CHICHESTER TOWN WARRANT

*To the Inhabitants of the Town of Chichester in the County
 of Merrimack in said State qualified to vote in Town
 Affairs:*

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Chichester, on Tuesday, the 12th day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
3. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$658.50, the State to give \$1316.00, for State Aid Construction on Canterbury road, or to see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$393.47, the State to give \$1573.90, for Class V assistance.
4. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
5. To see if the town will vote to pay discount on all property taxes as in 1939.
6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25.00 for Old Home Day.
7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$250.00 for approximately 250 feet of new tar construction beyond Eva Davis' on Canterbury road, if Class II construction is not accepted.

8. To see if the town will vote to accept a piece of land donated by a group of citizens for a bathing beach on the Suncook river.

9. To see if the town will vote to tar the town's part of Canterbury road and appropriate money for the same.

10. To see what action the town will take towards continuing calcium chloride treatment on Pleasant street or any other road and appropriate money for the same.

11. To see if the town will vote to have the Vital Statistics published in the Annual Town Report as before.

12. To see if the town will vote to discontinue any roads (subject to gates and bars) such as the Clifford road and the Leavitt road from the Staniels place to the Garvin Hill road.

13. To see if the town will vote to take over the fuel, light and janitor expense at the fire house, and appropriate money for the same.

14. Any other business which may legally come before said meeting.

A large part of the Class V work during 1939 was devoted to the repair of the Class V work done in previous years, as all washouts and worn-outs had to be regaveled also the entire Class V roads were lightly graded before any gravel was distributed. Gravel was laid on about 1½ miles of highway, and approximately 7 miles of road were graded.

Two much needed culverts were installed on the so-called

King road, on Griffin's hill. Beginning at the Loudon line on Pleasant street calcium chloride was laid on about 500 feet of road. The only new location during 1939 was about one-half mile on the King road which was widened and graveled.

FIRE DEPARTMENT REPORT

In making a brief report of the Chichester Fire Department, there are a few suggestions I would like to present. A year ago I stressed the fact that, one of the greatest needs of a local Fire department is an adequate supply of water. Our water supply has not improved during the past year, and at this point I wish to recommend that at the earliest possible date, the town purchase a portable water pump. This could be used advantageously in several ways. It could be used to great advantage at forest fires, also on building fires, as it could be carried by two men and placed near a well or other water supply where a truck could not go.

The citizens are becoming more used to calling out the Fire truck, as a record of fires shows that in 1938 the Fire department responded to 6 calls and in 1939 to 12 summons, and in a few instances has proved to be very efficient.

Since the forming of our Fire department there seems to have been born a bond of cooperation by all Towns and Cities where equipment is maintained, as each stands ready and willing to answer calls to neighboring Towns in cases of emergency, and that we may be equipped to render our due share I further suggest that a small amount of equipment and supplies be added each year. There are some things much needed on the truck at present.

During the past year there have been very few forest or grass fires, and none that have caused any material losses.

Many fire permits were issued during 1939 which proves that many more citizens realize the risk due to the great amount of slash, also realizing the fact that there is a State law against burning without a permit. This same condition will exist during 1940.

In closing this report I wish to bring before you that

in the forming of the Chichester Fire Department on Jan. 23, 1936, there were 24 charter members who were actually responsible for the organization, and that during the past year John C. Langmaid, one of those charter members who was largely responsible for its becoming a reality, and who also gave liberally through his untiring efforts to make it successful, was elected as the first Fire Chief, and so remained until on August 13, 1939 he answered the Divine call. As a monument to his memory let this organization continue to a degree of greater efficiency for the protection of the property in Chichester and neighboring localities.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens:

While we were sorry to lose Miss Hill from the Horse Corner School at the close of last year, the school is being well conducted by a new teacher.

The average membership of the schools for 1938-39 was about one pupil less than the preceeding year and at the present time the membership continues the same.

The amount of tardiness was again reduced last year, averaging only .4 for each pupil. Per cent of attendance was a little better than the excellent record of the previous year.

The School Board's Estimate recommends a total tax of \$400.21 more than last year. Increases are estimated in the following items: Transportation, \$23.00; High School Tuition, \$450.00; Per Capita Tax, \$14.00; Total increase, \$487.00.

An increase in State Aid and small decreases in several items of expenditure make it possible to cut nearly \$87.00 from this amount. Am including the usual statistical matter as a part of this report.
