## THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Chichester, N. H., in the County of Merrimack, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall, in said Chichester, on Tuesday, the eighth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation for the same.

3. To see if the Town will vote to pay a discount of 3% on all property taxes paid on or before July 1st, 1927.

4. To see if the Town will vote to raise a sum of money for the White Pine Blister Rust control.

5. To see what action the Town will take in regard to celebrating, of the "200th" anniversary of the Town of Chichester, and an appropriation for the same.

6. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$1,200.00, the State to give \$5,400.00, for Trunk Line maintenance. 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$200.00, the State to give \$200.00, for State Aid Maintenance.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$200.00, the State to give \$200.00, for Town Road maintenance.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$1,000.00, providing that the Joint Resolution, No. 27, of the State Senate and House of Representatives, is passed, whereby the State will furnish \$2,000.00 for the construction of an improved road leading from the Central Trunk Line to the Suncook-Ossipee Trunk Line.

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$2,500.00, the State and Federal Government to give \$7,500.00, for the construction of a highway on the Suncook-Ossipee Trunk Line.

## REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Chichester School Board :

I herewith submit my fourth annual report as superintendent of schools.

#### PROMOTION

At the end of the year four pupils were promoted to Grade II, six to Grade III, six to Grade IV, nine to Grade V, ten to Grade VI, seven to Grade VII, six to Grade VIII, and eight to high school. The names of those pupils who completed the elementary school work are: Dorothy Bailey, Thomas Elliott, Walter Ford, Hazel Lake, Charles Langmaid, Fred Marston, Edgar Reed, and Richard Sanborn.

The following twenty-three pupils returned to or entered high school last fall:

Colby Academy: Christopher Perry.

Concord High School: Charles Burton, Fisher Edmunds, Gerald Edmunds, Scott Edmunds, John Grady, Alice King, Hazel Lake, Phyllis Lake, Charles Langmaid, Shirley Marden, Edgar Reed, Richard Sanborn, Annie Shaw, Merwin Shaw, Donald Swain, Dorothy Swain, and Pauline Towle.

Pembroke Academy: Mary Kelley and Fred Marston.

Pittsfield High School: Thomas Elliott and Wilma Dahm.

Massachusetts: Dorothy Bailey.

#### HEALTH SUPERVISION

During the year three school nurses were engaged to do health work in the Chichester schools, but for reasons best known to herself each nurse notified the superintendent that she could not do the work as she had agreed. Efforts have been continued this year and at the time of writing this report an agreement exists with Miss Katherine A. O'Donnell to begin work the first of April. Miss O'Connell has been doing excellent work for the past year in the Pembroke supervisory union. The following report of the medical examiner shows the need of her services.

#### BUILDINGS

During the past year the minor needs of the school buildings have been well looked after. Now the most needed improvement is the rebuilding of the toilets at Pine Ground. They are very unsanitary. A small appropriation should be made this year to cover this expense.

#### MUSIC

The accompanying report of the music supervisor is deserving of your attention. Miss Hall is doing excellent work in the schools and the pupils are getting much profit and enjoyment from their study and practice of music. I believe the small amount of money necessary to carry on this work is well invested.

#### REPORT OF MUSIC SUPERVISOR

"It is my belief that music, when properly taught, stands for as much mental development and general culture as any other subject in the curriculum.

"The music in the schools of Chichester is a success. This is possible only by the co-operation of the earnest teachers.

"Each school receives one-half hour's instruction each week by the music supervisor supplemented by the training given by the individual teacher. A brief course in History and Appreciation of Music as well as folk dances take up part of the lesson. Now, when radios are so common, enabling everyone to hear the greatest artists and symphony orchestras, it is necessary for people to listen intelligently. There is no better place to learn to do this than in the public schools.

It may be seen by a comparison of these figures with those for the previous year that the total number of Chichester children 5 to 16 in some school was ten more in 1926 than in 1925.

We have been fortunate so far the present year in having no changes in the teaching force, therefore, progress in the schools has been continuous.

#### TEACHERS' MEETINGS

Each month the teachers meet with the superintendent and work on problems common to all the schools. At the meetings this fall and winter the daily time table, pupils' marks, methods in seventh and eighth grade geography, and primary methods in reading are the important topics that have been discussed. The teachers deserve much credit for their zealous work to solve their many professional problems. "It is with sincerest regret that the music supervisor is not able to visit these schools during the winter months."

#### GENERAL REMARKS

I believe the progress of the schools is good. The teachers are working conscientiously and intelligently for the good of the boys and girls; modern methods of instruction are being used, and modern text books have been adopted. The health of the pupils has been considered in the furnishing of sanitary water coolers, paper drinking cups and paper towels, in the improvement of seating conditions, and in the adopting of the policy of employing a school nurse, but really satisfactory sanitary conditions cannot be obtained until decided improvements are made in the toilets, in the heating and ventilating methods, and in the lighting conditions. A small appropriation should be made each year to provide for these sorely needed improvements. Money used for such purposes is not spent, but invested, and an investment in children's health is one of the best investments that a community can make.

#### IN CONCLUSION

The people of Chichester should be congratulated for having a school board that gives so unstintingly of its time and energies in working for the best interests of the boys and girls of Chichester and the future of the community and state. It with a sincere appreciation of the willing co-operation you have given me that this report is made for your consideration.
