#### REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT.

To the School Board of Chichester, N. H.:

I herewith submit my first annual report. I am proud to have the honor of submitting the first supervisory report to the Chichester school board. My only regret is that it must be presented so early that the results of a full year of supervision cannot be shown.

During this year I have followed the policy of bringing up the standard of existing work, rather than making radical changes. The presentation of a totally new plan of action at this early date could cause only confusion and much hard labor on the part of both teachers and pupils, with little or no improvement. It has seemed best, therefore, to make such changes in teaching method as would put the children in the proper attitude toward their work and so prepare them to make the desired development later. These changes are, of necessity, gradual. Suggestions are made, when in my visits I observe that methods of teaching need improvement. Then the teachers are often compelled to readjust their whole attitude toward their work before they can get the desired results.

I have nothing but praise for the efforts of the teachers in this line. They have universally been anxious to do the best possible work, and are, without exception, trying to the best of their ability to get the results which I wish.

Our school work has a double character. We are to develop the mind and impart facts. The first of these elements is the more important. If a child has the proper nental development, the desire for the right kind of knowl-

edge, and the ability to read intelligently, nothing can prevent him from acquiring knowledge. Yet this is the element which is most frequently neglected.

Sometimes a false start is made by teaching reading as if the sole object were ability to recognize words. The pupil reads sentences as he would recite a list of words from his speller, the sole difference being that he lets his voice fall when he comes to a period. When this habit has once been formed, the possibility of informational reading has been lost. The study of geography, history, and physiology becomes mere memorizing of uncomprehended words. Enough words are memorized each day to satisfy the teacher's requirements and then the whole is speedily forgotten, since the subject-matter, which would naturally commend itself to the pupil as of practical value, has not been grasped.

A second defect, often, though not necessarily, dependent upon the first, is lack of understanding of facts and their implications. Even when the words of the book are not memorized, the statements of the book are often learned in separate, disjunctive form without any attempt to consider their connection or their relation to every-day life.

The various studies have been introduced into the curriculum because they are supposed to furnish knowledge which has direct bearing upon life and is necessary to successful life. No study could hold its place in the curriculum if this were not true of it. That being the case, it follows that if these subjects are not grasped and their relation to every-day life brought out, the elementary school has failed to accomplish the results for which it was created.

These are the ideas upon which my work of this year has been based. Tendencies toward mere word recognition were liberally found in the schools, though not in extreme form. Lack of grasp of facts and their relations to life has been quite general. A start has been made toward laying stress upon the development of the pupil, and I am convinced that progress will be substantial.

Three of the schools have changed teachers this year. Miss Mary R. Webster has been doing excellent work at the Pine Ground. She possesses that rare combination of qualities, long experience and a progressive spirit. The school is making progress under her direction.

Miss Margaret M. Better has had charge of the Center school this year. She has shown familiarity with good teaching method and capacity for growth. She has the making of a very good teacher.

Mrs. Martha A. George resigned her position as teacher of the Kelley's Corner school at the close of the fall term. She had given very good satisfaction and left a place difficult to fill. Miss Charlotte M. Burnham has taught the school during the winter term.

The policy of the board in keeping the school buildings in such good and substantial condition is deserving of a high degree of commendation. It is a rare delight to find a board in a town of this size doing such systematic and efficient work in this particular. The work done at the Kelley's Corner school this year is specially commendable. Everything was done with a view to permanency and ultimate economy. Moreover, the policy of having the walls and ceiling of light color was very well chosen. It is unfortunate that our school buildings are so poorly lighted. Where books are to be read constantly and in all parts of the room, an unusual amount of light is needed or the eyes of the pupils will suffer. Light colored walls and ceilings will do much to offset the lack of light arising from the scarcity and improper placing of windows.

In closing, I wish to thank the board for its unfailing co-operation and helpfulness during the year. Often service in a newly established district is considered undesirable. I have found my service of your board exceedingly pleasant, however. With such a spirit of sane, progressive, harmonious helpfulness in the board the work of your supervisor must be alike pleasant and successful.
