#### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Chichester in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Chichester on Tuesday, the 9th day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation for same.

3. To see if the Town will vote to pay three per cent. discount on all property taxes paid on or before July 1, 1926.

4. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$300, the State to give \$300 for town road maintenance.

5. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$100, the State to give \$100 for state aid maintenance.

6. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$2500, the State and Federal government to contribute \$7500 for trunk line construction.

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$1200, the State to give \$5400 for trunk line maintenance.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$600, the Forestry Department to give \$150 for White Pine Blister control.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise a sum for permanent improvement, on road from Central road to Langmaid's hill.

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise a sum of money for the installation of electric lights in the town hall, also a sum for setting poles.

# REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

# To the Chichester School Board:

I herewith submit for your consideration my third annual report as superintendent of schools. Its aims will be to discuss the progress of the schools during the past year and to indicate some of the problems that will deserve attention in the near future.

#### COMPARATIVE STATISTICS

A comparison of the important items in the statistical tables for the last five years, and with a few state averages for last year is shown in the following table. The drop in average membership, the increase in the per cent. of attendance, and the gradual elimination of unnecessary tardiness are the most noticeable factors.

Chichester ranks enviably high in the proportion of those completing the eighth grade who go to high school. In a town where transportation to high school is so difficult it means a double burden upon the parents to keep their children in school, and the fact that they do is proof of the determination that their boys and girls shall not go out to meet the complex problems of adult life, and the especially keen competition of the next generation, severely handicapped by the lack of a good fundamental education.

#### HEALTH SUPERVISION

The following table states the results of the health inspection made last spring. It shows that nearly onehalf the pupils in school were handicapped with defective teeth, and several with bad tonsils or with adenoids, and two were in school without being vaccinated. These defects cause many stomach up-sets and colds, lower the children's efficiency in school, often keeping them out entirely, and sometimes lead to permanent serious illness. Although commonly considered as trivial, they are really serious, and experience has taught us that their correction is highly beneficial.

#### Music

At the beginning of this school year Miss Ellen Dean Hall of Weymouth, Mass., a graduate of the New England Conservatory of Music, was employed as supervisor of music. Once each week Miss Hall visits each school and spends from thirty to forty-five minutes giving instruction in music. She also leaves suggestions for the regular teacher regarding the work for the following week. She is endeavoring to develop the desire to sing and to know good music and the ability to appreciate it, and the children are responding well. They are finding much present pleasure in their new work, and they are getting a foundation in an art, both in expression and in impression, from which they will derive much enjoyment all through their lives.

#### REPAIRS AND NEW EQUIPMENT

During the past year a few much needed improvements have been made. At the Center ten new single pedestal desks and seats and about six feet of slate blackboard have been installed, and a new flag pole has been erected, and at Bear Hill the schoolhouse has been painted on the outside. In the near future several important repairs should be attended to. I shall mention only a few and those the most urgent. They can all be made without a heavy expense. The stove at Bear Hill is entirely unfit for use and should be replaced immediately. If this building is to be used next year, the interior should be painted and the blackboards, which have become cracked and exceedingly rough, should be replaced, as also should those at the Center, except the new slate ones, for they are in the same condition. At the Pine Ground we have tried unsuccessfully for two years to fix the blackboards so

The figures in the above table were taken from copies of the reports of the school census made each October to the State Board of Education. Although there are slight errors, due to the difficulty of making an accurate enumeration, yet it is evident that in the past few years there has been a decided slump in the child population, but we cannot be sure that the trend is permanent. The large numbers last year and this year between 5 and 8 and between 14 and 16 (nearly all enumerated pupils in high school are between 14 and 16) lead one to believe there is truth in the old saying that children come in crops. The number now not in school but who will be of school age next fall should be carefully considered in planning next year's schools. that they would be fairly satisfactory. These old wooden boards have served their time and more satisfactory boards should take their places. Another need at this school is a cloak room, as the children's coats are now hung in the classroom. This arrangement is unsanitary and in other ways objectionable.

# CONCLUSION

What success that has been attained in providing for the educational needs of our boys and girls has been possible only because of a deep interest in their welfare on the part of teachers, parents, and school board, and I wish to take this opportunity to express my appreciation of the unfailing co-operation I have received from all.
