To the Inhabitants of the Town of Chichester in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Chichester, on Tuesday, the 14th day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$685.50, the State to give \$1370.00, for State Aid Construction on Canterbury road, or to see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$392.50, the State to give \$1570.01, for Class V assistance.

4. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

5. To see if the town will vote to pay discount on all property taxes as in 1938.

6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25.00, the State Forestry Department to give \$25.00 for the purchase of Forest Fire fighting equipment.

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7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for the purchase of a new road machine.

8. Any other business which may legally come before said meeting.

FIRE DEPARTMENT REPORT

On January 29, 1936, a group of citizens much interested in safeguarding our town property, met at the Town Hall for the purpose of forming a Fire Department, the meeting proved to be successful, as a Department was duly organized, a set of officers being elected, and a constitution and by-laws was written up and accepted.

At the first two meetings held there were 24 present, each signed up as members and are known as Charter members of the Chichester Fire Department, and from this time on the Department has progressed and will briefly outline without detail.

Appropriations by the town, together with money earned by the firemen in different ways, such as winter carnivals, minstrel shows and contributions, has provided money to purchase a second-hand Chevrolet truck which has been equipped with a power pump, a 150 gallon booster tank, 150 feet garden hose for use on chimney fires, 1000 feet of $1\frac{1}{2}$ inch hose which can be used as a single output or can be so arranged that three streams of water can be used at the same time.

In August 1936, seeing the necessity of a suitable building to be used as a fire station, four citizens of Chichester advanced \$400.00 as a loan to purchase a building, known as the stone shed owned by Alfred Jenkins. The firemen with money they have earned, have remodeled this building by adding a room at the rear to use for meeting, also as a kitchen, the walls have been covered with celotex, also the ceiling. This building was later taken and paid for by the town.

The firemen have purchased coal to keep a fire in the building during freezing weather, paid for the installing of electricity and paid the electric bill, and most recently have purchased two rubber firemen's coats. A great deal of

labor has been contributed by some of the firemen on improvements and at present the widening of the doors on the Fire Station is in progress, as the present doors are not wide enough to pass thru quickly. A great deal of thanks are due those that have so contributed.

Finally and briefly, let me point out our great weakness, at present, that is our water supply. A great need for water is required if the Department is to render a reasonable good showing and I feel our next important step, is to try and find some way to provide our water supply, possibly in a small way at first and gradually expanding.

Our truck is equipped with a pump capable of pumping 150 gallons per minute, so it is essential to have a fairly good amount of water in cases of great need.

The estimated value of our Fire Department including building is \$2237.00.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS.

To the School Board and Citizens:

The schools opened in September with no change in teachers. The membership has been increasing slowly during the past three years, the graduates from the eighth grade increasing from 8 to 12 and the number in high schools from 18 to 27.

Attendance is, in general, excellent, the tardiness record good. The number of visitors suggests that there is a wholesome interest in what the schools are doing. Parents interested in the schools and teachers interested in the homes, working together, should help maintain the highest standards possible.

The School Board's Estimate for the coming year totals \$14.96 more than last year. The principal items increased are: repairs, \$75.00; high school tuition, \$75.00; per capita tax, \$24.00. The income from the Myron Leavitt Trust is about \$500.00 less than was estimated last year. No balance is estimated at the close of the year in June. Fortunately State Aid can be estimated at about \$750.00 more than last year, and the dog tax of about \$150.00 will help.

The shed containing the toilets at the Center was raised last summer and the vaults were somewhat improved, at least surface water no longer runs into them.

The condition of the Pine Ground toilets seems likely to become acute before another year. Under Article 9 of the School Warrant provision can be made for improving them. Recommendations and estimates will be presented at the meeting. The location of the building presents a very serious problem for satisfactory installation of any sort of toilet, but the problem must be solved. We would welcome any constructive suggestion from anyone acquainted with the situation.

CHICHESTER TOWN REPORT

It is natural that parents should think as taxpayers when school appropriations are voted, but is it unreasonable to hope that taxpayers will think as parents when confronted with conditions affecting their children's welfare? The handsome bequest of Myron Leavitt to the school district should effect at least some small benefit to the school children of Chichester.
