Art 4 Voted unanimously to enact the following by-law:

"Fees of the gas inspector shall be collected by him at rates as follows for the benefit of the town:-

- (1) Eight dollars for each original installation.
- (2) Three and one-half dollars for each change of a previous installation.
- (3) Fifty cents for each fixture added to a previous installation.
- (4) Two dollars for each re-inspection following a disapproval.

The salary of the gas inspector shall be an amount equal to the amount of such fees collected."

Art. 5 Voted to adjourn at 8:35 p.m.

At a special town meeting held on Oct. 26, 1962, at the Masconomet Regional District School, the voters of Boxford voted a revision of the Zoning By-Law under Article I, and an amendment to the revised zoning by-law under Article 6. At a special town meeting held on Nov. 23, 1962 at the Harry Lee Cole School, the town voted to enact a by-law in regard to a gas inspector fees. The three by-laws were sent to the Attorney General by registered mail, and the return receipts showed that they were received on Nov. 26, 1962. They were neither approved or disapproved within 90 days by the Attorney General.

March Town Meeting

Annual Town Meeting, March 4, 1963

The voters of Boxford held their annual town meeting at the Masconomet Regional School on March 4, 1963 at 8 pm with 250 in attendance. After a prayer by Rev. Donald Rosenberger, the business meeting was conducted by the moderator, William J. Greener, Jr. The articles of the warrant were disposed of as follows:

1. The reports of the town officers and Committees were approved as printed in the Town Report. Dr. Stephen J. Maddock requested that the clerk's records show that the town was incorporated in 1685, rather than 1865 as appeared in the town report.
2. Voted to adopt the suggested budget as printed in the town report with the following changes: Dutch Elm Disease dropped from \$2500.00 to \$2000.00; Snow Removal and Sanding increased from \$14,000.00 to \$18,000.00, and Conservation Committee allotted \$1500.00
3. Voted to appropriate \$1500.00 for the maintenance of Road Machinery, said amount to be transferred from the Road Machinery Fund.
4. Voted to appropriate \$10,000.00 for the Reserve Fund, said amount to be transferred from Overlay Reserve.
5. Voted to authorize the Town Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money from time to time, in anticipation of the revenue of the financial year beginning Jan. 1, 1963 and to issue a note or notes

therefor, payable within one year, and to renew any note or notes as may be given for a period of less than one year in accordance with Section 17, Chapter 44 of the General Laws.

6. A bill of \$8.00 for road signs presented by Dr. Stephen J. Maddock failed to win the approval of $\frac{4}{5}$ of the vote as required for bills of charge. The Finance Board reported adversely because only two members were present, so a majority had no opportunity to act on the bill.
7. Voted to pass over any action in regard to compensation for labor in the several departments.
8. Voted to distribute \$364.33 refunded from the County on account of dog licenses as follows: \$182.17 to the east parish library, and \$182.16 to the West parish library.
9. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,100.00 to be divided equally between the two libraries of the Town for use toward the maintenance of said libraries.
10. Voted to accept the provisions of Chapter 760 of the Acts of 1960 relative to State Aid for Public Libraries.
11. Voted unanimously that the sum of \$430,000.00 be hereby appropriated for the construction and original equipping and furnishing of a new elementary school on town owned land, and that to meet said appropriation, the sum of \$100,000.00 be appropriated from the Stabilization fund, the sum of \$115,000.00 be raised in the current tax levy, and that the

Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen be, and hereby is, authorized to borrow the sum of \$115,000.00 under authority of Chapter 645 of the Acts of 1948, as amended, and to issue bonds or notes of the Town therefore payable in accordance with General Law, Chapter 44, so that the whole loan shall be paid in not more than 5 years from the date of issue of the first bond or note; and that the Construction grant to be received in the year in which construction commences, pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 591 of the Acts of 1959 and Chapter 377 of the Acts of 1961, shall be applied to the cost of the project.

12. Voted to appropriate from Surplus Revenue the sum of \$35,600.00 to meet the State and County allotments for highways, the money when reimbursed to be credited to Surplus Revenue.

13. Voted to raise and appropriate \$3,000.00 for a speed control and safety survey and installation of necessary traffic signs.

14. Voted to enact the following by-law:
 "There shall be a wire inspector to be appointed by the Selectmen for such term as they shall deem proper. He shall perform his duties under the direction of the Selectmen, as prescribed by the General Laws.

He shall collect fees from applicants for permits in accordance with a schedule to be approved by the Selectmen, and shall be paid a salary to be determined by the Selectmen.

15. Voted to terminate the borrowing authority voted at the Special Town Meeting of Oct. 26, 1960 in connection with the Cole School addition, so that no further sums may be borrowed under said vote.

16. Voted to transfer the sum of \$50,000.00 from available funds to the Stabilization Fund.

17. Voted to raise and appropriate \$3,000.00 for the purchase of a sander and a used tractor.

18. Voted to appropriate the sum of \$6,000.00 for use in conjunction with allotments from the State and County, for Chapter 90 highway work; said sum to be transferred from funds received from the State under Chapter 782, Acts of 1962.

19. Voted to adjourn at 10:20 p.m.

Dear Mr. Colby:

I am enclosing herewith Article 4, adopted at your Special Town Meeting of Nov. 23, 1962, with the approval of the Attorney General noted thereon.

In respect to Articles 1 and 6, adopted at your special town meeting of Oct 26, 1962, the material relative to same is hereby returned and the articles are disapproved for the following reasons:

1. The publication of notice re Article 1 was not published at least fourteen days prior to hearing date as provided by Chapter 40A, section 6; further, I cannot ascertain that the publication was in a newspaper with general circulation in Boxford.

2. The zoning maps you have forwarded are dated October 23, 1961, whereas the vote on Article 1 reads August 20, 1962.

3. On Article 6, the disabilities as set forth in No. 1 above apply and, in addition, it would appear that the notice of hearing was published but once and not for two successive weeks as required by Chapter 40A, section 6.

The voters of Boxford met at the Masconomet Regional School on June 19, 1963 with William J. Greener, Jr., presiding as moderator. After a prayer by Reverend Arthur White, action was taken as follows on the articles of the warrant:

1. Voted to pass over.
2. Voted to approve the \$1,875,000.00 indebtedness authorized by the Regional District School Committee of the Masconomet Regional School District on May 21, 1963, for constructing, originally equipping and furnishing an addition to the Masconomet Regional Junior - Senior High School, 199 yes, 22 no.
3. Voted to pass over.
4. Voted unanimously to have the Selectmen appoint a three member committee to investigate the possibilities of a mosquito control project.
5. Voted to change the name of Carol Road to Cedar Street.
6. Voted to authorize the Selectmen to sell the two used crawler tractors and spare parts for the same.
7. Voted to transfer \$122.05 from the Town Report Account to the Planning Board.
8. Voted to accept ~~as~~ public roads, the following: Fish Brook Road, Road to Boy Scout Park, Anderson Drive, Cole Drive, Glen Forest Drive, Cedar Knoll, and the extension of Cedar Street.
9. Voted to adjourn at 10 p.m.

Gentlemen:

This is to advise that pursuant to Sec. 143 of Chapter 111 of the General Laws, the Board of Health hereby assigns, effective this date, a location for you to establish or carry on a noisome trade - the said trade being "agriculture" as the term is defined in Section 1A of Chapter 128 of the General Laws and other applicable statutes - together with the right to use such location for such purposes and uses as are permitted by Section 150A of said Chapter 111 of the General Laws.

The said location shall consist of the twenty-five (25) acres of land, more or less, in Boxford, Essex County, Massachusetts, where you now operate a piggery.

This said assignment of a location to establish or carry on a noisome trade shall be subject to the Final Decree of the Court in the case entitled, Frederick M. Pendoley et al. vs. Stephen Maddock, Harry L. Cole, Raymond Perley, individually and as members of the Board of Health of the Town of Boxford and Alfred G. Ferreira et al, Essex Superior Court (Equity) Docket No. 14413.

The Board of Health hereby directs the Town Clerk of Boxford to enter a copy of this assignment in the records of the town.

Special Town Meeting

The voters of the Town of Boxford met at the Harry Lee Cole School at 8 P.M. on Nov. 23, 1963, the day of President Kennedy's assassination. William J. Greener, Jr., the moderator, addressed the meeting as follows:

"My fellow citizens:

All Americans carry heavy hearts this evening, stunned and saddened by the tragic tragedy which has occurred earlier today.

Some 20 years ago, Almighty God saw fit to spare John Kennedy from a hero's death in the Pacific, that he might later become the President of the United States, probably the most powerful and at the same time the most heavily burdened office in the world. Today he has been snatched from us by an assassin's bullet.

We cannot understand the ways of Divine Providence, nor can we at once comprehend the enormity of this shocking crime. Yet all Americans, whatever their race, creed, color, religion, or political beliefs, must tonight bow their heads in prayerful sorrow, and beg God's merciful judgment for our departed President, as we also ask his blessing upon President Johnson and upon our country in this tragic hour."

Harry L. Cole, Chairman of the Board of Selectmen, took the floor and spoke as follows:

"Mr. Moderator:

As you have said, today a tragedy has shocked the entire world.

People of all faiths, of all politics, yes, of all countries, are saddened by the untimely death of a young and vigorous leader in the prime of his life and at the peak of his career.

No one yet knows the effect this catastrophe will have upon the future of our country and of the world.

We can only ask God's help for our new President and for our nation in this time of sorrow and travail.

I move that a fitting record of these proceedings be made in the records of the Town."

Rev. Arthur White of the First Congregational Church concluded the memorial exercises with this prayer:

"O Lord, Our God, we meet this night with heavy heart to do our community duties. The President of our land lies dead at the hand of hate. There is much sorrow in our hearts, Our Father, that men could so despise thy ways as to assassinate our president. Thy hand of judgement rests heavily on thy people in this hour. Thou who hast sent love to us through thy son must now weep that hate has corroded the hearts of our Countrymen. We, thy people, to whom thou hast granted many blessings have grown careless of late years. We have accepted thy bounty and grace as our due rather than as responsibility. O thou who hast searched us and known our ways, who knowest when we sit down and rise up, who discernest our thoughts from afar, free our hearts from carelessness toward life, clear our minds of selfish thoughts. We have followed too much the devices and desires of our own hearts. We have offended against thy holy laws. We have left undone those things which we ought to have done; and we have done those things which we ought not to have done. But thou, O Lord, have mercy upon us that we may hereafter live a godly, righteous, and sober life to the glory of thy holy name. Amen."

The articles of the warrant were disposed of as follows:

1. Voted to pass over.
2. Voted to appropriate the sum of \$780.04; said sum to be transferred from funds received from the state under Chapter 782 of the Acts of 1962 and used for the improvement of Bare Hill Road.
3. Voted to accept as public ways, Harris Street, to be known as Harris Road, and Roberto Road, as shown on the Homecrest Development Plan.
4. Voted to accept as a public way, Woods Hill Lane off
