The <u>Berlin Neighborhood Revitalization Project</u> will be holding two public meetings for those interested in the program. The City of Berlin closed on its \$12,508,000 loan from the Rural Development Administration last week. The project, nearing completion, will now utilize a Rural Development Grant in the amount of \$1,342,000 as well as permanent financing from the State of NH DES up to an amount of \$3,276,000. An update of this project will be scheduled for the City Council in the near future.

Councilor Otis asked what the cost of the Primary Election was. The City Clerk replied she had not calculated those numbers yet but payroll for just the election workers was \$3,100.

Councilor Rozek moved with a second by Councilor Nelson to accept the City Manager's Report and place it on file. So moved, the motion carried.

Councilor Nelson was at the Precinct 3 voting location where she received comments from two people who were unclear about going to a school to vote and didn't know where to go in to vote. We need to remember we have new people living in the area who aren't familiar with our polls.

Councilor Rozek concurred that at Brown School a man was quite agitated saying he wasted his time walked around the entire school looking for a sign directing him where to vote. We need something redirecting new folks.

Councilor Nelson added that it bothers her that there are four locations that had such low voter turn-out for all the time and effort that goes into an election. She noted that Hillside and the Rec. Center are only 2 blocks away so that should not be an argument for a reason why a person cannot go to a different location to vote.

Councilor Rozek suggested holding off on this discussion until after the November 4 election to see what those numbers are.

Councilors Morgan Allain, Remillard and Benski agreed we need to discuss a solution regarding the voting locations.
