue streams. Liability protection for municipalities for the recreational use of public land was also discussed, as was the Freedom of Information Act, public notices, regionalization efforts, and shared services.

5. Naugatuck River Greenway Routing Study Final Report

Sam Gold gave a presentation on the completed Naugatuck River Routing Study and discussed next steps in implementing the recommendations. He reported that on September 14, 2010, the Regional Planning Commission unanimously voted "To strongly recommend the Regional Naugatuck River Greenway Routing Study to COG for approval." Tom Gormley noted that towns on the Naugatuck River Greenway should keep in mind the costs associated with maintaining their portions. Ed Mone commended Sam Gold of COGCNV and Phil Goff of Alta Planning + Design for their work on the project. On a motion by Tom Gormley, seconded by Ed Mone, it was unanimously

VOTED: To approve the Regional Naugatuck River Greenway Routing Study.

6. Emergency Planning

Due to the absence of Virginia Mason, there were no updates on this agenda topic.

7. Regional Business

Peter Dorpalen discussed the position paper for recreational liability protection for municipalities, as supported by the coalition led by the Connecticut Forest and Park Association and other groups. A possible next step would be to have individual municipalities support the position paper.

8. Other

Peter Dorpalen spoke about COGCNV's legislative agenda. From past discussions, the consensus was to focus on key items such as maintaining municipal funding, unfunded mandates, and the municipal recreational liability issue. Susan Cable suggested adding streamlining the passing of the state budget, in order to expedite passing of municipal budgets. It was agreed that Peter Dorpalen would prepare a draft COGCNV legislative agenda to be forwarded to the CEOs for input and approval. It was agreed that any reduction in funding at the state level would result in an increase in taxation at the local level. It was suggested that COGCNV members make an appointment with their legislators and present the group's legislative agenda. Members will report back with updates.

Joe Perrelli gave an update on the I-84 and Rtes. 7 & 8 Traffic Diversion Plan. The consultant, Wilbur Smith & Associates, completed exit-to-exit diversion maps to cover each corridor. Preliminary maps went out to all towns in each corridor for feedback. Revised maps were created based on comments received. The Technical Advisory Committee met to review the preliminary maps and diversion plan report. The draft final report is now being reviewed. Procedures and protocol will be included in the final report, which will be released in January.

3. Public Meeting - Regional Naugatuck River Greenway Routing Study

Sam Gold presented the draft Regional Naugatuck River Greenway Routing Study to the RPC and members of the public. The purpose of the study was to identify a feasible routing for the Naugatuck River Greenway trail through Thomaston, Watertown, Naugatuck, and Beacon Falls, connecting to the trail route already identified in Waterbury. Cost estimates and phasing recommendations were also presented in the study. Gold gave an overview of the recommended route and showed examples of design approaches that the study recommends in response to various constraints along the greenway corridor. Next steps in the greenway project were also presented. Members of the public commented on the proposed greenway trail. One member of the public suggested that a natural trail surface be used and that the aesthetics of the trail be considered.

4. Administrative Items

a. Approval of May 4, 2010 Minutes — On a motion by Richard Minnich, seconded by Ken Long, it was unanimously

VOTED: To approve the minutes of the May 4, 2010 meeting.

b. Correspondence — Peter Dorpalen summarized recent correspondence:

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September 9, 2010

Email from CARPO Chair announcing a RPO meeting to discuss the upcoming OPM analysis of planning region boundaries with CCM and COST on September 21, 2010.

5. Naugatuck Municipal Development Plan - Conformance with Regional Plan

Richard Harrall of Milone and MacBroom and David Prendergast of the Naugatuck Economic Development Corporation presented the Renaissance Place Development Plan to the RPC. On a motion by Jim Seguin, seconded by Gill Graveline, it was unanimously

VOTED: The Regional Planning Commission recognizes the that Renaissance Place lies within the regional core of Waterbury, Watertown, and Naugatuck and that the Renaissance Place Municipal Development Plan is in accordance with the COGCNV 2008 Regional Plan of Conservation and Development as it links railroad, pedestrian and vehicular transportation with mixed use development.

6. Sustainable Communities Regional Planning Grant Application

Virginia Mason reported that COG submitted an application for a HUD Sustainable Communities Regional Planning Grant. If successful, the grant would fund a regional economic strategic plan, regional housing assessment plan, and a demographic analysis including new population projections. Leveraging of other funds or in-kind services is required for the grant. COG more than fulfilled the required minimum amount of leveraging with staff and collaboration partner time.

7. Transportation Planning

a. Regional Naugatuck River Greenway Routing Study – On a motion by Robert Flanagan, seconded by Jim Seguin, it was unanimously

VOTED: To strongly recommend the Regional Naugatuck River Greenway Routing Study to COG for approval.

- b. Traffic Diversion Plan for I-84, Route 8, and Route 7 Peter Dorpalen reported that Wilbur Smith Associates was preparing the Traffic Diversion Plan.
- c. Regional Transportation Plan Update Peter Dorpalen reported that COG has started work on an update to the regional transportation plan. A draft plan is due to CTDOT in mid-January 2011.

8. Regional Planning Commission Operating Procedures

Peter Dorpalen reviewed a memomorandum outlining draft RPC operating procedures, including the role of the RPC and COGCNV staff in the statutory referral process. Sending referrals to RPC commissioners via email was discussed. The RPC could then comment on the draft staff referral. Absence of commissioner responses would be considered approval.

9. Proposed Consolidation of Water Utility Coordination Committees (WUCC)
Virginia Mason presented the proposed consolidation of WUCCs. Several alternatives have

been proposed such as total consolidation and alignment along drainage basin boundaries. Staff recommends that WUCCs be aligned by drainage basins (Housatonic, Connecticut, and Thames River basins). Mason will be recommended to COGCNV as the region's official representative to the WUCCs.

10. Points of Interest / Local Activities

RPC representatives discussed recent developments and issues in their municipalities.

11. Other

a. Woodbury Water Contamination

Virginia Mason presented on the issue of contamination in the Woodbury Middle Quarter and the new threat it now poses to public drinking water. COGCNV has been asked by the Town of Woodbury and the Pomperaug Watershed Coalition to join a taskforce to address this issue. On a motion by Ken Long, seconded by Cathe Sherman, it was unanimously

VOTED: To support the efforts of the task force created by the Town of Woodbury and Pomperaug River Watershed Coalition to ensure available portable water for present and future citizens.

b. Change in Forest Cover Maps

Virginia Mason distributed maps created by Glenda Prentiss showing changes in forest and agricultural land in each municipality using new CLEAR data.

12. Adjournment — At 9:05 p.m. on a motion by Cathe Sherman, seconded by Jim Sequin, it was unanimously
