To the School Board of Chichester:

I have the privilege of submitting to you, and through you to the citizens of Chichester, my first annual report as superintendent of schools, this being the second in the series of such reports. My work having actually begun with the opening of schools in September this report must necessarily cover only that portion of the school year beginning at that date.

During this period I have made ninety-two visits to your schools, averaging for each school in number about fifteen, and in frequency, somewhat oftener than once in two weeks. The length of these visits have varied from a half hour to half a day, depending upon the opportunity and the exigencies. In addition I have attended two superintendents' conferences held at Plymouth, the meeting of the State Teachers' Association held at Manchester, and the meeting of the Merrimack Valley Teachers' Association held at Concord.

My work with the teachers in an endeavor to secure greater efficiency has been done in various ways. I have aimed to criticise in a helpful and sympathetic manner, to make my criticism constructive rather than destructive. I have advised, suggested, and directed. I have instructed teachers what to teach and how to teach it, both by careful explanation and by taking personal charge of classes and showing how it should be done. I have outlined work. I have made out daily programs for the help of teachers. I have questioned pupils to discover the strong as well as the weak places in the teaching. I have given individual instruction to pupils. I have helped teachers over hard places in discipline. And in every way possible I have tried

to arouse in both teachers and pupils a desire for better results.

Two teachers' meetings have been held so far during the year. These meetings have necessarily come on Saturdays and the readiness with which teachers have inconvenienced themselves to attend has been encouraging and gratifying. Teachers' meetings ought to be held regularly once a month. I suggest to the school board that some such regulation be made and that time be allowed the teachers for this purpose.

We have directed our efforts particularly towards the better teaching of what are sometimes called the fundamentals. The modern school especially one connected with a city system, attempts to teach a variety of subjects, the purpose being to give a broader training and to secure a better development of the mind of the boy and girl. This is well. But every good school, whether in city or country, teaches—and teaches well—reading, writing, spelling and arithmetic. It is with these subjects that we have been ·most concerned. Every parent has a right to expect that his child will learn in school to read easily and understandingly, to write a plain, legible hand, with a fair amount of speed, to spell correctly ordinary words, and to be familiar with the fundamental principles of arithmetic. Unless the schools produce these results after a reasonable time I take it that the parents have good reason to criticise both superintendent and teachers.

The superintendent in his report last year pointed out very plainly how much depends on good reading, on a pupil being able to sense a sentence or a paragraph. Reading is something more than pronouncing words. Much of our so-called reading is simply that. In my judgment the poor reading is due to the misdirected efforts on the part of the teacher. Some children learn to read naturally in spite of poor teaching. This is not true of the ordinary child. The reading of a child is likely to be a slow, halting, unsat-

isfactory process unless he gets the right start. Our trouble has been the start has not been right. Teaching is not an exact science. The last word has been said on few matters. But certain general principles have been accepted by educators as the correct ones to be used in the teaching of beginners to read. I have laid special stress on this point. Better work is being done and better results are apparent. To facilitate this work I urgently recommend that the school board adopt some such system for use as the New Education or the Gordon. Heretofore there has been either a lack of system or a system of the hit or miss variety, and it has too often been a miss. Furthermore I would recommend a very much increased supply of reading material. The amount we have available is far below the minimum which the state department of public instruction advises.

Our attendance has not been good, particularly this winter term. Absences there must of course be, but I have good reason to believe that many of the absences recorded might have been avoided. It ought to be the business of every boy and girl of school age to attend school regularly and punctually every day school is in session, provided of course he is physically able. He ought to consider going to school his particular business. Other matters ought to be secondary. Furthermore he ought to come with his mind in a condition to attend strictly to the work of school during school hours and not have it filled with extraneous matters. A good school is a very important factor in securing good attendance. Whole-hearted co-operation on the part of the home is another factor. We had for the year 471 tardinesses. The child habitually tardy at school is likely to be tardy all through life. We ought to reduce this record very materially this coming year.

At the opening of schools in September several new teachers began work. Miss Edith M. Towle, who had had one term's experience at the Brown school in Loudon, took up the work at Kelley's Corner. Miss Towle is energetic

and faithful, a growing teacher. The work has progressed smoothly. Miss Mary A. Dunphy, of Groton, Mass., who had had a little experience, took the school at the Centre. Miss Dunphy has had good scholastic training, has much natural ability, is resourceful, and is capable of becoming a strong teacher. Miss Edna Place, after a year at the Plymouth Normal School, returned for work at Bear Hill. During her year of training Miss Place caught the Plymouth spirit and is doing some exceptionally good teaching. Miss Mary R. Webster has continued at the Pine Ground to do work worthy of much commendation. Webster has a whole-hearted interest in her school, such as is not always found in teachers. Miss Kathryn Shaw spent the summer in study at Plymouth and has since successfully taken the examination for a state teacher's certificate. Miss Shaw is an earnest, progressive teacher. At the close of the fall term Miss Griffin, who had been a success at Horse Corner, found it necessary to resign on account of her health. Miss Ruth Sanborn has been teaching this school during the winter term. Miss Sanborn is hard-working and conscientious, always ready to receive suggestions.

A word of commendation is good for us all. We need it. I have found in all of our schools much to praise. I have also found a body of teachers ready to learn and to co-operate. I thank them for their assistance. Our relations have been without exception very pleasant.

I have already made certain recommendations in regard to books. I would further recommend that a new series of arithmetics be adopted. It is a poor policy to be continually changing books even if the probability is that something a little better will be secured. But these books have long been in use and are not adapted to what I think are our needs. The cost of a change would not be great. I would also suggest that our schools be provided with more wall maps in accordance with the state recommendations.

In conclusion I wish to say that the advancement of

pupils does not depend entirely on good teaching and good equipment. "There is no royal road to learning." This is something which we sometimes forget. Individual effort is absolutely essential for progress. The teacher can not do the child's work no matter how efficient or willing she may be. The child must do it himself. The teacher may do much towards securing this necessary effort; the home may do much. Good schools are impossible without the hearty co-operation of the homes.

I wish to acknowledge the many kindnesses shown me in my round of duties, particularly those by the children.
