To the School Board and Citizens of Chichester:

I herewith submit to you my third annual report as superintendent of your schools.

The work of your superintendent has been carried on in much the same manner as outlined in previous reports and there is no occasion for rehearsing methods. I wish to testify to the whole-hearted support which I have received from the teachers. We have, I am sure, made reasonable progress. During the year I have made about one hundred thirty visits to your schools. I have used my time in the manner which seemed to me most wise, working where work was most needed and where it would be effective. I have attended several teachers' institutes, the meeting of the State Teachers' Association and two superintendents' conferences. I have succeeded in getting the Chichester teachers together for one meeting. Such meetings ought to be held once a month and attendance should be a part of the required work of the teachers.

The school membership has averaged ninety-five for the year. This is practically what it was last year. We have made a gain in our per cent. of attendance. The attendance has been all that could be expected in four of our schools. I can especially commend the pupils at Kelley's Corner, Bear Hill and the Center. We have also kept the number of our tardinesses down with the exception of the fall term at Horse Corner. This school during this term had the unfortunate record of 119. However, one family is responsible for ninety-two of these. Any such number of course is entirely uncalled for. You will note that the membership at New Dover has decreased to eight. Three of these are pupils from Loudon. The school year has been thirty-one weeks in length. This shows a decrease of three weeks. This decrease in the number of weeks was made necessary, in part, by the increased salaries paid teachers. This increase in the salaries is inevitable. I trust that a sufficient appropriation may be made this year so that our schools may be in session not less than thirty-four weeks.

The experiment was tried this year of running the fall term up to Christmas, making a term of sixteen weeks. This resulted in a very short winter term of but three weeks. Under the old arrangement of a twelve-week fall term the winter term this year would have been seven weeks. I do not feel that the long fall term was altogether a success. I would suggest for another year that there be a week's vacation at Thanksgiving and another at Christmas.

An epidemic of measles broke up the school at Horse Corner during the spring term and the school was closed at the end of the sixth week. This school is making up this lost time this winter term and is in session at the writing of this report.

Miss Sophronia Yeaton, of Epsom, has continued to have charge of the music in the schools. I trust that the appropriation for this work may be continued. It is by no means the least important part of the school work and to give it up would seem to be a backward movement.

Six pupils from Chichester schools entered higher schools in September last, three of these on examination and three on the superintendent's certificate. The following were the pupils:

Entering Concord High School: Ethelyn M. Kempton, M. Agnes Lake, Lena M. Winslow.

Entering Pembroke Academy: Harold F. Ricker, Louise A. Seavey, Paul S. Seavey.

The reports which I have received in regard to the work of these pupils have been generally most favorable.

We have added some new reading material during the year. Much more should be added. It is poor policy for the child to thumb over the same old reading book for term after term. We have also introduced a new spelling book into the lower grades. We should now have the advanced book in the same series for the older children. We have also adopted an intermediate text in history and an advanced book in hygiene. This book in practical hygiene is one of the Gulick series and takes the place of the old technical physiology. I would recommend the adoption of a new language and grammar series. The grammars now in use are generally dilapidated.

New slate blackboards have been recently put in at Horse Corner. This is a much needed improvement. There is similar need at New Dover. This building is also in need of shingling. It would not be economy to longer delay this work. I would again call attention to the much needed shed at Horse Corner.

As the statistical table shows, there have been several changes in teachers. The new ones are Miss Simoneau, at Pine Ground; Miss Mabel Clark, of Concord, and Miss Ida Hale, of Boscawen, at Horse Corner; and Miss Ada Huntley, of Concord, at New Dover. Miss Edna Place was unable to take her school for the winter term on account of illness and Miss Mary Shaw kindly substituted. Four of our teachers are either normal graduates or state certified, namely, Miss Place, Miss Collins, Miss Hale and Miss Kathryn Shaw.

At the close of the spring term Miss Mary Webster, who had been in our schools for three years, resigned her position at New Dover. We were pained to learn during the summer of her death at her home in Lawrence, Mass. Miss Webster's life work was teaching. For nearly forty years she had taught in the schools of New Hampshire. She was a woman of strong and sturdy character, an efficient teacher of the old type. Her work was well and faithfully done.

Entertainments have been held in at least two of the schools during the year. In one of the schools (Center) the proceeds were used for the purchase of books as a nucleus of a school library and for a subscription to St. Nicholas; in the other school (Bear Hill) the proceeds were used for subscriptions to St. Nicholas, Youth's Companion and Current Events, and there is still a balance left which will probably be used for the purchase of wall pictures for the schoolroom.

I would suggest the possibility of using the schools much more generally for entertainments and social gatherings. The rural school ought to stand for something more than merely a place for the instruction of children for a few hours a day for five days in a week for some thirty-four weeks in the year. The cities are awakening to the need of a larger use of school buildings. The rural school may and in many cases ought properly to become the center of the social life of the community. Such financial returns as might result from appropriate entertainments, if used for schoolroom improvement, would tend to create an added interest in the school and the work of the school on the part of parents and pupils. We have an ample field for work in the matter of schoolroom improvement. Our schools need pictures of the right kind, reference books, school libraries, new curtains (in some cases), sinks that there may be better washing facilities, individual drinking cups, etc. I would encourage properly utilizing our school buildings for the promotion of appropriate activities, thus affording another opportunity for wholesome social life and with the hope that some of the needs which I have suggested might thus be met. As one form which such social activity might take, I would suggest the revival of

the old-fashioned spelling-bee which would also have an intellectual value.

It is certainly the duty of the country school to develop and foster in the boys and girls a love for the country and of nature, to help them to see and appreciate the beautiful things in God's creation all about them. We should have in our schools sensible nature study. We should clean up and make beautiful our school grounds. There is work here of a sensible and practical kind for the boys and even for the girls. School gardens are as much needed in the country as in the city. Each school should have its garden and the children should have individual gardens at home. "Of all the wonderful things in the wonderful universe of God, nothing seems to me more surprising than the planting of a seed in the black earth and the result thereof."

In connection with the Keene Normal School there is maintained a model rural school. In addition to the ordinary work of the school the boys are learning carpentry and the girls sewing and cooking. This work is all of a very practical nature. The boys built and set up their own benches. The girls have made towels and curtains for the schoolroom. Many of the pupils bring their dinners. The work in cooking aims "through the preparation of some nourishing and attractive dish to augment the children's lunch brought from home." Something hot is provided every day by the older girls to supplement the cold lunches. One day it will be baked potatoes. Each child brings a potato from home and the lesson on baking potatoes results in each child having a hot baked potato for dinner. The next day it may be hasty pudding. This special work is all carried on by the regular teacher. The normal schools to-day are graduating girls who are trained to do this kind of work. I think we shall all agree that this is practical and sensible education for boys and girls. I may add that there are several country towns in the state where similar work is being done, and it is meeting with the hearty approval of the communities. I trust the time is not far distant when we can make a beginning.

In conclusion, I wish to thank the school board, the teachers and the public for their kindly support.
