REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS.

To the School Board and Citizens of Chichester:

I have the pleasure of submitting to you my fourth annual report as superintendent of your schools.

You are familiar with the activities of a superintendent from observation and previous reports so that a restatement is not necessary. I have made about one hundred thirty visits to schools during the year.

I call attention to the statistical table printed on another page. This contains information as to teachers, salaries and attendance. For the year ending in June, 1913, the average membership for all schools was 99, the average attendance 93 and the per cent. of attendance 93 and a fraction. The statistical table shows the attendance to have been very good in some of the schools but not altogether satisfactory in others.

The enrollment in our schools since September has been larger than usual. The school at Pine Ground has numbered 26. Miss Shaw has handled a rather difficult situation ably and with little friction.

The school year has been but thirty-one weeks in length. It ought to have been thirty-five at least. We cannot expect to do in thirty-one weeks the work which requires thirty-six weeks in other towns.

We have employed since September but one state certified teacher, namely, Miss Kathryn Shaw. Miss McWilliams, who was at the Center during the fall, is a graduate of the Portsmouth Training School. Miss McWilliams did excellent work. Miss Brockway, who has been at Bear Hill, is a graduate of the Concord Training School for Teachers. Miss Caldwell has had some kindergarten training. It should be our policy to secure as far as possible normal graduates or state certified teachers.

The year at the Horse Corner school was somewhat broken up by the illness of the teacher. The Center school was closed early because of an unruly chimney.

The chimneys in several of the schools have been the source of considerable annoyance. Constructed as they are they could not fail to give trouble. The chimney at the Center should certainly be rebuilt at the first opportunity.

There are a good many minor repairs on the buildings that need attention. It is economy to look after the small things when the need first arises. The shed at the Bear Hill school should be repaired. The doors in several schools should be replaced.

I suggested in my report a year ago the possibility of using the schoolrooms more generally for social purposes. I want to repeat the suggestion and refer you to what was said a year ago. It would be an excellent thing if we might have meetings occasionally, at the schools or elsewhere, of parents, citizens, teachers and superintendent for the intelligent discussion of school matters. I believe that very much of profit might come from such meetings.

The superintendent should be the executive officer for the school board. His authority under the present law must be granted him by the local board as a board. For the school board and superintendent to work most effectively for the good of the schools there should be regular times for conference. The board would do well to meet regularly once a month. It should be the business of the superintendent to be present. The meeting should be for report, discussion, and planning. The superintendent has a right to know just what the board expects of him. When this is clear he ought to be given a free hand and he should be held responsible for the results. On the other hand, the board ought to know just what the superintendent is doing and the conditions of each of the schools. A board member is a member for the whole district, not for a part of it simply. It should be the duty of the superintendent to make a report at the regular meeting, present the needs, and make recommendations. He cannot well do this effectively in any other way.

Again, such meetings would afford an opportunity for keeping the financial situation better in hand. All bills could be squared up once a month and the board would know where it stood financially. It would be an easy matter at the beginning of the year with a knowledge of the approximate amount of the resources to determine the length of the school year. This, of course, is impossible unless the board acts as a unit and not as individuals.

There was some misunderstanding a year ago in regard to the matter of state aid for schools. There are three main sources of school money, namely, the dog tax, local taxation, and the state. From the state the district receives yearly its proportion of the "literary fund," depending upon the enrollment. This generally amounts to about \$100 in Chichester. In addition, the district receives from the state one half the superintendent's salary and a rebate, which varies with the tax rate, on the high school tuition paid. A district may secure in addition what is known as "state aid" provided certain conditions are satisfied. The conditions with which we are concerned are as follows: the school year must be at least thirty weeks in length, the equalized valuation per pupil of average attendance must be under \$9,500, and the local tax for school purposes must be \$3.40 on a thousand dollars of equalized valuation, which means that Chichester must raise for schools by taxation a total of \$2,732. The first condition we shall meet, the second one probably, and the third depends upon you.

The lawful method of raising money for schools has changed somewhat under recent laws. Under the new apportionment the school district of Chichester is required by law to raise for schools \$1,252.50. No vote on this is necessary. It is obligatory. In addition, it is the duty of the school board to notify the selectmen the amount that will be needed the next year for books and supplies, for flags and appurtenances, and for high school tuition. The school meeting need take no action in the matter. It is obligatory on the school board to make such requisition as to them seems wise and it is obligatory on the selectmen to assess and turn over the same to the district treasurer. Again, it is the duty of the district meeting to determine the salaries of the district officers and to raise and appropriate money for the same. Furthermore, the district meeting may raise such additional school money as it sees fit, including extra money for repairs. In order for the district to secure state aid, it must tax itself to the amount of \$2,732; that is, the amount of school money required by law, namely, \$1,252.50, plus the amount assessed for books and supplies, etc., plus the amount of officers' salaries, plus the additional school money voted, must total at least \$2,732. State aid this year would amount to from \$175 to \$200. If we had a school year of thirty-five weeks and employed none but certified teachers it would amount to \$500. I trust I have made this matter clear.

We ought to have at least \$150 to put into books and supplies this next year. I urge the board to make request for not less than that amount.

We shall probably need not less than \$350 for high school tuition. We have, I believe, ten pupils now in attendance at high schools.

In conclusion I wish to thank the school board, the teachers, and the public for their forbearance and support, and the children for their many kindnesses which have helped to make the work a pleasure.
