# TOWN WARRANT THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Chichester in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Chichester on Tuesday, the 15th day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation for same.
- 3. To see if the town will vote to pay three per cent discount on all property taxes paid on or before July 1, 1925.
- 4. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$375, the State to give \$375, for town road maintenance.
- 5. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$100, the State to give \$100 for State Aid maintenance.
- 6. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$1,200, the State to give \$4,800 for Trunk line maintenance.

- 7. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$2,000, the State and Federal to contribute \$8,000 for the Trunk line construction.
- 8. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum for an Old Home Day celebration in 1925.
- 9. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$600, the Forestry department to furnish \$150 to fight the white pine blister rust.

#### EXPLANATION

- 1. The salaries of the district officers and of the truant officers are determined by the district.
- 2. The superintendent's excess salary is established by the supervisory union and has been set at \$116.67 for next year. The expenses of administration include the clerical and office expenses of the school board, district treasurer, and superintendent.
- 3. For the support of elementary schools a tax of \$5 on \$1,000 of the equalized valuation must be raised in order to get any aid from the state. The big item here is teachers' salaries. Good teachers cost the district no more than poor teachers, for the total cost of the schools for instruction and operation in excess of the "\$5 tax," which was \$4,166.55 this year, is paid by the state, providing only that each item of the expenditures is reasonable and approved by the State Board of Education. Other items here are text books, supplies, fuel, janitors, transportation, medical inspection, minor repairs to buildings and equipment, and elementary tuition of pupils going to school out of town.

- 4. It is expected that eighteen or nineteen Chichester boys and girls will attend high schools or academies next year. The tuition rate is usually \$70 per year so that about \$1,300 will be needed for this item.
- 5. The law states that "the school board of every district shall provide standard elementary schools" and that "a standard school is one—equipped with approved furniture, books, maps and other necessary appliances." The desks and seats at the Center school could not be approved by any sensible person. The school board cannot perform its duty in this regard unless the district furnishes the money. A definite policy of building and equipment improvement should be adopted and carried out. A certain amount should be raised each year for this purpose. The buildings and equipment are badly in need of repairs more extensive than the \$25 per building allowed by the state will accomplish.
- 6. A tax of \$2 per pupil is required by law for state wide supervision.

To the Chichester School Board:

I take pleasure in submitting herewith my second annual report as superintendent of your schools. I shall aim to state briefly some of the accomplishments of the past year and to point out some of the problems to be met in the near future.

#### Teaching Force.

In my report last year I mentioned the changes in the teaching force from the previous year and also the changes during the year. At the close of the year three of the teachers decided to go elsewhere: Miss Jeannotte, Miss McKay, and Miss Towle. Miss Doris Spiller of Gorham was elected to take Miss McKay's place at Horse Corner and Miss Alberta Taft of Winchester, a graduate of Keene Normal School, took Miss Towle's place.

It is interesting to note from a comparison of the table with the one for last year that from 1922-23 to 1923-24 (1) the number of half days lost per school decreased from 20.2 to 19.0, which is an increase in the time schools were actually in session of 1.2 half days; (2) the total enrollment remained the same; (3) the per cent of attendance increased 1.7 per cent; (4) the number of tardinesses decreased from 193 to 113, and (5) the number of pupils neither absent nor tardy increased from one to four.

This year I have included in the statistical report the number of visits to the schools by citizens and by the superintendent. In 1922-23 the total number of visits by citizens to all Schools was 190, and in 1923-24, 175, and the total number of visits by the superintendent was 62 in 1922-23 and 92 in 1923-24, an increase of six visits per school. I hope that parents and other citizens will keep up their good record. An interest in the schools expressed by going to them and observing the work done by the children encourages them to do better.

#### Promotion.

At the end of the year three pupils were promoted to Grade II, five to Grade III, seven to Grade IV, ten to Grave V, seven

to Grade VII, five to Grade VIII, ten to Grade VIII, and thirteen to high school. The names of the pupils who completed the elementary school work follow: Charles Burton, Gerald Edmunds, Scott Edmunds, Dorothy Ford, John Grady, Mary Kelley, Phyllis Lake, Martha Leaver, Alice Marston, Ethel Packer, Christopher Perry, Norman Rice, and Merwin Shaw.

#### Teachers' Meetings.

At the monthly teachers' meetings the chief problem worked upon was the development of a detailed curriculum, or program of studies, for our schools. When we realize that the curriculum is a list, or series, of activities through which the needs of life are satisfied, arranged in that sequence which fits them to the progressively expanding interests and capacities of pupils—placing those activities in the first grade which first-grade children can experience with profit and satisfaction in meeting their needs, those in the fourth grade meeting the needs of fourth grade children and so on—we get an idea of the difficulty of the task. Teachers loyally spent much time and effort in getting to these meetings and taking part in the work.

#### Marking System.

The marking system adopted and put into effect during the year is scientifically sound, and has been used with satisfaction throughout the country. By this system the mark given a pupil is based, not upon some arbitrary standard of perfection, but upon what he accomplishes as compared with what other pupils accomplish who are working on problems of the same difficulty. Scientific investigation has shown that about seven per cent of all pupils' work is truly "excellent," twenty-four per cent is not equal to the best yet is better than the average and "highly satisfactory," thirty-eight per cent is "average," twenty-four per cent is "poor but passable," and seven per cent is unsatisfactory, very poor and a "failure." These five groups of work are marked A. B, C, D, and E re-

spectively. These letters have absolutely no connection with the per cents in the old percentage system of marking, but they shown what group a child is placed in according to the quality of his work as compared with that of other pupils of his same grade. For example, if a pupil gets a mark of B in spelling for the month, it means that in every ordinary group of one hundred pupils of his grade about twenty-three others do about the same quality of work, seven do considerably better and sixty-nine do less well.

#### Methods.

Early in the fall of 1923 a method in spelling was adopted that was entirely different from the one formerly in use. There are two important features of the method now in use: (1) testing to find out what words of the most common ones each pupil does not know how to spell and having the pupil study only those words, and (2) regular testing and review of words previously studied. The method is economical because a pupil spends no time studying words he will seldom use or words he already knows how to spell, and it is thorough because he is tested five times on every one of the approximately six hundred words for his grade—once before he studies, twice during the week he studies it first, and twice in one week one month after he studied it first.

In reading the Progressive Road to Reading method has been adopted. This method makes use of the study of the sound of the letters and groups of letters, and it is giving good results in oral reading.

In geography the Frye-Atwood series of text books was adopted. The pupils are now interested in learning, not about the exact location and population of unimportant and far distant towns and cities nor about the exact height of all the peaks in the Rocky Mountains, but about the lives of boys and girls, and men and women in neighboring and typical towns and cities, and about the effect of mountains, rivers, valleys, etc., upon the occupations and ideals of these people.

At the beginning of school in September, 1924 several new adoptions were made: the Houston system in handwriting, and new text books in history in grades five and six, and in language in grades three to eight.

In handwriting the arm movement is insisted upon sufficiently to insure a smooth movement of the hand across the page and an uncramped letter formation. Marked improvement in even the unsupervised writing is already noticeable.

In history in grades five and six we are endeavoring to give an understanding of early civilization through interesting stories as a basis for the study of American history in the two upper grades.

In language we are focusing our efforts primarily on the problem of the correction of the pupil's habits already incorrectly formed and the establishing of new correct habits, and are teaching only such rules and technical grammar as is necessary for the pupil to properly understand these habits. The child is led into situations where he is likely to use incorrect language and required to express his ideas in correct form. We firmly believe this will result in a marked improvement in the pupil's everyday language habits and in his ability to express himself.

#### Repairs and Equipment.

A few important repairs have been made during the past year. The Kelley's Corner schoolhouse has been shingled, the Center schoolhouse has been shingled on one side and painted, and the Pine Ground shed has been repaired. The need for more satisfactory seats and desks at the Center, however, is still unmet. Good work in handwriting and neat papers in any written work cannot be expected of pupils so poorly provided for. I wish to repeat what was stated in my report last year: "A carefully studied policy of progressive development of school buildings and schoolrooms should be adopted. In addition to the minor repairs, such as cleaning, oiling of floors, painting, and shingling that should be made every year, a few hundred dollars should be invested in

such improvements as new desks, blackboards, schoolroom heaters, chemical toilets, and remodeling. If Chichester boys and girls are to have opportunities equal to those for boys and girls in other parts of the state and country, this must be done." We are giving them better books, better supplies, better teachers and more time in school, and they need better physical conditions under which to study.

According to present indications there will be but three Chichester pupils at Kelley's Corner next year, as there are now. It is uneconomical to maintain this school with so few pupils. Again I state as I did last year that the scheme of building a modern two-room schoolhouse near the junction of the Bear Hill and State roads and consolidating the Kelley's Corner, Bear Hill and Pine Ground schools should be carefully considered.

#### Summary.

In summarizing, the main accomplishments of the past year have been (1) an increase in the actual time the children are in school, and (2) an increase in the efficiency of the instruction because of careful study on the part of the teachers through teachers' meetings of the selection of the content matter of the subjects taught and of the methods of instruction. The main problems to be met in the near future are, first, the continual development of a program of studies, or curriculum, for the schools, worked out in detail as regards both content and method, and, second, the improvement of the psysical factors of the child's school environment (a) by furnishing better equipment and (b) by further consolidation.

In conclusion I wish to express my appreciation of the loyal support of the School Board, the teachers, the parents, and the pupils in the work of the schools during the past year. We are all working for the same thing—the education of our

boys and girls—and it is only by doing in co-operation that we can accomplish the desired end.
