At a legal meeting of the inhabitants of the Town of Boyford, qualified to vote in elections and in town affairs, held in Lincoln Hall, West Boyford, on Monday March 1, 1943. the following record was made viz:

Meeting was called to order and the Warrant read by William J. Greenler, Moderator

The Ballot Box was inspected and found to be empty, registering 000. It was then locked and the keys placed in the hands of Clayton A. Nelson, the Constable in charge.

The Polls were opened at 7 o'clock A.M.

As fast as fifty ballots were cast they were taken from the Ballot Box to count.

Dinner was served at noon by the Ladies of the Parish as usual.

The afternoon session was called to order at three minutes past two by the Moderator.

The meeting was opened with prayer by Rev. Milton Sweet, upon invitation of the Moderator.

Voted

to adopt the following Resolutions, presented by Professor Franklin G. Roberts,

1943.

We the citizens of Boyford, Massachusetts in Town Meeting assembled on March 1, 1943 do hereby resolve:

Whereas, our Nation is now engaged in a war of not its seeking with determined and ruthless foes, we do pledge our loyalty, devotion, and service to our Nation to the end that this war shall be brought to a successful and victorious conclusion; and be it

Resolved: that we do express our thanks and appreciation to the men of this Town who are in the armed services of the United States Government. We do fully realize that it is they together with the millions of other young men drawn from the different parts of the country, whose devotion to duty, whose constant courage, and whose devotion outstanding bravery stand between us and the agencies of destruction and cruelty.

It is they who are now preserving the priceless heritage of the democratic way of life which their Boyford ancestors of past years fought to establish and to perpetuate. and be it further

Resolved: that we, the citizens of Boyford, do promise these men in the Armed Services that we shall do all that is in our power to see that their families and dependents are adequately provided for during the period of this war, and, at the victorious conclusion of this conflict we shall assist by every possible means for the rehabilitation of these men into these ways of civilian life in a democratic society. And it is further

Resolved: that a copy of these Resolutions be entered in The Town Records.

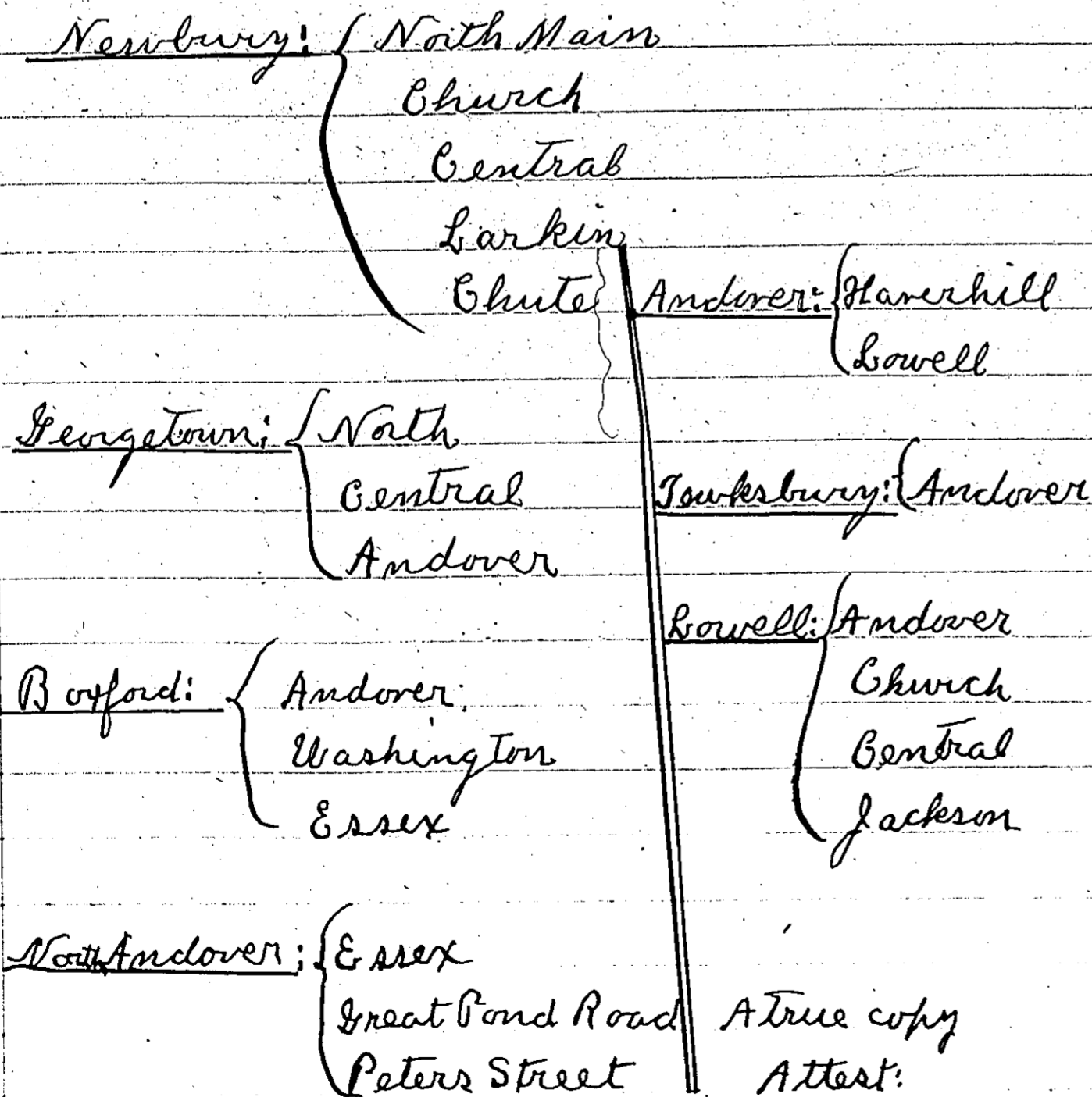
