REPORT STATE TAX COMMISSION, 1914.

INCREASE IN PUBLIC EXPENDITURES.

No power has constituted the members of the tax commission guardians of the public in respect to expenditures for the support of government, and they have no disposition to assume that role. Nevertheless, "economy being a most essential virtue in all states," and it being "the duty of legislators and magistrates \* \* \* to countenance and inculcate the principles of \* \* \* economy," all as set forth in the constitution of this state, the commissioners believe themselves to be amply justified in urging, as they have so often urged before, the importance of this subject upon the voters of the state. The public revenue, state and municipal, is the voters' business and they are responsible, directly or indirectly, for every extravagance affecting it from the inception to the termination of the fund.

Every compulsory contribution levied by public authority upon people or property is in the broad sense of the term a tax, nor is it made less obnoxious or burdensome if called a fee or a fine. In the figures that follow, therefore, all fees, fines, and other exactions, if any, are included with the taxes upon polls and estates. To illustrate the comparative importance of the two classes, it may be said that the taxes upon polls and estates represent about 95 per cent. and all other income about 5 per cent. of the total revenue of the state, and of the counties, cities, towns, districts and precincts therein.

Taxes as defined above have increased by leaps and bounds in recent years. In 1903 the sum of all the taxes assessed by and within the state of New Hampshire was \$5,373,420.22; in 1913 it was \$8,765,039.07, an increase of \$3,391,618.85, or 63 per cent., in ten years. But these figures do not adequately represent the velocity the upward movement has now attained. To show that it is necessary to divide the ten-year period: The levy in 1908 was \$924,388.79, or 17 per cent. greater than in 1903, while that in 1913 was \$2,467,230.06, or 39 per cent. greater than in 1908. By so much did the advance in the last half of said period exceed that in the first half. These figures will be the more alarming if it is remembered that while taxes already sufficiently heavy were advancing 63 per cent., the population of the state increased only about 4½ per cent., and while the one was advancing 39 per cent., the other increased only about 2¼ per cent.

It is instructive to study the subject from another angle. In the ten years from 1904 to 1914, both inclusive, the annual increase in all taxes defined and limited as above was as follows:

The average yearly increase for the whole period was \$336,561.85. The upward trend is more plainly shown,

however, by dividing, as before, the ten-year period in the middle and considering the halves separately. For the first five years the average annual increase was \$184,877.76; for the last five years it was \$493,446.01. It is surely pertinent to consider how long the little state of New Hampshire, almost stationary in wealth, can sustain a tax already burdensome and increasing at the rate of practically half a million dollars a year without crippling her industries and impoverishing her people. Plainly it is a condition not calculated to attract capital from without the state or to encourage business within the same.

From the *per capita* standpoint the situation is not less disturbing. In 1903 there were assessed \$12.88 in taxes for each man, woman and child in the state. Five years later there were assessed \$14.75 for each individual, and in five years more \$20.09. If in 1913 taxes had been equally distributed among all the people it would have meant a burden of \$100 for each family of five members. Though in reality there was little such equality in the assessment there was much in the payment. The fact is that those who occupy, use or consume property, no matter who owns it, are those who in the last analysis pay most, if not all, of the taxes thereon. If the wage earner or the man of limited means understood he was in reality paying something like \$100 a year in state and municipal and half as much more in federal taxes for the government of himself, his wife and three children his influence and his vote would more frequently make for economy in appropriations and expenditures than heretofore.

No statistics for the year 1914 appear in the above paragraphs for the reason that they are not yet at hand except in part.

## REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS.

Statistics generally afford dry reading, but they are often suggestive and illuminating if carefully studied. I call your attention to the statistical table accompanying this report. You will observe that our school year in three of our schools has been but twenty-eight weeks in length and in the other three but twenty-nine weeks. I do not need to tell you that it is unfortunate that we are going backward instead of forward in this particular. As I have repeatedly said, the school year ought not to be less than thirty-five weeks. There are at present, if I am not mistaken, thirteen pupils from Chichester attending high schools or academies for whom the district pays tuition. These children are provided with a school year of thirty-eight and forty weeks, while we give the children in the Chichester schools less than thirty weeks. This does not seem to me altogether just. Furthermore, it is quite impossible to do satisfactorily a full year's school work in twenty-nine weeks. I am sure this is evident to any one who stops to consider the matter.

The attendance has been excellent for the most part. Whooping-cough broke up things somewhat in some of the schools during the winter term. The regularity of the attendance of the pupils at school is one test of the efficiency of a school. As a rule the attendance is poor in a poor school. There is still some need for a better appreciation of the value of punctuality.



The statistical table shows the teachers for each term. Some changes are inevitable, but our policy ought to be to keep a good teacher if possible. While the salary we pay is fair for a town of this type, the fact that our school year is very short is to our disadvantage in securing acceptable teachers. It is perfectly evident that the teacher will choose the position which gives her the longest year of work. There are but very few towns in New Hampshire now which do not have more than thirty weeks in the year.

We had during the last term two state qualified teachers, Miss Kathryn Shaw and Miss Mabel Sargent. If this town was entitled to state aid it would receive two dollars per week for each of these teachers.

Our school buildings are on the whole in good condition, although none of them measure up to the standard which State Superintendent Morrison made for us in his very practical talk before the grange. The seats and desks at the Pine Ground and Bear Hill schools ought to be replaced at once with something of a more modern type. I do not think the present equipment reflects credit on the district. Care should be taken that the new desks and seats are either adjustable or so graduated that the small children will not be compelled to sit and dangle their legs with their feet several inches from the floor, as is the case at the Center school. The interior appearance of this school is attractive, but the seating arrangements for the little people are positively bad and ought to be corrected at an early date.

The blackboard accommodations at the Pine Ground school are very unsatisfactory. The boards are old and the writing surface exceedingly poor. These old boards should be taken out and natural slate put in and about double the present number of boards. If this school is to be what it ought to be the physical conditions must

be much improved. There is similar need at the New Dover school. This building is also in need of further attention. The walls and ceiling are in bad condition and the general appearance is unattractive. I trust that the district in making the appropriations may take these needs into consideration.

We have been in the past rather economical and almost parsimonious in our supply of text-books and other material for the children. Compared with the wealth of material which some other school systems furnish, our supply has been somewhat meagre. By all means we should continue to be economical, but let us not overdue the thing. I think we ought to have for new material this next year not less than one hundred twenty-five dollars. I hope the board may deem it wise to ask for that sum.

It may not be unwise for me to repeat a recommendation which I made a year ago. I believe it would be of benefit to the schools if the school board should have regular meetings. There are continually arising matters which need the consideration of the board as a board. If meetings were regular and bills regularly paid the board would have some notion of the financial condition at all times. At the beginning of the year some reasonable division of the money to be available could be made and an attempt made to keep within such assignments in the expenditures. Furthermore, regular meetings would afford that opportunity which is very much needed for the superintendent to better understand the desires of the board and to regularly report to them the condition of each school.

I presume we are all mindful of the effort which is being made in many localities to bring the home and the school into closer touch and to a better mutual understanding. The schools cannot assume if they would the whole task of educating the boys and girls. The home

has an equally important part. The home and school have mutual interests and they are mutually responsible in this business of training children. It is necessary that they work together and that they be mutually sympathetic if the thing is to be successfully done. There is one agency which has been found to be a strong force in bringing about this coöperation. I refer to the parent-teacher association. Organizations of teachers, parents and all citizens interested in good schools and child welfare are being formed in many places. They afford an opportunity for the people to get acquainted with the teachers and the teachers with the people. Meeting once a month, questions relating to schools and community conditions are discussed. Everyone has an opportunity to express his ideas. The matter is seen from various angles. Mutual sympathy and the better understanding for which we are working are pretty sure to be developed. The mere getting together of the people in a rural community for such a purpose can not fail to be productive of much good. I believe some such organization ought to be formed in Chichester.

There is one large item of expenditure which ought not to be overlooked in making the estimates for the next year. Nearly four hundred fifty dollars was paid out this last year for high school tuition. I estimate that the bill this next year will be nearly six hundred dollars. It is perfectly evident that additional money must be raised to meet this or the local schools will suffer even more than they have this year. The district raised this last year by taxation for school purposes a total of \$2,617.50. If a total of \$2,732 is raised this year there is a chance of securing state aid.
