We have reviewed the rate supplied by TD Bank (2.12%) and found it be consistent with rates on similar sized and structure issues which have recently sold in the competitive market. All of the included transactions have a similar bond rating to the Town (Moody's – Aa2) and a similar structure. However, a 10 year issue with at least substantially level principal payments for a Aa2 issuer is not overly common so some of the transactions are spread over an eleven week period. I would like to point out that the security on Florida Board of Governor's was a revenue pledge rather than a general obligation (full faith and credit) pledge. Specifically, the payment on the bonds are secured by a first lien on the Capital Improvement Fees levied on every student enrolled in the university system. However, based on 1) the essential service nature of the issuer (State University System); 2) the strength of the pledged revenue; and 3) the underlying credit strength of the university system, the bonds traded like general obligation bonds, as evidenced by the reoffering yields received on the issue.

I would also like to call your attention to the transaction for the Londonderry School District. Londonderry School District is different than East Hartford in that the district does not have direct taxing authority over the property owners within the district and relives on assessments to the Town of Londonderry, NH. This is similar to the statutory framework that exists for Connecticut school districts. Additionally, New Hampshire state law allows school districts to maintain only minimal fund balance and only with voter approval. If approved, local school districts can retain up to 2.5% of their operating budget which can only be used in the case of an emergency or for future tax relief. Generally speaking, these factors would negatively impact a school district's bond rating and ultimately the marketability of its bonds. However, in the case of Londonderry School District, both the district and the Town of Londonderry are rated Aa2 by Moody's, which I believe speaks to the underlying credit strength of the Town of Londonderry. Due to the Town's credit strength, I included the district's transaction in the comparisons. Furthermore, Londonderry does have a concentration in its employment and tax base similar to but albeit smaller than East Hartford's. I would like also like to point out that of the six bids that the district received on its bonds, five were 3.00% or higher. I believe that to be a function of the three things: 1) lack of direct taxing authority for the district; 2) the frequency that the district issues debt (last bond sale was June 2008) and most importantly, 3) the bank qualification of the bonds. In looking at the reoffering yields received on the bonds, it appears that the winning bidder assumed a larger benefit for the bank qualification than the other bidders. The benefit of the bank qualification is demonstrated in the lower reoffering yields seen in the 2021 to 2024 maturities. The lower reoffering yields and ultimately the large spread between the winning and second place bids exemplify the dynamics of the capital markets. On any given day, one investor may be more willing to put their capital at risk than other investors.

Finally, I would like to mention that by undertaking a direct placement with TD Bank, the Town saved approximately \$28,000 in issuance costs.

All health insurance costs shall be covered at one-hundred percent (100%) after the applicable annual deductible is reached in the plan year except prescriptions which shall have a co-pay of \$10, 25, 40.

Additional Contract Language Changes:

Section 3.1 Newly hired employees shall serve a probationary period of one hundred and twenty (120) work days, and shall have no seniority rights during this period, but shall be subject to all other provisions of this Agreement. Dismissal of an employee during his probationary period shall not be subject to the grievance procedure. Employees who have completed their probationary periods shall be full-time employees and shall acquire length of service records as of the date of their employment.

Section 3.4 Layoffs shall take effect as follows:

- a. Part-time employees of Local #1174,
- b. Employees working twenty (20) hours a week,
- c. Probationary employees,
- d. Full-time employees with the least seniority in the bargaining unit first, within the classification. A laid off employee shall have bumping rights laterally or downward within the bargaining unit based on his seniority and his ability to perform the job within thirty (30) days of the bumping.

Section 4.3 d.

d. Overtime opportunities shall be offered to the employee(s) with the lowest amount of charged overtime within classification. Said overtime shall be offered in the order in which it becomes available.

Section 4.3 e.

e. All employees will be given three (3) hours' notice, prior to the completion of their regular work day, when overtime work is to be performed to extend the regular work day. If such notice is not given, there will be no charge as provided for in Section c above.

Section 4.6

a. Employees may be temporarily assigned, within classification and by Town seniority, to perform work in other departments or divisions, except in the Waste Services Division. Such employees shall work the same work schedules as others regularly performing such work. The Director retains the exclusive right to determine the division or department from which the temporarily assigned employee is chosen.

<u>Section 6.1</u> The scheduling of vacation periods will be made by the Town, in accordance with the provisions of Sections 6.2 and 6.3, no later than April 15th of the vacation year. The use of individual vacation days will require that a request be made of the Supervisor at least twenty-four (24) hours in advance, under normal circumstances. A quarter-day or half-day vacation can be used during any two (2) or four (4) hour increments during the work day.

<u>Section 6.3</u> Whenever there shall be a conflict in requested dates, preference will be given to employee according to **Town** seniority.

<u>Section 7.2 Family Medical Leave</u>: The Town will comply with the terms of the Federal Family Medical Leave Act, as amended from time to time. Summary of some of the current terms of the Act can be found in Appendix ____.

Family Medical Leave

The terms of Family Medical Leave include but are not limited to the following:

- a. Under circumstances described below, employees will be eligible for up to 12 weeks of paid or unpaid family and medical leave in a twelve-month period. Pursuant to Federal Law, employees may choose, or employers may require the employee to use, accrued paid leave to cover some or all of the FMLA leave taken. In addition, employees may choose, or employers may require, the substitution of accrued paid vacation or personal leave for any of the situations covered by FMLA.
- b. Events which qualify employees for such up to twelve (12) weeks of unpaid leave are:
 - Birth or adoption of a child or placement of a child in the employee's home for foster care.
 - A serious health condition, as defined by FMLA, of the employee or employee's spouse, employee's parent or child.
 - Any qualifying exigency arising out of the fact that the employee's spouse, child or parent is a covered military member on "covered active duty."
- c. Employees may be eligible for up to twenty-six (26) weeks of leave during a single 12-month period to care for a covered servicemember with a serious injury or illness if the eligible employee is the servicemember's spouse, child, parent, or next of kin (military caregiver leave).
- e.d. To qualify for FMLA leave, employees requesting such leave must explain the reason for the leave in writing to their department head so that the Town can determine if FMLA-qualified leave will be granted.
- 4.e. The Town may require medical certification to document the reason for the leave, where provided by law.

- e.f. The Town will notify the employee in writing before the leave begins that the leave has been designated as FMLA leave and will be deducted from the allowable maximum.
- Leg. During the period of FMLA-qualified leave, the employee shall not be credited for length of service and shall not be credited with time for the purpose of accruing sick leave, vacation leave, or Personal Days.
- g.h. During the period of FMLA-qualified leave, the employee shall retain health benefits at the same level as before the leave. The Town will continue to pay the premiums as before the leave. Any employee contributions to health insurance shall be made directly to the Town by the employee.

Section 8.1 - Differentials

b. The Town agrees to pay all employees required to work on a paving operation a rate of fifty cents per hour added to their regular rate for the periods that they are required to work on this job.

Section 10.1

- c. The uniform may consist of the following:
 - Dark Blue Jacket
 - Colored shirt (must meet OSHA Specifications, otherwise, color vest will be warned)
 - Dark Blue Trousers
 - Dark Blue Shorts
 - T-shirt or other equivalent as determined by Department Head. (A total of five (5) t-shirts will be provided to each employee. Employees will assume the responsibility and care for T-shirts).
 - In lieu of the 5 t-shirts provided above, the Department Head shall offer two sweatshirts (hooded and/or non-hooded) and three (3) t-shirts.

All styles and types of uniforms shall be determined by Department Head. All employees will wear the issued uniform of the day.

Section 10.2

b. The Town will provide one (1) pair of safety shoes at least ankle high and steel-toed per year in an amount not to exceed \$150 annually and employees will wear Remainder of section to follow...

Additional Items:

1. In addition to the negotiated GWI's, effective upon ratification and approval, the Mechanic II position (both 52 Classifications) and the Maintenance Mechanic position (both 50 Classifications) shall receive an additional \$1.00 per hour. The remaining negotiated GWIs shall be applied to those hourly amounts moving forward.

In addition to the negotiated GWI's, effective upon ratification and approval, the Mechanic I position (46 Classification) shall receive an additional \$0.50 per hour to the wage rate in effect at that time. The remaining negotiated GWIs shall be applied to that hourly amounts moving forward.

2. On or about April of 2014, the parties agree to meet and discuss restructuring of the following Classifications (Maintainer I, II, III), Position Upgrades, and Positions:

Parts Garage Clerk: Upgrade from grade 44 to grade 48

Mechanic 1: Upgrade from grade 46 to Mechanic 2 grade 52

Maintainer 3 (Eductor operator): Upgrade from grade 48 to grade 52

Maintainer IV/HEO: Upgrade position

Senior Dike Maintainer: Upgrade from grade 48 to grade 52

Rolloff Driver: Create a Rolloff Driver position grade in sanitation

<u>Laborer:</u> Create a Laborer position grade in Sanitation

The Town of East Hartford ("Town") and Local 1174, Council 4, AFSCME, AFL-CIO ("Union"), hereinafter the Parties ("Parties") agree as follows:

- 1. The Parties are signatories to a collective bargaining agreement which expired by its own terms on June 30, 2012.
- - 3. The Union membership did not ratify the Tentative Agreement.
- 4. In an effort to resolve their differences and to avoid Binding Arbitration, the Parties agree to the following amendments to the Tentative Agreement:
 - A. Section 8.1(b): Substitute the following language:

The Town agrees to pay all employees, who were hired to work on a paving operation, a rate of one dollar (\$1.00) per hour added to their regular rate for the period that they are required to work on this job.

B. Add the following language to Section 8.2:

An employee permanently promoted into a higher level job classification in accordance with Article VIII, Section 8.4 (b) of the Working Agreement between the Town of East Hartford and Local 1174, may be eligible to receive the top step of pay for the higher level position as follows:

- i) The employee was able to demonstrate to the Public Works Director during their temporary promotion period the ability to perform all the tasks, duties and responsibilities assigned within the scope of the job description for the higher level job classification permanently promoted.
- C. Effective 7/1/14, employees hired prior to 2006 will not be required to contribute Two Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$250.00) per year toward retiree health insurance.
- D. Effective 7/1/15, employees hired prior to 2006 will be required to contribute one percent (1%) of their specific base pay towards retiree health insurance.

The Union will present these changes in the Tentative Agreement as set forth above to the Union membership. If the Union membership rejects the changes set forth herein, the Parties mutually agree and promise that this Memorandum of Understanding or the process of having a second revote on the Tentative Agreement will not be submitted by any Party during the Binding Arbitration proceedings as background evidence to the bargaining history between the Parties or for any other reason.

The Parties hereto sign their agreement with the terms of this Memorandum of Understanding dated this <u>30</u> day of May, 2014.

Perhaps the best place to start this discussion is to recall Storm Alford which hit East Hartford on October 29, 2011 causing widespread power outages which lasted for nearly a week.

During this natural disaster, East Hartford executed its Emergency Operations Plan (EOP) which included opening shelters and distributing food. Although East Hartford made it through the event better than most communities comparatively, after the event, a thorough assessment of the town's response was conducted and improvements were identified.

Opportunities to be better prepared in the future (important given we are the host site for Montville and Waterford in the event of an issue at the Millstone Power Plant) include improving the reliability of facilities and infrastructure through the addition of pad mounted generators at the High School and Middle School. Although we have applied for a grant to add this type of redundancy to our EOP, no award is imminent.

Additionally, the introduction of a trailer mounted generator that can connect to either one of two centrally located schools, both of which have gymnasium space for cots, shower facilities, and cooking facilities would also provide our EOP with scalability and flexibility.

In order to provide a funding source sufficient to procure the items necessary to expand and improve on our EOP as discussed above, a retrofit of the Town's streetlights moving from high pressure sodium fixtures to LED (light emitting diodes) fixtures was selected as the primary energy savings contract component when coupled with an Energy Performance Contract.

If you recall, East Hartford has completed two previous energy performance contracts totaling \$12.1 million whereby the premise is to replace certain equipment/fixtures with newer, more energy efficient equipment/fixtures so that the energy and maintenance savings over the life of the financing can be used to pay for the cost of improvement without any capital investment by the Town or its taxpayers.

With respect to this EPC, the savings generated from reduced electricity consumption (60%) and lower maintenance costs (40%) that are associated with a more efficient light fixture will be used to pay for the retrofit of 5,000 streetlight fixtures and provide for the items to improve our EOP which were discussed above and further detailed below.

Accordingly, by way of this memo, attached please find a resolution to allow the Mayor to enter into an Energy Performance Contract with Ameresco, Inc. to complete the following:

- 1. The conversion of approximately 5,000 streetlights to LED
- 2. The replacement of 50% of the downtown decorative street lights
- 3. The replacement of lighting fixtures at the Community Cultural Center apartments
- 4. The installation of two pad mounted generators; one at EHHS and one at the EHMS
- 5. The purchase of a trailer mounted generator
- 6. The installation of universal generator connections at Sunset Ridge and Hockanum
- 7. The purchase of a pad mounted generator for EHHA Hockanum Community Center
- 8. The replacement of external lighting fixtures on various Town buildings

A second resolution is also attached which provides the approval of the Town Council to enter into a municipal tax-exempt lease purchase financing with Bank of America. Bank of America was selected as the financing vendor due to their low rate and extensive experience underwriting energy performance contracts.

Both resolutions must be approved by the Town Council in order for the Town to continue with this project. Representatives from Ameresco, Inc. will be on hand for the July 15th Town Council meeting to discuss the retrofit and any other items related to the contract.

I have attached a cash flow based on the amount expected to be expended and financed by the town compared to the annual savings in the electricity and the maintenance of the new fixtures. When coupled together, the savings provides the funding source to complete this project without increasing costs to the East Hartford taxpayer.

Please be advised that East Hartford Fire Chief John Oates will be on hand to briefly review the EOP and how the generators will provide reliable sheltering to our citizens. East Hartford Police Chief Scott Sansom will also be on hand to briefly discuss the characteristics of LED lighting and how the white light provided by LEDs is beneficial to law enforcement in the field.

The contract terms, payment schedule, and other details of the contract shall be mutually determined between the company and the Mayor, whose signatures will indicate approval of specific terms and conditions.


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

Town Council Approval of the Sale of Individual Tax Liens

At the May 6, 2014 Town Council Meeting, the following motion was approved by the Town Council as it relates to tax liens the town is interested in selling.

MOTION By Bill Horan, seconded by Barbara Rossi

To recommend that the Town Council **authorize** the administration to conduct a tax lien sale by way of a request for proposal (RFP) and to seek and receive sealed bids pursuant to an invitation to bid on a number of tax liens held by the town on specific real property as listed on lists 1 and 2 as produced by Finance Director Mike Walsh and attached to a memorandum dated March 25, 2014 from Mayor Marcia Leclerc to Town Council Chair Richard Kehoe, subject to the following four conditions:

- The Collector of Revenue shall notify the record owner of each property subject to a lien that is to be included in the tax lien sale, by certified mail, that the lien is being included in the request for proposal and invitation to bid, and that the owner should contact the Town immediately to pay the taxes or seek a payment plan if they wish to keep the Town's tax liens on their property from being sold;
- 2. In order to qualify for a payment plan, the property owner must meet the following three criteria:
 - a. They must remit 25% of the outstanding amount due
 - b. They cannot have defaulted on a prior payment arrangement
 - c. Their property must not have active property code violations;
- 3. The letters from the Collector of Revenue to each property owner shall notify the property owner that the purchaser of the tax lien on their property shall have the right to foreclose on that property; and
- 4. The Administration shall return to the Town Council with the results of the request for proposal and that the proposal for each tax lien must be approved by the Town Council before it is sold.

With respect to the aforementioned motion, having satisfied the conditions of the process articulated by the Town Council, we need to return to the Town Council to seek approval to sell tax liens where the bids received by the Town through the request for proposal (RFP) process were satisfactory.

Know that 105 delinquent accounts totaling \$1,130,112.84 were included on the original list. 58 properties totaling \$511,578.18 were removed from the list when the owners came in and paid in full or entered into a payment plan with the town. Three properties on the list totaling \$4,704.27 did not receive any bids and therefore remain outstanding. Finally, 44 properties totaling \$613,830.39 are being recommended for sale and are presented below for the Town Council's approval:

Woods Cove III, LLC 3 bids totaling \$ 41,295.07 Empire VI CT Portfolio LLC 40 bids totaling \$ 629,013.22 VMFTL1, LLC 1 bid totaling \$ 5,962,81

It should be noted that all bids were at or above the tax and interest due to the town and resulted in an excess payment of \$62,440.71

Once these liens are sold, the property owner will have the opportunity to redeem these liens from the new owner based on a time period established by Connecticut General Statutes.

Based on these recommendations, I would respectfully request that this package of information be forwarded along to the Town Council for their approval.

RESOLUTION APPROPRIATING \$15,000,000 FOR THE PLANNING, DESIGN, CONSTRUCTION AND RECONSTRUCTION OF TOWN ROADS AND PARKING LOTS AND AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF \$15,000,000 BONDS OF THE TOWN TO MEET SAID APPROPRIATION AND PENDING THE ISSUANCE THEREOF THE MAKING OF TEMPORARY BORROWINGS FOR SUCH PURPOSE

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE TOWN COUNCIL OF THE TOWN OF EAST HARTFORD:

Section 1. The sum of \$15,000,000 is appropriated by the Town of East Hartford, Connecticut (the "Town") for the planning, design, construction and reconstruction of Town roads and parking lots, including rebuilding, resurfacing, drainage, conduits, and related subsurface and infrastructure improvements, and for administrative, legal and financing costs related thereto (the "Project").

To meet said appropriation, \$15,000,000 bonds of the Town or so much thereof as shall be Section 2. necessary for such purpose, shall be issued, maturing not later than the tenth year after their date. Said bonds may be issued in one or more series as determined by the Mayor, the Treasurer and the Director of Finance in the amount necessary to meet the Town's share of the cost of the Project, provided that the total amount of bonds to be issued shall not be less than an amount which will provide funds sufficient with other funds available for such purpose to pay the principal of and the interest on all temporary borrowings in anticipation of the receipt of the proceeds of said bonds outstanding at the time of the issuance thereof, and to pay for the administrative, printing and legal costs of issuing the bonds. The bonds shall be in the denominations of \$1,000, or any whole multiple in excess thereof, be issued fully registered form, be executed in the name and on behalf of the Town by the facsimile or manual signatures of the Mayor and the Treasurer, bear the Town seal or a facsimile thereof, be certified by a bank or trust company which bank or trust company may be designated the registrar and transfer agent, be payable at a bank or trust company and be approved as to their legality by Robinson & Cole LLP, Attorneys-at-Law, of Hartford, Connecticut. The bonds shall be general obligations of the Town and each of the bonds shall recite that every requirement of law relating to its issue has been duly complied with, that such bond is within every debt and other limit prescribed by law, and that the full faith and credit of the Town are pledged to the payment of the principal thereof and interest thereon. The aggregate principal amount of the bonds of each series to be issued, the annual installments of principal, redemption provisions, if any, the certifying, registrar and transfer agent and paying agent, the date, time of issue and sale and other terms, details and particulars of such bonds, including approval of the rate or rates of interest, shall be determined by the Mayor, the Treasurer and the Director of Finance in accordance with the General Statutes of Connecticut, Revision of 1958, as amended from time to time (the "Connecticut General Statutes").

Section 3. Said bonds shall be sold by the Mayor, the Treasurer and the Director of Finance in a competitive offering or by negotiation, in their discretion. If sold in a competitive offering, the bonds shall be sold at not less than par and accrued interest on the basis of the lowest net or true interest cost to the Town. A notice of sale or a summary thereof describing the bonds and setting forth the terms and conditions of the sale shall be published at least five days in advance of the sale in a recognized publication carrying municipal bond notices and devoted primarily to financial news and the subject of state and municipal bonds. If the bonds are sold by negotiation, provisions of the purchase agreement shall be approved by the Mayor, the Treasurer and the Director of Finance.

Section 4. The Mayor, the Treasurer and the Director of Finance are authorized to make temporary borrowings in anticipation of the receipt of the proceeds of said bonds. Notes evidencing such borrowings shall be signed by the Mayor and the Treasurer, have the seal of the Town affixed, be payable at a bank or trust company designated by the Mayor, the Treasurer and the Director of Finance, be approved as to their legality by Robinson & Cole LLP, Attorneys-at-Law, of Hartford, Connecticut, and be certified by a bank or trust company designated by the Mayor, the Treasurer and the Director of Finance pursuant to Section 7-373 of the Connecticut General Statutes. They shall be issued with maturity dates which comply with the provisions of the Connecticut General Statutes governing the issuance of such notes. The notes shall be general obligations of the Town and

each of the notes shall recite that every requirement of law relating to its issue has been duly complied with, that such note is within every debt and other limit prescribed by law, and that the full faith and credit of the Town are pledged to the payment of the principal thereof and the interest thereon. The net interest cost on such notes, including renewals thereof, and the expense of preparing, issuing and marketing them, to the extent paid from the proceeds of such renewals or said bonds, shall be included as a cost of the Project. Upon the sale of the bonds, the proceeds thereof, to the extent required, shall be applied forthwith to the payment of the principal of and the interest on any such notes then outstanding or shall be deposited with a bank or trust company in trust for such purpose.

Section 5. The Town hereby expresses its official intent pursuant to Section 1.150-2 of the Federal Income Tax Regulations, Title 26 (the "Regulations"), to reimburse expenditures paid sixty days prior to and anytime after the date of passage of this resolution in the maximum amount of the Project with the proceeds of bonds, notes or other obligations ("Tax Exempt Obligations") authorized to be issued by the Town. The Tax Exempt Obligations shall be issued to reimburse such expenditures not later than 18 months after the later of the date of the expenditure or the substantial completion of the Project, or such later date the Regulations may authorize. The Town hereby certifies that the intention to reimburse as expressed herein is based upon its reasonable expectations as of this date. The Director of Finance or his designee is authorized to pay Project expenses in accordance herewith pending the issuance of the Tax Exempt Obligations.

Section 6. The Mayor, the Treasurer and the Director of Finance are hereby authorized, on behalf of the Town, to enter into agreements or otherwise covenant for the benefit of bondholders to provide information on an annual or other periodic basis to Municipal Securities Rulemaking Board (the "MSRB") and to provide notices to the MSRB of certain events as enumerated in Securities and Exchange Commission Exchange Act Rule 15c2-12, as amended, as may be necessary, appropriate or desirable to effect the sale of the bonds and notes authorized by this resolution. Any agreements or representations to provide information to MSRB made prior hereto are hereby confirmed, ratified and approved.

Section.7. The Mayor, the Treasurer and the Director of Finance are hereby authorized, on behalf of the Town, to enter into any other agreements, instruments, documents and certificates, including tax and investment agreements, for the consummation of the transactions contemplated by this resolution. The Mayor, the Treasurer and the Director of Finance are hereby authorized, on behalf of the Town, to apply for and accept any and all Federal and State loans and or grants-in-aid of any Project, to expend said funds in accordance with the terms hereof, and in connection therewith to contract in the name of the Town with engineers, contractors and others.

House Bill No. 5140

Public Act No. 14-124

AN ACT CONCERNING PROPERTY TAX RELIEF ON CERTAIN REAL PROPERTY HELD IN TRUST.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Assembly convened:

Section 1. Subsection (a) of section 12-129n of the general statutes is repealed and the following is substituted in lieu thereof (*Effective October 1, 2014, and applicable to assessment years commencing on and after said date*):

(a) Any municipality may, by vote of its legislative body on recommendation of its board of finance or equivalent body, provide property tax relief to residents of such municipality, with respect to real property owned and occupied by such residents as their principal residence, or held in trust for and occupied by such residents as their principal residence, who are (1) sixty-five years of age and over, or whose spouses, living with them, are sixty-five years of age or over or sixty years of age or over and the surviving spouse of a taxpayer qualified in such municipality under this section at the time of his or her death or with respect to real property on which such residents or their spouses are liable for taxes under section 12-48, or (2) under age sixty-five and eligible in accordance with applicable federal regulations to receive permanent total disability benefits under Social Security, or have not been engaged in employment covered by Social

Security and accordingly have not qualified for benefits thereunder, but have become qualified for permanent total disability benefits under any federal, state or local government retirement or disability Railroad Retirement Act and plan, including the government-related teacher's retirement plan, in which requirements with respect to qualifications for such permanent total disability benefits are comparable to such requirements under Social Security, provided such residents or their spouses under subdivisions (1) or (2) above have been taxpayers of such municipality for one year immediately preceding their receipt of tax benefits under this section, and meet the requirements which may be established by such municipality with respect to maximum income allowable during the calendar year preceding the year in which application is made for the tax relief provided in this section. No such property tax relief, together with any relief received by any such resident under the provisions of sections 12-129b to 12-129d, inclusive, and 12-170aa shall exceed, in the aggregate the total amount of the tax which would, except for said sections 12-129b to 12-129d, inclusive, 12-170aa and this section, be laid against the taxpayer.


