### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

To the Inhabitants of the town of Chichester in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Chichester on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to /defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To see if the town will vote to give the Selectmen authority to hire money on temporary loans in anticipation of taxes.
- 4. To see if the town will vote to pay two percent discount on all taxes paid on or before July 1, 1923.
- 5. To bring in your ballots upon the question as to whether the amendment proposed by the convention to revise the constitution shall be approved.
- 6. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$400 to fight the White Pine Blister Rust.
- 7. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$4,500, the state and federal government to give the sum

of \$13,500, to finish the central road, being road from Concord, N. H., to Dover, N. H.

- 8. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$1,100, the state to give the sum of \$2,700, for trunk line maintenance.
- 9. To see if the town will vote to choose a committee of three voters to assist the Selectmen in making the appraisal of all the taxable property in town in April, 1923.

#### REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS.

To the School Board and Citizens of Chichester:

I herein submit my eighth annual report as superintendent of schools.

#### REPAIRS.

At Kelley's Corner, the house should be painted, a new floor laid and new seats installed.

At the Pine Ground, the ceiling and walls should be oiled or painted.

At the Center, the house should be painted and the ceiling and walls freshened by a new coat of paint.

A few minor repairs to windows and doors needed in nearly all the school houses.

I recommend the continuance of the constructive policy begun a few years ago. I believe in the long run it means economy to the town and advancement of its educational interests.

#### METHOD AND SCHOOL WORK.

During the year we have continued the use of Houghton's system of writing and applied the Ayer standard tests to both writing and spelling. In spelling we have used nearly all avenues of approach to the child in order to get the word taught into the system of the child, viz: the ear, eye, muscles of throat and those of arm and hand, i. e., the child is given the word from the board, sometimes by quick perception method, then he spells it orally and uses it in a sentence; afterwards writes it in his spelling book. We are getting better spellers, considered

as a whole school, than we did several years ago. In writing we aim at neatness, legibility and a fair amount of speed.

In reading, we devote the first three years to the mechanics of reading, i. e., giving the child the tools by which he can decipher the written or printed word. More emphasis has been placed on the sounding of letters, syllables, and words and the drill on phonics.

We have tried to impress on the pupils the importance of correct syllabication of words, both in spelling and reading.

After the third grade, attention is turned more particularly to three points, viz.: (1) the getting the thought from the printed page; (2) silent reading under the direction of the teacher—the getting the thought for ourselves; (3) oral reading—the giving of the thought to another which implies clear articulation and enunciation and a proper expression of thought. In fact, teachers who have insisted that the pupil give back the thought in his own words, even from the first grade, have developed the best readers.

In number work or arithmetic, we have aimed to begin with the concrete and then go to the abstract.

In the first and second grades some picture work has been done to illustrate the principles in concrete form. We have tried to master all possible combinations of the numbers up to ten in the first grade, and in some schools, even to twenty; also developed and given thorough drill on the multiplication tables. We are old-fashioned enough to believe in continued drill on the tables and combinations of numbers until the pupil's mind responds automatically and readily. After this ground-work preparation we confine our work to the practical principles that enter into the needs of the ordinary citizen, viz:

drill on the four fundamental principles—addition, subtraction, multiplication, and division, then common and decimal fractions, percentage with its applications, i. e., profit and loss, commission, insurance, taxes, simple interest and compound with its application to banking, measurements of the quadrilateral, triangle, circle and problems that are based upon them, wood, lumber, coal; indeed, problems that develop the principles of lengths, areas, and contents; carpeting, papering, and the right triangle, which implies the knowledge of square root.

In geography, history, physiology and other subjects of similar nature, teachers who have used the topical method under the guidance of the five steps in teaching given in the State Program of Studies, chapter seventeen, have obtained the best results.

The following is a list of pupils who passed the eighth grade examinations last June and the name of the school they attended.

Center—Fisher Edmunds, Adah Stevens; Bear Hill—Ethelyn Lake.

#### GENERAL REMARKS.

From the statistical table we find a small gain in average attendance, about 2% over previous years, but in tardy marks there was a decrease of 338, or more than 56% of last year's marks. This is a good record for one year. The number of tardy marks is often considered a thermometer of the condition of the school. On account of sickness, inclement weather and impassable roads, the average attendance may be lowered without any fault of the school, but tardy marks are usually within the possibilities of parents and pupils to control.

During the fifteen weeks of school from Sept. 5th to Dec. 22nd, a better record in attendance and punctuality

has been maintained than is given in the statistical table for year ending June 30, 1922. But during the term in progress at time of writing this report, the exceeding cold and stormy weather, sickness and impassable roads have wrought havoc in our ranks in attendance, and tarnished our record for punctuality.

Indeed, if this winter be a sample of what we may expect in the future, I would recommend that we begin our fall term by the middle of August. If we happened to have a few days of intolerable heat in the school room, the teacher could take her pupils in the shade of some oak or maple and get along far more easily than plowing through the snow of impassable roads in weather that is decidedly cold, bleak, stormy, and dangerous to the health of little children.

In conclusion, I wish to thank the teachers, school board and citizens for helpful support and loyal co-operation.
