

Dear Mr. Benson,

I am writing to inform you that the Massachusetts Board of Library Commissioners will be taking up the issue of the closure of the Boxford Town Library at its meeting on February 5, 2015. It is our understanding that the Boxford Town Library has been closed since December 12, 2015 and the Board of Library Commissioners is not aware of an approved plan for establishing the library in a temporary facility or of a firm date for the resumption of library services for the residents of Boxford. Therefore, the Board of Library Commissioners' agenda for their meeting on February 5, 2015 will include a recommendation to decertify the Town of Boxford and its Library as a result of this closure and to rescind its participation in the State Aid to Public Libraries Program for 2015.

This recommendation is based upon the following:

- The Boxford Town Library has been closed since December 12, 2014 and has not been providing library services to the residents.
- The Town has no approved plan or timeline for the resumption of services.
- The Town has no approved plan or timeline to relocate library services in a temporary facility.

The current Board policy regarding the closure of a public library states:

The Massachusetts Board of Library Commissioners considers any municipality that closes its main public library or ceases offering library service to the public for any reason other than the undertaking of a project to improve library services (such as construction, automation preparation or inventory) or the occurrence of a natural catastrophe (including a limited emergency closing due to illness or death) to be, as of the date of that termination of service, no longer a certified participant in the State Aid to Public Libraries program.

The Commissioners will confirm the municipality's loss of certification at their next regularly scheduled Board meeting.

Once the municipality has lost certification, it cannot be recertified as meeting the minimum standards of public library service for State Aid to Public Libraries (as set forth in MGL c.78, s. 19A and 19B, 605 CMR 4.0, and current budget language) until the municipality's library has been meeting the standards for one complete fiscal year (July 1 through June 30) and proper application for State Aid to Public Libraries is made to the Board of Library Commissioners.

A vote to decertify Boxford for failure to provide library services as a consequence of the library closure would result in cancellation of the second payment of state aid for the current fiscal year. In addition, the

Town would be unable to apply for re-certification until the Library was again meeting all of the minimum standards of free public library service for one full fiscal year, FY2017 at the earliest. Decertification also jeopardizes reciprocal borrowing privileges in cities and towns throughout the Commonwealth. Whether or not to serve residents of non-certified communities is a local decision and would be determined by the Trustee Boards in each city or town. Thus, the residents of Boxford would not be guaranteed borrowing privileges in municipalities across Massachusetts or through the Networks that serve them.

Should the trustees or library director wish to address the Board on this issue at the February meeting, advance notice with information about the presentation and speaker must be sent to the Board in writing by January 22, 2015, two weeks prior to the Board meeting date.




It is with mixed emotions that I submit to you my resignation as Director of the Boxford Town Library, effective January 27, 2015.

The Board of Assessors' have been made aware of the most recent proposal regarding the relocation of the Boxford Town Library, and as a result, the relocation of the Assessor's office. The proposal, as the Board understands it, would involve relocating assessing functions to the second floor Finance area of Town Hall, specifically placing the customer service counter in the waiting area outside of the current Finance office. This single counter would serve as the service area for both the Assessor's office and the Tax Collector/Treasurer's office, and would most likely not be a fully enclosed secure area. The Board understands that this is only one of several possible relocation scenarios being evaluated. We would like the Selectman to take into account the following considerations when reviewing the various options.

We understand that this has been suggested as a "temporary" move. The Board would respectfully request that "temporary" be defined. The Assessor's office could possibly make concessions in shared work space that may compromise internal controls for a predetermined short span of time (weeks or months), but if temporary is to be defined as possibly years, the Board urges the Selectman to view this from a more permanent standpoint in terms of internal control and security.

Massachusetts General Law Chapter 41, Section 24 places a restriction upon the merging of municipal offices. It states, "In no city or town, including Boston, shall an assessor hold the office of collector of taxes or deputy collector of taxes...." It is the Board's opinion that shared work space would most likely result in the overlap, or at least the appearance of the overlap of duties.

Additionally, we have sought advice from the Department of Revenue (DOR) regarding their opinion of shared space. A representative has indicated that although this does not violate any statutes, the merger of the two departments is unusual and most likely unacceptable. The DOR does not accept this as conventional practice. It was suggested that, before any merging of office space, the town utilize the DOR's Technical Assistance Bureau, which would examine each department and provide an independent review. This free review would need to be requested by the Board of Selectman. The review emphasizes best practices used around the Commonwealth and may be useful in deciding on relocation options, especially in the event that they become permanent.

The Assessor's and Tax Collector/Treasurer's offices have complementary, yet separate functions. The most obvious example of this would be the abatement process. The Assessor's office is responsible for granting abatements, while the Tax Collector's office is responsible for collecting the taxes due. Although the Board has trust in the current staff of both offices, having abatements and collection done at the same service counter may give the appearance of possible improprieties. It also puts our staff in a potentially unfair situation, making them liable for any discrepancies that may occur in either department. The merger of the two offices also would contribute to confusion among residents as to where and to whom to make tax payments.

Both offices hold statutory responsibilities over private records in their custody. Many of the Assessor's documents are not open to public inspection, which includes other municipal offices. Furthermore, many taxpayer conversations that take place at the service counter are regarding sensitive matters, financial or otherwise. For example, residents in need of tax relief share income, asset, and other personal information with the Assessing staff. It is essential that the Assessor's office preserve public trust and that taxpayers feel confident in the knowledge that their information is being handled in a private and confidential manner.

The Board feels that moving both the Assessor's and Tax Collector/Treasurer's office to the Finance area would require the construction of two separate fully enclosed counter areas, similar to what currently exists. The separation of counter areas and availability of a secure, locked space could also be achieved by implementing the previously discussed relocation to the second floor Board of Health and Inspectional Services areas.

The Board hopes that the Board of Selectman will consider all of these factors when reviewing relocation options. The Board of Assessors hopes to make this a smooth transition for residents and staff alike and to continue to serve taxpayers in the most efficient way possible. It is also of utmost importance that the Assessors continue to meet the regulatory requirements established by the Department of Revenue.

At the staff meeting held on December 9th, Department Heads were asked to work together to provide a plan for relocating the Treasurer's and Assessors' offices to the second floor of Town Hall to accommodate the move of library staff and materials to the first floor. Although the plan was abandoned later in the month, my understanding is that it was once again brought under consideration at last evening's Selectmen's meeting. It is appropriate that the Town Hall staff discussions and decisions made in December be considered once again at this time.

Last month, the initial recommendation (Option 1) was to move all staff into the partially occupied and open spaces within the pod where the Selectmen's and Finance Director's offices are located. Upon further consideration, Option 2 was proposed moving all staff into the office spaces currently housing Conservation and Planning, and relocating that staff to the Finance area. Finally, following further study and discussion, the Treasurer and Director of Assessment put forth Option 3, moving the Treasurer's staff into the Building Inspector's office and the Assessing staff into the Health office. It was considered to be the optimal plan because it offered the best public access and service, the required security of funds and protection of privacy, and the mandated separation of functionality and internal control.

The existing allocation of space for the offices of the Treasurer and Assessor was designed as such to accommodate ease of accessibility to the public, separation of duties, security of monies collected and protection of privacy of financial information. These departments are open all day from 8:00AM to 4:30PM and employ four (4) full-time and one (1) part-time employees. Staff members interact regularly on overlapping issues with tax bills, yet maintain separate records containing confidential information. Service counters are separate to preserve internal controls. The Assessor has authority to abate a tax bill for statutory reasons; only the Collector of Taxes may accept a payment.

If the Board of Selectmen votes to relocate the offices of the Treasurer/Collector of Taxes and Assessor to the second floor of Town Hall, the following analysis may be helpful in ensuring it is done properly, especially if the "temporary" relocations become semi-permanent or last for the long term.

Option 1 – Incorporate Treasurer/Collector and Assessor with Finance/Accounting:

- Service counters moved into the exterior space need to be fully enclosed and secure. No member of the public (or Town Hall staff from other departments) may have access to the area behind the service counter where cash and checks are kept and confidential information is filed or visible on a PC. There must be separate counters for assessing and treasurer's clerks, so that the assessing clerk may not have physical access to the monies collected and the treasurer's clerk may not have the ability to enter an abatement onto a tax bill at the assessing clerk's PC.
- The workstation of either the Treasurer/Collector or her assistant should be located so that the service counter is in full-view. The part-time clerk is scheduled for 5 hrs./day. When she is away from the counter for scheduled time-off, at the bank or at lunch, other department personnel should be able to see if a customer is at the counter awaiting service.
- The table containing assessing maps will not be accommodated in the limited space so will need to be shared with that in the Inspectional Services area.
- Access to the postage machine/copier/shredder will need to be provided to Town Hall staff. Employees whose offices are in the Finance and Selectmen's offices will require access that does not interfere with service counters.
- A structural engineer had indicated that the 2nd floor of Town Hall can support the Treasurer's safe. If it cannot be moved, a new safe will need to be purchased to provide secure storage of cash, checks and trash stickers.
- Crowding would make it difficult to provide assessor's workstation for public access.

Option 2 - Move Treasurer/Collector and Assessor into Conservation/Planning:

- Limits access to staff only, yet separation of functionality cannot be easily achieved.
- Service counter is insufficient in size to accommodate two (2) clerks serving the public. Difficult to limit access to money stored behind counter, or access by a staff member in one department to the logged in PC of a staff member in another department.
- Public access workstation for accessing assessors' records could be placed outside the enclosed office space.
- The area may be overcrowded with all the number of files belonging to each department.

Option 3 – Move Treasurer into Building Dept.; Move Assessor into Health Dept.:

• Departments with 4 fill-time and 1 part-time employees open all public hours take over spaces currently occupied by departments with 2 full-time and 4 part-time employees with limited public hours.

• The separate enclosed physical spaces provide the ideal security, protection of confidential information and mandated separation of duties.

The final consideration is the timing of the proposed office relocation. January, February and March are the months of peak activity for the offices of the Collector of Taxes and Assessor. Real Estate tax bills were mailed on 12/31/14 and are due on 2/02/15, which is also the final day to apply for a tax abatement. Approximately 9,500 motor vehicle excise tax bills are scheduled to be mailed on 1/27/15 and will be due on 2/26/15. The complete collection cycle does not wind down until the end of March. Numerous interactions with taxpayers occur during this period, both on the telephone and in person at Town Hall.

It is my understanding that no final decision on office relocation has been made, but that the matter will be on the agenda for the meeting of the Board of Selectmen on Tuesday, January 20th. It is my hope that the plan and cost estimate to achieve it will include the foregoing considerations. Please contact me if you require further clarification on any of the above issues.
