### SCHOOL REPORT.

In compliance with the requirements of the statute, we hereby submit our annual report, and ask your careful attention to the following remarks. At the present time, we labor under the disadvantage of being obliged to secure all of our teachers from out of town. Where they are known personally to us we can, of course, hire intelligently, but in cases where we know little or nothing in regard to their special fitness for teaching, we not infrequently secure the services of those whose knowledge of text-books is all sufficient, but who lack in a marked degree the ability to manage or govern a school. A teacher in order to be successful should be well educated, not only in books, but in all other matters which are necessary to train up the rising generation.

We have endeavored to give the schools our best efforts, and have tried to impress upon the minds of our teachers the importance of thoroughness in all their work, and think our schools will compare favorably with those in surrounding towns.

Believing that good order is one of the first requirements of a good school and that no school can be a complete success without it, we hope that teachers will try to make an improvement in this direction, as some have fallen into the habit of being too easy in the school-room.

The school-room itself should be kept clean and neat and the books, furniture, etc., arranged in an orderly manner; for the children, especially the younger ones, form habits here, which will follow them through life.

One great hindrance to the prosperity of our schools is irregular attendance. A great many of the absences

which occurred this winter were unavoidable on account of sickness; but the cases of tardiness which we noticed recorded are simply inexcusable.

The child who is allowed to go into school a little late day after day, is forming a habit which will cling to him, and will not only affect his own prospects, but all with whom he comes in contact. The tax-payers who support our schools have a right to demand that children should not be defrauded and schools injured by carelessness of parents. Sickness is the only reasonable excuse for nonattendance, and minor excuses for keeping children from school hinder them from doing the work required and greatly increase the teacher's labor. It would be well if parents felt a deeper personal responsibility in the constant attendance of their children at school. In no other way can the burden of the teacher's work be more lightened or her teaching rendered more efficient.

It is only by united effort that we can ever hope to see our public schools reach the high standard which we so much desire. We can never even hope to secure the same advantages that are given the city schools, by reason of our population being so scattered as to render it impossible to establish graded schools. Yet personal observation, and information secured from some of the best schools in neighboring cities, go very far to show that in many instances the average country youth is found to be in advance of the city scholar of equal age.

We would urge upon the parents the necessity of the duty which they owe their children by visiting the school-room often, for by so doing it will give the children more encouragement and will be a great help to the teacher. If they will do this, they will have less fault to find, and the children, teacher, and all concerned will be benefited.

To the young people of our town we wish to say—if you will allow us to speak from our own experience—that when

you have passed your schooldays, and have entered upon the duties of life, your chief regret will be that you did not better improve your time. There is no time like the present for you to improve your every opportunity and do your very best to obtain a good education. If you do not realize this now, you certainly will sometime. School days are short at the longest, and we urge you not to waste any part of them. Your teachers have all labored faithfully for your advancement and we think have met with good results.

We were unfortunate in losing one of our best teachers at the middle of the fall term and were obliged to get a substitute to complete the four remaining weeks. This shortened the term two weeks as we were unable to get a teacher in that length of time, but it will be made up in the spring.

In a general way of speaking our schools have been very successful. We have 85 scholars who have attended school in the past year—44 girls and 41 boys.

We have some superior teachers with us and think it policy to keep them if possible.

To the parents and citizens we would say, let us all take a greater interest in our schools. It appears to us that we all have a responsibility here which we cannot ignore.

Because of irregular attendance in some schools, caused by sickness, we felt obliged to shorten the winter term, thinking the money could be used to a better advantage in the spring.

During the past year we thought it advisable to introduce new reading books as the old ones were in a bad condition; we also bought three globes and introduced three business arithmetics for the advanced class at the Center school, and supplied the schools throughout the town with new testaments.

In the way of general repairs, we have set and varnished

new seats which were previously purchased for New Dover and Horse Corner schools. We have shingled one side of Horse Corner school house, and painted the inside two coats, and think if the outside was painted the building would be in good repair. We painted and shingled school house and shed at Bear Hill, shingled shed and one side of school house at Pine Ground, and shingled shed at Kelley's Corner.

We have expended nearly all the money appropriated at the last school meeting for repairs but find we haven't enough to do the much needed sheathing at the Center.

All of which we respectfully submit.
