To the Inhabitants of the Town of Chichester, N. H., in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to Vote in Town affairs:

(L.S.)

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Chichester on Tuesday, the 14th day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to pay discounts on all property taxes as in 1943.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25.00 for Old Home Day.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$195.22 for Class V assistance.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to accept a deed from the Leavitt Cemetery Association of all its real estate in the Town of Chichester.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to set aside any more money from the surplus towards the School House Fund.

- 9. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue (subject to gate and bars) the road running from Walter Lock's house to the so-called Kaime Road.

## REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN

Concord, New Hampshire January 31, 1944

Chairman, Board of Selectmen:

The following has been prepared for your forest fire warden in the hope you may find it possible to publish it in the Annual Town Report. Judging from previous years' experiences such published items have proven valuable by causing local residents to be more careful and cooperative. Your cooperation will surely be appreciated both by the Forestry Department and your local forest fire warden.

Crises like the present test the quality and sincerity of everyone's patriotism and citizenship. The times make such unavoidable demands for universal cooperation in the many lines of essential regular and emergency public endeavor that the response given may well be assumed to be the real measure of one's love of country and his appreciation of the opportunities it offers. Ranking high in the list of public endeavor is the protection of our forests from fire. It calls for full and generous cooperation by each of us. Fire statistics indicate that better than 98 per cent of all fires in New Hampshire are man-caused. If human carelessness could be eliminated from the problem, the number of fires would drop to a mere minimum of less than 2 per cent of present figures and fire costs and losses would reduce in proportion. While this goal will not be achieved because of the perversity of human nature, the record can be vastly improved through individual

discipline, alertness and cooperation.

Discipline calls for personal restraint from following unrestricted natural impulses to do as one pleases with regard to fire; alertness in cautioning others against imprudent and illegal burning and in promptly reporting fires to the local forest fire warden; cooperation in complying with laws, rules, and regulations governing the kindling and care of fires, smoking, safety of mechanical units using fire in and near woodlands and assisting the local warden in extinguishing such fires as may occur.

The possibilities of disastrous and expensive woods fires are constantly becoming more real. The hurricane felled an estimated one and one-half billion board feet of standing timber, much of which was never cleaned up. To this hazard has been and is being added extensive areas of slash from additional hundreds of millions cut to produce vitally needed wood for the war effort. With the stage so set, greater caution is increasingly necessary. It will pay substantial dividends in unburned forest areas and the saving of unnecessary fire expense.

The year 1943 was an extremely fortunate one because of favorable weather conditions. Many towns had no fires, some had minor fires while a few had expensive ones. The public controls the answer to the 1944 and future years' fire records. If the public is careful and cooperative the record will be good.

Your town warden is, perhaps, more perplexed and anxious during these war years than ever before because of increased forest fire hazards and diminishing supplies of available man-power. He looks directly to you to aid him. Will you? You can aid him most effectively by always securing the required permit before attempting to burn and by complying fully with permit re-

quirements; by being patient when he advises of departmental restrictions on permit burning or that he deems it unsafe to burn; and by giving him the needed assistance in extinguishing fires when he needs your help. To do so is to meet one real test of citizenship.

#### LIBRARIAN'S REPORT

There were thirty-six books purchased in 1943. We have received from friends four books as gifts. The friends to whom thanks are due are Mr. Ned Parker of Farmington, N. H., and Miss Estella Leaver, a former Chichester girl, but now of Portland, Maine.

Many of the books purchased were from authors, such as Bess Streeter Aldrich, Grace L. Hill, Christine W. Parmenter, Lloyd Douglas, and Sara W. Bassett. "The Robe," by Lloyd Douglas, is a fine book, and very popular.

The New Hampshire Troubadour, singing praises of New Hampshire, still comes to us every month through the kindness of the State Planning and Development Commission of Concord, N. H.

The usual books come to us from the State.

The Traveling Library or Bookmobile sent from the N. H. Public Library Commission, still comes to our library—about once in three months now, leaving us fifteen or twenty books each time. They also call at the three schools in town. This Bookmobile is in charge of Miss Rosanna Cole.

There are three branch libraries in town. Mrs. Dorothy Lane has the branch library at the north part of the town; Mrs. Mable D. Stevens is branch librarian at Horse Corner, and Mrs. Josie Shaw is in charge of the Bear Hill district.
