*To the Inhabitants of the Town of Chichester in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:*

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Chichester on Tuesday, the 13th day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.
3. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$588.00, the State to give \$1,164.00 for State Aid Construction.
4. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the town by tax collector's deeds.
5. Local option. To see whether beer or other lawful alcoholic beverages shall be manufactured or sold locally as permitted under this act: Laws of 1933, Chap. 99, Sec. 22.
6. To see what action the Town will take for winter breaking in the future.
7. Any other business which may legally come before said meeting.

## REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

*To the Chichester School Board and Citizens—*

In submitting herewith my eleventh annual report as superintendent of schools I shall make but few comments on the usual statistics in order that emphasis may be placed on a few fundamental and vital problems.

### TEACHERS

The schools have been taught by well-trained and capable teachers and the pupils have made good progress along the lines their activities have been directed. No changes in the teaching force occurred during the school year. The following is a list of the names of the present teachers, together with their positions, salaries, and so forth.

### PROMOTIONS TO HIGH SCHOOL

The following eight pupils received certificates of admission to high school in June: Luman Dame, Maxwell Devoid, Hilda Lindquist, Dorothy Marden, Emily Sanborn, James Sawyer, Edward Smith, and Arthur Spencer.

Five of these pupils entered high school last fall.

### HIGH SCHOOL PUPILS

Nineteen Chichester pupils, as compared with twenty-six last year and with twenty-one for the previous year, were

enrolled in high school last fall, all of whom attended Concord High school. The names are as follows: Luman Dame, Hilda Lindquist, John Lindquist, Dorothy Marden, Robert Mason, Gage Mattice, Harry Mattice, James Mobbs, Lena Moses, Isabel Perry, Jackson Pickard, Natalie Pickard, Nellie Runnells, Emily Sanborn, James Sawyer, Doris Smith, Georgianna Smith, Alvin Towle, and Fred Wilcox.

Of these nineteen pupils one has already moved from town and seven more are seniors. There are now eight in the eighth grade. From these figures it seems that we should expect at least nineteen pupils to be in high school next year for whom about \$1,710 will be needed for tuition.

#### INSTRUCTION

The new system of reading which has been used for the past two years has this fall been extended into the third grade and continues to be highly satisfactory. The use of the work-books, which is a part of this system, helps greatly in solving the problem of keeping the primary children profitably employed. With this system children are learning to read with enjoyment by themselves.

Closely related to the development of reading abilities through the new system of reading, is the use of current events papers in all grades except the first. These papers, which are entitled "My Weekly Readers" for grades three to seven and "The Junior Review" for grade eight, give an opportunity for valuable practice in the mechanics of silent reading and contain material that is most helpful to children in forming worthwhile attitudes towards concepts of our present day social and economic problems. Pupils and teachers are very much interested in them and many parents have spoken to me of the value of this material.

In the fourth grade new histories have been adopted to replace the old books which had become entirely worn-out. The method of instruction used in connection with these

new books is practically the same as that which has been used, but the material is far more interesting and strongly appeals to nearly every child.

New language books have been put into use in grades three to six in all schools, resulting in a marked increase in pupil interest.

There have been few changes in the methods of instruction in the other subjects.

#### ROLL OF PERFECT ATTENDANCE

The following four pupils, as compared with one last year, were neither absent nor tardy during the school year ending June 30, 1933: Robert Marston, Leona Mobbs, Oliver Mobbs, and Edwin Sanborn. One of these pupils, Leona Mobbs, has been neither absent nor tardy for the past two years.

This total of ninety-two is four more than last year's and is the largest since 1919.

## HEALTH SUPERVISION

The examination of the pupils by the examining physician, F. B. Argue, and the school nurse, Ruth B. Whitcomb, showed that all pupils were vaccinated or had been properly excused by the board of health, nine pupils were at least 10% under weight, six were laboring under the difficulty of uncorrected defective vision, two had defective teeth, five had diseased tonsils, and one had enlarged glands. During the year twelve had scarlet fever and five some skin disease. The pupils at the Pine Ground and Center schools were tested for hearing defects on March 31, 1933 with an audiometer. No defects were found.

The water from the source of supply at the Pine Ground school was tested by the State Board of Health and approved as satisfactory for use.

Free milk was furnished during the late winter and early spring to all needy children by the Federal Government. Chichester people should feel proud that during the present year conditions in Chichester are such that no children have been found who are in need of free milk. This fact, together with the comparatively small percentage of physical defects, speaks well for the care given children by parents in Chichester and for the effective work of the school physician and school nurse.

There are two items in this table that should receive special attention: one is the increase in the number of pupils registered from sixty-five in 1931-32 to eighty-four in 1932-33, and the other is the increase in the number of visits by citizens from ninety-four to two hundred twenty-nine. The evident increase in interest among parents in visiting the schools is very encouraging to the teachers and superintendent. I cannot too strongly urge you to continue, and improve if possible, the good record you made last year. Visit your schools often and take an interest in knowing what your children are doing there.

## CONCLUSION.

In closing I wish to thank the school board, teachers and other citizens for their cooperation during the past year.
