To the Inhabitants of the Town of Chichester in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Chichester on Tuesday, the 10th day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.
3. To see if the Town will vote to pay a discount on all property taxes paid on or before July 10, 1931.
4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the White Pine Blister Rust, the State to give 25% in addition to any amount raised by the town.
5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to care for old cemeteries.
6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for State Aid Construction \$588.00, the State to give \$1,176.00.
7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for State Aid Maintenance \$500.00, the State to give \$1,500.00.
8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$700.00, the State to give \$8,750.00, for Trunk Line Maintenance.

## REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

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*To the Chichester School Board:*

This, my eighth annual report as superintendent of schools, will, besides dealing with the usual statistics, discuss briefly our most fundamental current educational problem: "How to make the school fit the child."

In the early history of the human race all education was informal, each child being handled as an individual, but, as time went on and the possibilities of group instruction were gradually realized and used, the groups became larger and the instruction more and more formal. As schools were developed the tendency was for them to become more and more machine-like. Probably all instructors have always realized that it was their function to train the individual child, yet as the schools became better organized there was greater and greater pressure upon them to lose sight of the individual in thinking of the school and of society as a whole. Often in the past have we heard the expression, "for the good of the school", but in the modern school we think not only of it but of the child. The old school was a passive one whose function was to teach children to conform to Society, but the new school is an active one whose aim is the maximum growth of individuality. The slogan of this newer school is, "The School for the Child".

This newer philosophy of education has marked effect on methods of discipline. The older concept was to obtain good conduct through autocratic control; the newer, through self-control. In the old school a child behaved because he *had* to; in the new he behaves because he *wants* to. Not so many years ago a teacher was called successful in discipline if she "made them mind". Today the teacher is considered successful in discipline only when she has so influ-

enced the children that they want to conduct themselves as they should.

In methods of instruction the principle is the same—it is the teacher's duty to so handle the situation that the child will *want* to learn because of his natural or cultivated interests.

In choice of subject matter child interest is again the orienting center of the new program. The interests of the child are used in determining what shall be taught at a particular time.

As an illustration, a group of children are taught to exercise self-control while working together without disturbing others on the problem of finding out about the regions around the South Pole in order that they may write interesting letters to Rear-Admiral Byrd. In this setting they want to behave because they are happily engaged in an interesting activity. (Discipline.) They are interested in getting information from papers, books, conversations, magazines, snapshots, and moving pictures. (Methods of Instruction.) They learn about Antarctica when they are interested in Byrd and his trip. (Subject Matter.)

The most conservative of the old school believed only in *control*; the most radical of the new school believe only in *freedom*; the ideal of the schools in this town is freedom with control—creative self-expression with tolerant understanding. In keeping with this newer ideal our schools are being administered with the realization on the part of superintendent and teachers that it is the function of these schools not only to adjust the pupils to the laws and needs of society but to develop to the greatest extent possible in each individual child his God-given powers of self-control, initiative, self-expression and creation.

### TEACHERS

#### EIGHTH GRADE TESTS

Last June all eighth grade pupils in this supervisory union took standard tests in ten subjects: Spelling, reading, vocabulary, arithmetic computation, arithmetic reasoning, grammar, language usage, literature, history and geography. The same tests were taken by about 23,000 eighth grade pupils scattered throughout thirty-five states. The median score for this supervisory union was 136.5, which was slightly higher than the median of 135.3 for the country as a whole, or of 133 for New Hampshire.

#### PROMOTIONS

Again this year the proportion of pupils promoted to the next grade was high, 60 being promoted and three only, or 4.8 per cent, failing of promotion. I believe that our efforts at individualized instruction mentioned in the first part of this report are largely responsible for this good record.

Last June all nine of the eighth grade pupils received certificates of admission to high school: Velna DuPlace, Bernard Langley, John Lindquist, Robert Mason, Isabelle Perry, Margaret Perry, Nellie Runnells, Alvin Towle, and William West. Five of these nine pupils exceeded the nation-wide median on the final test and one got the highest score of any of the sixty-eight in the supervisory union. All entered high school last fall although some have since dropped out.

#### HIGH SCHOOL PUPILS

Twenty-five Chichester pupils were enrolled last fall in high schools:

As five of these are seniors and there are five in the eighth grade at present, it is likely that about the same amount will be needed for high school tuitions next year as this year, \$2600.

The important changes from the figures for last year are the increase of seven in the number in school and the slight but discouraging decrease in regularity of attendance.

Most of the absence now from our schools is due to sickness and so is excusable but nearly all of the tardiness is due to carelessness. We respectfully ask the cooperation of the parents in our efforts to establish in the pupils habits of punctuality, a trait that will be of great value all through their lives if once acquired.

#### CHICHESTER'S NEED

For the fiscal year ending June 30, 1930 Chichester spent an average of \$61.40 on each pupil in the elementary schools. The average cost per pupil in the 241 school districts of the state was \$84.40. Only seventeen of the 240 other districts spent as little per pupil as did Chichester. If Chichester had spent as much as the average, it would have spent \$1,394.42 more than it did, or more than one-fifth the cost of a new modern two-room school building. In other words Chichester could build a good schoolhouse to accomodate all its elementary pupils and pay for it in five years without spending any more on its elementary schools than is being done in the state as a whole.

In my report last year I pointed out what Chichester had been spending according to its ability to pay. Let us see what the situation was last year. It spent \$1.37 on each \$1,000 less than the state median. Then according to Chichester's *ability* to pay it could have spent \$1,507.75 on its \$764,783 worth of property more than it did without taxing its citizens heavier than the average throughout the state. In six years it could pay for a good schoolhouse by taxation alone, and keep its old buildings, without making the taxes for school purposes higher than the state average. I believe the boys and girls of Chichester are just as worthy of a good educational opportunity as are other boys and girls in the state or in the nation. Chichester needs a new school building. It can have one without even approaching an excessive tax burden. The verdict is in the hands of the voters.

## CONCLUSION

With sincere appreciation of the cooperation I have received from the school board, teachers, pupils and other citizens, I respectfully submit this report.
