At Kelley's Corner, new windows have been placed on left and rear of pupils in order to meet the requirements for normal lighting of a room; also a new toilet building has been built.

In order to meet the requirements of a model building, there is need of new single adjustable seats, the laying of a new floor and the installation of a new heater. The wood shed is also in need of repairs.

At the Pine Ground, the walls and ceiling should be painted, preferably a light color that would brighten the room.

In all the school houses there is need for new curtains and chairs.

The exterior of Kelley's Corner and Center houses should receive a new coat of paint.

MEDICAL INSPECTION

The following data are taken from the report of Dr. Lewis D. Gilmore, medical inspector, for year ending June 30, 1921:

All the cases enumerated were reported to the parents of the children with the advice to consult their family physician. Some cases have been corrected but more efficient work might be accomplished through the work of a district nurse following up and complementing the work of the physician.

SCHOOL ATTENDANCE

From the statistical table we note that in attendance for the year ending June 30, 1921, four of the schools maintained a good average of attendance, but two schools were exceedingly low. Also in three of the schools the number of tardinesses were excessive. However, on consulting registers, I find some improvement since September.

Parents should co-operate in correcting this evil as regularity in attendance and punctuality is one of the essentials of a successful life.

SCHOOL WORK

During the year special attention has been given to the fundamentals—reading, writing, spelling, language oral and written, and numbers.

Since September, especial emphasis has been placed on writing. Houghton's system has been adopted.

We are living in the days of standardization. No longer should we be entirely governed by the diagnosis of the teacher, supplemented by the arbitrary examinations of a superintendent, but we must submit our grading to standard tests.

Our grades must not only be on equal standing with the grades of our neighboring town but on a par with those of same grade in state and nation.

With this in view it is my intention to submit our pupils at the beginning of the spring term to Adams' test in reading, Ayer's test in writing and spelling, Witham's test in English and Curtis' test in arithmetic.

One of the most valuable and significant movements during the last decade is the attempt to measure with some degree of scientific accuracy the results of the class room. The many tests so far evolved are far from perfect, yet what has been already done represents a marked advance over the method of judgment by personal opinion. Conclusions reached by such methods are more accurate than those based upon vague impressions of what ought to be and will result in definite economy of time and achievement of results.

The educational advancement of our pupils during the year is worthy of commendable comment. The pupils have responded well to the demands of our educational system through the earnest and persistent corps of teachers who have been on the alert to do all in their power in the interests of their pupils.

We have tried to impress on our pupils the maxim: "Good reading is the key to good scholarship."

We must give great attention to reading, oral and silent.

Drawing has been developed more or less during the year in connection with other studies, viz: geography and nature studies.

We should continue this work by lessons in form, color, designing, etc.

In music, although there has been no supervisor of music, yet the teachers in some of the schools have taught the rudiments and developed many songs and hymns.

"Moral instruction of the child is the highest duty imposed upon the teacher." Special attention should be given to general instruction in this line. These lessons should involve stories from United States history, conversational lessons on the human body, etiquette, cleanliness, obedience, respect, manners and morals.

In conclusion, I wish to acknowledge the pleasure with which I have endeavored to perform my duties in your community.

Whatever of success that may have attended my efforts is largely due to the earnest co-operation of teachers, to the wise counsel of the School Board and the support of citizens and patrons of the schools.
