Annual Town Meeting

The annual town meeting of the Town of Bradford was held at the Harry Lee Cole School at 8 p.m. on March 2, 1959 with William J. Greener, Jr. presiding as moderator. After a prayer by Rev. Ellsworth D. Comins, Jr., business was transacted as follows by more than 200 voters:

Art. 1 Voted to accept the reports of the Town Officers and Committees as printed in the annual report.

Art. 2 Voted to accept the proposed budget as printed with the following changes: \$300.00 and \$300.00 for each of the two libraries was omitted, and the estimated figure of 700.00 increased to the actual cost of \$724.25 for Town Reports.

Art. 3 Voted to appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the maintenance of Road Machinery, said amount to be transferred from the Road Machinery Fund.

Art. 4 Voted to appropriate \$3,000.00 for the Reserve Fund, said amount to be transferred from Overlay Reserve.

Art. 5 Voted to authorize the Town Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money from time to time, in anticipation of the revenue of the financial year, beginning January 1, 1959, and to issue a note or notes therefor, paying within one year, and to renew any note or notes as may be given for a period of less than one year in accordance with Section 17, Chapter 44 of the General Laws.

Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for two two-way radios for use of the Fire Department. Milton E. Lord was given unanimous consent to address the meeting.

Art. 12

Voted unanimously to raise and appropriate the sum of \$304.82, the balance due George Wood for building the cabin at the dump.

Art. 13

Voted to continue the improvement of a section of Main St. under Chapter 90, and to appropriate therefor the sum of \$670.06, said sum to be transferred from the funds received from the state under the provisions of Chapter 718, Acts of 1956.

Art. 15

Voted to appropriate from Surplus Revenue the sum of \$28,500.00 to meet the state and County allotments for highways, and any other highway, relocation, repair, or construction done in anticipation of reimbursement, the money when reimbursed to be credited to Surplus Revenue.

Art. 16

Voted to discontinue as a public way that part of Main Street at the property of Baer no longer included in the re-located road.

Art. 17

Voted to pass over. John Moore of West Boyford and Howard S. Willard, head of the Law Enforcement Division of the ^{Mass} Department of Conservation were given unanimous consent to address the meeting.

Art. 18

Voted unanimously to ~~adopt~~ enact the following by-law:

"All regular employees of the Town shall be granted paid sick leave at their regular rates of pay on the basis of work time at the rate of one day's pay for every twenty days of work during the twelve months immediately preceding. No such sick-leave pay shall be paid to any employee who has not worked 1,000 hours in the twelve months immediately preceding. Paid sick leave shall not be granted unless the employee shall have been called to report for work, and the head of the department shall so certify, nor, in case of more than 3 consecutive days absence, unless a doctor's certificate of

inability to work shall be supplied to the Board of Selectmen

Art. 19 Voted to reject the provisions of Chapter 516 of the Acts of the General Court for 1958, and to withdraw from the mosquito control project provided therein.

Voted the following resolution: that the moderator, board of selectmen, and other proper committees of the town shall meet & draw up a protest to be submitted to the legislature in regard to the approximate 7000.00 assessment against this town.

Art. 20 Voted that the moderator shall appoint a committee to see what action shall be taken in regard to the Morse House, and to report their recommendations at the next town meeting.

Art. 21 Voted that the town ratify and confirm its acceptance of streets voted during the last two years, said streets having been laid out by the selectmen in accordance with subdivision plans on file

Art. 22 Voted that the moderator appoint a committee to meet with the New England Tel. & Tel. Co. to discuss means of conducting toll-free telephone calls between the two ends of the town.
Voted to adjourn at 11:30 p.m.

Annual Town Meeting, March 7, 1960

The annual town meeting of the voters of Buxford was held at the Harry Lee Cole School at 8 P.M. with William J. Greener, Jr. presiding as moderator. After a moment of silent prayer, the following business was transacted by more than 300 voters present:

- Article 1. Voted to accept the reports of the Town Officers and Committees as printed in the annual town report with the exception of the report on the disposition of the Morse House property. It was voted that the property be retained by the town and set aside as a ^{permanent} public park after a review of the historical background by Mrs. Charles Austin, Buxford's oldest ^{voter}.
- Article 2. Voted to accept adopt the suggested budget as printed with two exceptions: "Ware Inspector" to be reduced from \$850.00 to \$750.00, and "Police" to be reduced from \$4700.00 to \$4100.00.
- Art. 3. Voted to appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the maintenance of Road Machinery, said amount to be transferred from the Road Machinery Fund.
- Art. 4. Voted to appropriate \$5,000.00 for the Reserve Fund, said amount to be transferred from Overlay Reserve.
- Art. 5. Voted to authorize the Town Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money from time to time, in anticipation of the revenue of the financial year beginning January 1, 1960, and to issue a note or notes therefor, paying within one year, and to renew any note or notes as may be given for a period of less than one

year in accordance with section 17, Chapter 44 of the General Laws.

- Art. 6. Voted to pass over.
- Art. 7. Voted to pass over.
- Art. 8. Voted to appropriate \$405.13 refunded from the County on account of dog licenses to be divided between the two libraries as follows: \$202.57 to the West Buxford Library and \$202.56 to the Buxford Library.
- Art. 9. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1100.00 to be divided equally between the two libraries of the town for use toward the operation of said libraries.
- Art. 10. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$800.00 for the use of the Buxford Library in making necessary repairs at the library building and for the proper maintenance thereof.
- Art. 11. Voted to accept the provisions of section 8C of Chapter 40 of the General Laws, inserted by section 1 of Chapter 223 of the acts of 1957, so that ~~it~~ ^{the town} may establish a Conservation Commission for the promotion and development of the natural resources and for the protection of watershed resources of the town, the Commission to be five in number and appointed by the Board of Selectmen.
- Art. 12. Voted to authorize the Planning Board to receive Planning Services through the Massachusetts Dept. of Commerce with Federal aid under section 701 of title VII of the housing act of 1954 as

amended, and that the sum of \$3,000.00 be raised and appropriated for this purpose and to be expended over two years.

Art. 13 Article was withdrawn

Art. 14 Voted to continue the improvement of a section of Washington St. under Chapter 90 and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 to be used in conjunction with the State and County funds.

Art. 15 Voted to appropriate from Surplus Revenue the sum of \$31,500.00 to meet the State and County allotments for highways, the money when reimbursed to be credited to Surplus Revenue.

Art. 16 Voted to pass over

Art. 17 Voted to adopt the following by-law by hand vote, 163 yes, 41 no.:

Section 1. No person shall fire or discharge any firearm within the limits of any park, play ground, or other public property except with the consent of the Board of Selectmen, or hunt or fire or discharge any firearm on any private property except with the written consent of the owner or legal occupant thereof.

Section 2 This by-law shall not apply to the lawful defense of life or property, nor to any law enforcement officer acting in the discharge of his duties.

Section 3. Any person violating any of the provisions of this by-law shall be punished by a fine of not more than 20.00 for each offense.

Section 4. Any existing by-law relating

to hunting and the discharging of firearms which may be inconsistent with the foregoing by-law is hereby repealed.

Art. 18 Voted that the membership of the School Committee be increased ~~to~~ to five; and that this be accomplished as follows:

1) At the first annual meeting hereafter two members shall be chosen for terms of three years and one member shall be chosen for two years

2) At the second annual meeting hereafter one member shall be chosen for three years

3) At the third annual meeting hereafter two members shall be chosen for three years

4) and thereafter at each annual meeting as many members shall be chosen for terms of three years as there are terms expiring.

Art. 21A Voted that a Committee be appointed to study the requirements and needs of the school building problem in the Town of Boxford, said Committee to be known as the School Building Committee, to be comprised of seven members, three of ^{which} ~~whom~~ shall be members of the School Committee, and the remaining four members to be appointed by the Board of Selectmen; the Committee to report to a town meeting not later than June 1, 1960

Art. 21B. Voted that the sum of \$5,000.00 be raised and appropriated for the use of the School Building Committee to be used in the preliminary planning of school building needs and construction, and

and for the hiring of an architect to prepare the necessary plans.

Art. 22 Voted to authorize the Selectmen to appoint a town recreation area planning Committee for the purpose of investigating the possibility of making part of the Boy Scout area suitable for a town swimming and recreation area and to raise and appropriate \$500.00 for engineering study for this purpose.

Art. 23 Voted to pass over

Art. 26 Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1300.00 for the purpose of trading the Police ambulance Cruiser for a 1960 model

Art. 27 Voted to pass over

Art. 28 Voted to abandon as a public way, Ledge Lane, so-called, or any such part thereof as may now be a public way. The Planning Board approved.

Art. 29 Voted not to accept Sayward Road as a public way

Art. 30 Voted unanimously to appropriate the sum of \$80,000.00 from free cash for the purpose of establishing a stabilization fund as provided by Section 5 B, Chapter 40, General Laws.

Art. 31 Voted to pass over

Art. 32 Voted that the Selectmen be authorized to negotiate a lease to the American Legion for certain land owned by the town on Ipswich Road near the entrance to the Lynn Y.M.C.A. Camp (Camp Rotary) at the stipulated rate of \$1.00 per year for not more than fifty years. The vote was 71 yes, 41 no by show of hands.

Art. 33 Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the purchase of two mobile 2-way radios for the Fire Department.

Art. 34 Voted unanimously to accept the provisions of Chapter 493 of the Acts of 1959 relative to increasing certain retirement allowances and pensions.

Art. 35 Voted ^{unanimously} under the provisions of Chapter 513 of the Acts of 1959, to increase the retirement allowances of Harry F. Moore and Xavier F. Petigean to \$1200.00 per annum.

Art. 36 Voted to adjourn at 12:30 a.m.
