CALL TO ORDER

Chair Kehoe called the meeting to order at 7:43 p.m. The Chair announced the exit locations in accordance with Connecticut General Statutes §29-381, after which the Council joined him in the pledge of allegiance.

OPPORTUNITY FOR RESIDENTS TO ADDRESS THE COUNCIL ON AGENDA ITEMS

Susan Kniep, 44-46 and 50 Olde Roberts Street, (1) suggested that the Council provide some insight into the matters on the Executive Session at the start of the regular meeting, so that the public has an opportunity to speak to those issues; (2) believes that the agenda item on the relocation of billboards should be more specific, listing the property that the billboards will be relocated to; and (3) strongly urged the Council not to approve the relocation of the billboards at 275 Conn Boulevard due to (a) the noise generated by the electronic signs, (b) the lights from the digital display could be excessive, and (c) the environmental impact on the community.

Mayor Leclerc (1) stated that there is a new CERT class on September 19th – applications are available at the Public Safety Complex and the Mayor's office. The Mayor also announced that Jeff Cummings will be honored at that meeting for his commitment to the CERT team; (2) announced that the EHPD reported that August 28th, the first day of school, was successful in traffic control and student safety; (3) reminded all that Fall Fest will begin October 12th; (4) showed the Council the newspaper article on Susan Hansen, the new Library Director and reiterated what a great addition she is to the Mayor's team and will have an update for the Council on the progress of the Library renovations in October; and (5) fully supports the relocation of the billboards presently at 275 Conn Boulevard and hoped the Council will support it as well.

At this point, Chair Kehoe noted the deaths of Wallace "Wally" Inkpen, the town's Deputy Assessor for the past seven years, and Gregory Choquette, the brother of John Choquette who is the Assistant to the Mayor. They will be missed.






District Discipline Data






District Climate Survey Data

Re: 2012-2013 CMT/CAPT Results

Summary:

(East Hartford, Connecticut) On Friday, August 9th, East Hartford Public Schools (EHPS) received district results from the 2013 statewide student assessments: the Connecticut Mastery Test (CMT) and the Connecticut Academic Performance Test (CAPT). This data provides EHPS leaders and educators with important indicators regarding district level efforts of school improvement. The results show some bright spots of growth and improvement as well as indicate areas of greater need and development. EHPS is committed to the concept of developing and leading schools that are the pride of the East Hartford community through the delivery of a high quality learning experience for every child, every day. Following an initial review of the test data, Chairman Jeffrey Currey stated, "Our test data is a component and piece of larger system accountability. We embrace the concept of knowing where we are based on the knowledge of where we are going. I am excited to see some areas of growth and improvement in our scores but even more excited to know that a plan is in place to continue to move our schools along that trajectory that we all expect as a Board. We have charged our Superintendent to raise the level of achievement in the district and are excited to see that we are moving in this direction."

In alignment to statewide results, raw district results generally demonstrated a variance across grade levels and subjects. Raw district data provides a comparison of grade levels over time (ex: Scores of 3rd Graders in 2011-2012 as compared to 3rd Graders in 2012-2013). It should be noted that raw data does not reflect "cohort" or similar students across grades. Most significant were gains made at grade levels 4, 6 and 10. Most significantly, students in the 10th grade scoring at the proficient and above level jumped over 12% points in writing as compared to students taking the test in 2011. Additionally, reading proficiency improved over 7% points as compared to 2011. On the Grade 6 level, gains were made in relation to 2011 Grade 6 data in all tested areas. Most significant, students improved reading proficiency by over 9% points. Further analysis and review will be done regarding grade level dips in grades 3 and 7.

A review of cohort data, Table 1 (same group of students compared across two school years, ie. Grade 5:2011-2012 to Grade 6: 2012-2013) shows significant growth areas for EHPS students. EHPS Cohort data outpaced state growth lines in 12 of 15 possible areas. Most notably, all EHPS students made growth in reading as compared to their previous years scores with the exception of current 4th grades with a minor loss of .7% points. In addition, rising Grade 5 students made nearly a 15% point increase in reading scores as compared to their 4th grade results (State growth 4.8% points). Students in Grade 8 made gains in all subject areas as compared to their 7th grade scores. The cohort analysis supported the raw score analysis of district dips in the subject area of Math.

EHPS embraces the concept of school and system accountability and is actively in process of growing a results based culture of learning. "Student achievement is the business of all of us here in East Hartford," stated Superintendent Page | 1

Nathan Quesnel, "while we will celebrate any gains made, we will focus on how we can change, improve and grow. Our current scores and proficiency levels are not acceptable to me or to our system. I am extremely appreciative of the work that has been done thus far in the district, and while we have a long way to go, I look forward to being a part of the transformation that will happen." In addition to CMT and CAPT data, EHPS also utilizes local measures, graduation rates, climate survey data and student discipline data to paint a more full and robust picture of school quality. It should also be noted that based on a preliminary review, EHPS CMT and CAPT results mirrored increases and need areas with State and DRG level achievement data. A thorough and detailed analysis of the CMT and CAPT scores will be presented to the full Board of Education in early fall.

The following table provides a summary of cohort gains and losses for students scoring at proficiency or above comparing the cohorts of 2011-2012 to the cohort of 2012-2013. This chart provides a comparison between East Hartford growth and loss areas as well as the average state growth and loss areas. Please note that these scores reflect the same groups of students taking the test (ex: Grade 5:2011-2012 as compared to Grade 6:2013-2014). Please also note that as the CMT and CAPT are separate and different assessments; a cohort scale is not able to be accurately calculated.

- Goodwin grade 4 students increased 14% points in reading and 16% points in writing at proficient and above.
- Goodwin grade 5 students increased 12% points in reading at proficient and above.
- Hockanum grade 3 students increased 11% points in writing at proficient or above.
- Hockanum grade 4 students performed 19% points above the state average at goal and 10% points above state average at proficient and above in math.

- Pitkin grade 6 students performed 13% points above the state average at goal and 16% points above the state average at proficient and above in reading. 100% of students in grade 6 at Pitkin achieved proficient or above in reading.
- EHMS grade 6 students showed improvement in all tested areas (18% points in reading vs. 2012 scores).
- 88% of EHHS grade 10 students scored at proficiency or above in writing. (14% points increase)
- EHHS grade 10 students increased 7% points in reading at proficient or better.
- 46/51 of CIBA grade 10 students received a 3 or better on all tests. (CAPT Scholars)
- 100% of CIBA grade 10 students scored at proficiency or above in writing.

Next Steps/Action Plan:

Throughout the 2012-2013 school year, EHPS has actively worked to structure and develop a strategic and efficient operating plan designed to focus specifically on student achievement. This plan aggressively targets areas of district need as well as seeks to capitalize on strengths. As an Alliance District, EHPS has infused the additional monies, \$4.3 Million (2013-2014), secured through legislation and the Connecticut State Department of Education (CSDE) to provide the resources for advanced student achievement and low performing school turnaround. This money is slated to provide support to the lowest performing schools within the district through specific programming, additional staffing and resources designed to promote student achievement. As the EHPS begins its second year as an Alliance District, EPHS eagerly anticipates results in accordance with the strategic plan goals and objectives.

The following chart summarizes pieces of the strategic operating plan that will guide the district through 2015.

- Identify instructional expectations for staff in all schools and provide professional support in the implementation of these strategies.
- Provide intervention opportunities for students who need extra assistance to meet new standards.
- Hire, retain, support and promote top level educators at all levels.
- Strengthen a PreK-Kindergarten partnership with public and private providers of preschool instruction to support
 the alignment of curriculum and instruction expectations in early childhood education to prepare students for
 kindergarten experiences.
- Implement and expand the Connecticut K-3 Literacy Initiative partnership with the University of Connecticut to enhance instruction and support for students in the primary grades to create a foundation for growth in reading achievement at grade 3 and beyond.
- Expand technology and multimedia literacy resources in classroom and school libraries to enhance instructional and research opportunities.
- Strengthen the partnership between families and schools through enhance two-way communication.
- Identify, procure and implement an internal assessment system capable of identifying student proficiencies and predicting future academic achievement.
- Emphasize a laser-like focus on the use of data to guide instruction and raise student achievement.

As you know, section 6.3 (c) of the Town Charter requires the Mayor to recommend "those capital projects to be undertaken during the ensuing fiscal year and the method (of) financing the same".

Related to this process, on March 12, 2013, the Town Council approved a 5-Year Capital Improvement Plan (copy attached) as part of the annual approval process related to the Mayor's Recommended Budget.

Know that by approving a 5-Year Capital Improvement Plan, such plan then becomes the basis of the LOCIP (Local Capital Improvement Program) submission to the State whereby certain items can be paid from an annual grant provided to the Town by the State.

Accordingly, by way of this memo, let me respectfully request that capital improvement item 2012-207 in the amount of \$115,000 for Phase V of the Town Hall Parking Lot Reconstruction be added by the Town Council to the existing 2013-2014 through 2017-2018 Adopted Capital Improvement Plan.

The purpose of this addition is to allow all funds expended for this reconstruction to be captured for submission to the State LOCIP program. The \$115,000 of LOCIP funds that have been identified to be added to this project are available because other previously approved LOCIP projects have been completed under budget so these become surplus funds that can be added to the Town Hall Parking Lot Reconstruction project.

Eileen Buckheit will be providing a separate LOCIP resolution to be approved by the Town Council to complete this request.
