REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Chichester School Board and Citizens-

Herewith I respectfully submit my tenth annual report as superintendent of schools.

TEACHERS

No changes in the teaching force occurred during the school year. The following list shows the names of the present teachers, together with their positions, salaries, etc.

The great increase in the number of pupils in the Horse Corner district necessitated the opening of the school there. As no money was appropriated for the operation of this school this year, the school board and superintendent have looked upon the situation as an emergency and have kept the expenses as low as possible rather than ask this March for a deficiency appropriation. A continuation of the policy of operating one school at a considerably lower cost than another of nearly equal enrollment would not be fair to the pupils in attendance, so next year the costs of operating the schools should be more nearly equalized on the basis of enrollment.

PROMOTIONS

During the school year ending June 30, 1932, 63 pupils were promoted to the next higher grade and none failed of promotion.

The following five pupils received certificates of admission to high school in June: Harriett Bailey, Walter Dobson, Natalie Pickard, Oscar Raney, and Doris Smith. Four of the five entered high school last fall.

HIGH SCHOOL PUPILS

Twenty-six Chichester pupils as compared with twentyone last year, were enrolled in high schools and academies last fall as follows:

Of these twenty-six, four have already dropped out and seven more are seniors. There are now seven in the eighth grade. From these figures it looks as if at least seventeen would be in high school next year, for whom no less than \$1,445 will be needed for tuition.

Instruction

The new system of reading adopted last year for the first grade has proved to be highly satisfactory. This year the system has been continued into the second grade. The children are gaining a power and finding a pleasure in reading that first and second graders have not had before.

The social science series adopted last year for the seventh grade has been extended this year into the eighth grade. If there was ever a time in the history of our country when our boys and girls needed to be taught to think clearly about our social, political and economic problems, it is in this generation. These books that we are using are generally conceded to be the finest textbooks published today dealing with human relationships.

The system of music instruction inaugurated last year is being continued with fine success. The second case of records has been obtained and put into use. With another school this year we are handicapped by having only one Victrola but by frequently shifting it from one school to another we are getting along fairly well.

Methods of instruction in other subjects are being continued with few changes and I believe the record last year of no promotion failures indicates the methods in use are truly effective.

ROLL OF HONOR

Only one pupil, Leona Mobbs, was neither absent nor tardy during the school year.

This total is eight more than last year's and is the largest since 1919 when it was 96.

HEALTH SUPERVISION

The examination of the pupils by the examining physician, F. B. Argue, and the school nurse, Ruth B. Whitcomb, showed that all pupils were vaccinated or had been properly excused and that twelve pupils were suffering from uncorrected defective vision, five from defective teeth, seven from diseased tonsils, and three from adenoids. During the year

one child had tonsils and adenoids removed under the supervision of the school nurse and twenty-three received diphtheria immunization.

These figures are not significantly different from those of the previous year.

BUILDINGS AND EQUIPMENT

According to the vote of the last school district meeting the schoolhouses at Pine Ground and Center have been wired for electric lights. Only \$75.50 of the \$100 raised was used for this purpose. The district should decide at its meeting this spring for what the balance of \$24.50 will be used. Pupils and teachers have been relieved of much eye strain by your investment.

When it was decided last summer to open the Horse Corner school much repairing was found to be necessary to make the building meet reasonable standards, but with the amount of money available not everything could be done. However, the most urgent needs such as shingling the roof and fixing the ceiling were met. If the use of the building is continued, and present indications are that

it will have to be, considerable work should be done. The lighting is very poor and should be improved by greatly increasing the glass area and possibly by installing electric lights. I believe a special appropriation should be made for this purpose.

The lighting at the Center School could be improved considerably by cutting some of the nearby trees.

FINANCES

I wish to add a few words of explanation of the budget for 1933-34. It has been the purpose of your superintendent in figuring out a budget for next year to make estimates as close as possible to actual known needs, realizing that these are times when every true saving must be made. The amount asked for will not permit operation of your schools without sacrifices but they will permit, by careful planning, the retention of most of the fundamental essentials. As I mentioned elsewhere, the operation of the Horse Corner school this year will be accomplished without a cent additional appropriation for it. All expenses will be met from savings on the budgets of last year and this. We were fortunate to have a large cash balance with which to start the year but next year we shall not be so fortunate. In spite of this the recommended appropriation is practically the same for next year with three schools to operate as it was for this year when we expected to run only two.

The amount needed each year for high school tuitions is very hard to estimate. Considering the present economic condition of the district it seemed best to set the figure for this item at the lowest it is at all likely to be with the idea that if necessary the meeting in March, 1934, can make up any deficit there may be.

To help out a bit this year I shall return to the districts in the supervisory union three per cent of the amounts they pay toward my salary and for the next year I recommend that the superintendent, if his salary remains the same, be allowed to return ten per cent of it.

Conclusion

With keen appreciation of the assistance I have received from the school board and all others with whom I have been professionally associated this report is respectfully submitted.
