SCHOOL REPORT.

The month of February brings us to the close of another financial year, and in accordance with a long established custom your school board hereby submit their annual report.

At the commencement of the year it was thought advisable to follow the custom of the past few years, by assigning to each member of the board two schools for their special care and management. The division of schools gave Mr. Shaw, Pine Ground and Kelley's Corner; Mr. Langley, New Dover and Horse Corner; and the chairman had the Centre and Bear Hill schools. By means of this division we have been able to look after the individual needs of the different schools better than we otherwise could.

We are pleased to say our schools, generally, have been very successful. Many of the teachers employed have previously taught in town, and are too well known to need any special mention from your school board. We think they have labored earnestly for the best interest of the schools, and those scholars who have attended regularly and tried to improve, have made steady progress.

The greatest of all drawbacks upon the efficiency of our schools at the present time is irregular attendance. If children are allowed to absent themselves from their recitations they soon lose all interest in their studies and consequently fall behind their classmates. That a child should be sent to school one day and kept at home the next, or perhaps attend school but one or two days in the week is a great evil, both to the child and school, as well as a great annoyance to the teacher. If parents want their children to learn they must encourage them in their studies and visit the school often. A teacher may be faithful and well qualified, but if she be deprived of the sympathy and co-operation of the parents her efforts will meet with but little success.

Believing that an ample supply of the best of books, for teaching all the necessary branches of study, is indispensible, we have made quite extensive purchases the past year. The study of

LIBRARIAN'S REPORT.

The librarian reports that the whole number of books now in the library is 363, but that there will be a slight increase in the number when a few more books which are ordered, but not received in season to be included in this report, shall come in. Of this number (363) there are in Fiction, 243; in History and Travel, 41; in Poetry, 29; in Natural Science, 11; in Biography, 10; and in Miscellaneous, 29.

In addition to the appropriation by the town there has been expended twelve (12) dollars from a sale of refreshments held by the ladies at the fall election; this added fifteen books to the library; and a donation of twenty-five (25) dollars from Mr. Charles H. Carpenter. Fourteen books have been given to the library, and 90 cents received in fines; 116 persons have taken out books during the year. No books have been lost, and all the books are in good condition.

physiology being obligatory in every school, it was thought best to introduce something new to take the place of Blaisdell's Physiology, which had been in use quite a number of years and had ceased to interest the children. After a careful examination of works by several authors, we finally settled on Overton's Applied Physiology as being the most practical. Arrangements were made by which the old books were exchanged to help pay for the new. An exchange was also effected in histories and Eggleston's History, revised to 1900, was secured at little added expense to what was required to supply the schools with what books were needed of the old series. The same was true in regard to geographies and Werner's geographies, which were introduced in two schools last year, with good results, are now in every school except one. Dictionaries are needed in all the schools but we did not think it advisable to purchase them the past year.

At the school meeting it was voted to raise one hundred dollars for repairs and it became our duty to expend the money where it was most needed and would be most durable. While making a careful examination of the school buildings we found, with the exception of the one at Horse Corner which was repaired a few years ago, they all needed whitewashing, painting both inside and out, and other minor repairs. We finally decided the most of the money was required at Kelley's Corner, where the school-room was in a very bad condition. We had one side of the house shingled, the walls and ceiling plastered and the inside painted. We also made a few much needed repairs at the Centre. We had the entry sheathed and painted, which gives it a neat and durable appearance. We hope you will not rely on our report as to the need of further repairs, but examine the school houses, compare them with your homes, and then at the school meeting act as you think is for the best interests of our schools.
