### WHAT ARE THE POWERS OF A SUPERINTENDENT?

SCHOOL REPORT.

As we approach the close of another school year, the school board are expected to give an account of their stewardship and to conform to the law, and a time-honored custom, to submit to you, as a people, a report of the manner in which business appertaining to schools has been conducted during the last twelve months.

There is no more common topic of conversation than schools. Every one, especially the heads of families, should be interested in the schools—not to take for granted the report of what some prejudiced person might say, either for good or for bad, but to investigate for themselves.

In looking over the registers we fail to find the names of but very few of the heads of families as visitors. We would recommend to the parents who have scholars in school to make an effort to visit the schools once or twice during a term. It will give the scholars a greater share of confidence in themselves, and also give the parents a better knowledge of the success or failure of teachers, and if they expressed their thoughts to the teachers and scholars it would entbuse and make them happy, especially if their remarks were to their praise.

We are glad to notice a very large attendance of visitors in all the schools. The school board are besieged with circulars of information from the department of public instruction in regard to expert supervision of schools.

#### WHAT ARE THE DUTIES OF A SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS?

A competent superintendent means progressive teachers. He will build up the teaching force by seeking out the best available teachers and nominating them to the board to fill vacancies; he stands behind the teacher in cases of discipline, in the first place by wise council to the perplexed teacher before the event, when an ounce of preventative is worth more than a pound of cure. He has no powers except such as are given him by the school board. The school board is the representative of the people; the law, therefore, provides for a trained superintendent in order that the school board may have a practical foreman to carry out their orders.

The board holds full power with a superintendent, the same as without, in fact, the power is greater because they are given an adequate means of enforcing their rules. It is objected that the people do not want a man to come in and overturn their schools by discharging teachers right and left according to his own will. The objection is not valid for the reason that only the board has power to hire or to discharge.

The superintendent must convince the board by a plain statement of facts, before they will either hire or discharge a teacher. The greatest objection, we presume, in this town is the extra expense; we think that which costs nothing is not worth having. The expense is borne equally by the state and the towns we join with.

We are greatly pleased with most of our schools for the progress they have made. We would like personally to mention the great success in some of the schools of the little tots that have been but one or two terms. We could but notice the great pains the teachers took with them. We also commend our teachers, the most of them, for the manner in reading they demanded of their scholars, not letting them ramble along in a singsong style, but having them up to the standard, paying particular attention to the punctuation marks and reading as though they were reading understandingly. The spelling blanks in most of the schools showed great progress in that study, and the smaller class in spelling, we note particularly in one school, pronouncing the words before spelling and after, which we recommended to all teachers. We would recommend to the next board, if they can, to retain the most of our present staff of teachers, particularly the one at the Center; she is the right one in the right place.

### THE REPAIRS.

We had \$350 to expend in repairs.

At Kelley's Corner, we have painted the outside with two coats of paint, have put in blackboards and made other necessary repairs inside.

At the Pine Ground, we put two coats of paint on the outside and made other necessary repairs.

At the Center, we put in new seats of modern style that are appreciated by all concerned. We also put in a hard wood floor and a new front door.

At Horse Corner, we have sheathed the inside, top and sides and the entry. This schoolhouse still needs quite a lot of repairs inside—there ought to be a new floor, the seats are the old wooden benches that have been there since the house was built and the outside needs shingling and clapboarding.

At New Dover, we clapboarded one side and one end of schoolhouse and one end of the shed, and have the paint stock on hand for painting.

There is a schoolhouse in town, that has not been used for school purposes for many years, that is in need of repairing, should the town see fit to retain it for school purposes.

The schoolhouses that have been sheathed and floored are far more comfortable and require less fuel. We thank the taxpayers for their generous response when called upon to raise money for the repairs in the past, and we look for the same interest manifested in the future.
