

ARTICLE 8

To see if the Town will vote to establish a municipal water supply and water distributing system shown on a plan entitled Water Distribution System Development Backbone and Landfill Area, March 2014, pursuant to Section 39A of Chapter 40 of the General Laws; and

to appropriate the sum of \$45.8 million for establishing such a system for the Town, including, without limitation, the taking or purchase of water sources or water or flowage rights, the taking or purchase of land or easements for the water system or for the protection of the water system, the construction and development of wells, the construction of water towers, the construction of buildings for water treatment and pumping stations, the laying and relaying of water mains, the purchase and installation of water meters, fire hydrants and other water department equipment, and design and engineering and other costs incidental thereto, and including without limitation all costs thereof as defined in Section 1 of Chapter 29C of the General Laws; and

that to meet this appropriation the Treasurer with the approval of the Board of Selectmen is authorized to borrow \$45.8 million and issue bonds or notes therefore under Chapter 44 of the General Laws and/or Chapter 29C of the General Laws; and

This Article will provide a system that includes all the basic elements to allow for expansion to all parts of town in the future. That is what is known as the "backbone with landfill study area service" and further included in this proposal is, a single water tower (two will be needed at system build out), hydrants, and service connections along all the ways shown on the map. 



Project Narrative Attachment:Nauset Marsh Trail replacement boardwalk at Salt Pond Cape Cod National Seashore
Spring 2014

Locus of project area: Location of the former Nauset Bridge, Salt Pond, Eastham, MA.





Description:

This project replaces the heavily damaged Nauset Marsh Trail bridge that was removed from town land in 2013 with a timber plank boardwalk that is supported by cedar logs on-grade.



Current Conditions:

Citizens installed a temporary fix due to the routinely inundated walking surface at the edge of the Salt Pond marsh (see photo below). This alternative concept is similarly low-tech, with some built-in environmental and safety improvements for boardwalk sections extending approximately 80 feet.




Work/Construction Protocol, Staging and Performance Standards:

About eight 10-foot sections of boardwalk will be installed. The seashore proposes to install 6' long cedar logs to stabilize the walking surface, and install approximately 4 stainless steel helical anchors for each section to allow for the boardwalk sections to rise and fall with tidal fluctuations during storm conditions. Rough-sawn timber planks (not pressure-treated) will be used for the boardwalk surface, 3"x8" by 10' long. About 16 cedar log footings and 32 helical anchors will keep the walking surface from floating away, while also providing a stable walking surface. The walking surface will have five planks with 3" gaps between them for two-way foot traffic.

The former bridge pilings will be removed. The boardwalk will be assembled without the use of heavy equipment at the marsh. Battery-powered tools will be utilized on site. Materials will be brought in by pick-up truck; the truck will access the site via the town landing off Route 6 and will drive along the shoreline of the pond for a distance of about 1900 feet (see above); access will occur at low tide.

Proposed conditions:



Disturbance in the resource area and Limit of Work:


The log footings of the boardwalk will be installed within the footprint of the existing path along the edge of the marsh grass at or above mean high water. The trail cannot be relocated to the upland because that area is privately-owned, so the boardwalk protects the salt marsh from trampling while allowing the public to cross the edge of the marsh without wet feet.


The total project area is about 480 square feet within the edge of the salt marsh, which is a reduction of 200 square feet from the 137' long by 5 foot wide bridge that the boardwalk replaces.

The statutory Interests of the Mass Wetlands Protection Act will not be impacted by this proposal. No protected species are present in the project area, as previously confirmed by seashore's Natural Resource Management staff. The project will improve the conditions of the site, not impeding tidal water flow and allowing sunlight penetration. The site will be accessed by an existing pathway that has been previously disturbed and degraded by foot traffic. The replacement boardwalk area is confined by the existing path, clearly delineating a previously disturbed work limit area.


Red cedar boardwalk logs from Skiff Hill area, Eastham



Under the terms of the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA), the National Park Service (NPS) at Cape Cod National Seashore is undertaking environmental compliance analysis and documentation for replacement of a bridge with a 80' boardwalk at Nauset Marsh Trail at Salt Pond in Eastham, MA. We are filing a Notice of Intent under the Massachusetts Wetlands Protection Act for the project, and include a copy for your consideration.

Appropriate Best Management Practices (BMPs) have been built into the design to avoid or limit impacts to resources. We request any information regarding state-listed or proposed threatened or endangered species or critical habitats that might occur in the project vicinity, and any special management considerations for such species. The project areas are depicted on the sections of the USGS Quadrangle and Mass GIS maps, and the project narrative attachment.

Re: DEP File# SE 19-1526 Notice of Intent filed by The Whole Clam, LLC for demolition and construction of business located at 51 Old State Highway, Map 22, Parcel 001.

On January 28, 2014, the Conservation Commission approved revised plans by Baxter Nye Engineering. The plans included a dewatering protocol that was acceptable to the commission. The water table is high in this area and the contractor needs to have dry ground to set an approved concrete wall. The protocol included that dewatering should be filtered by crushed stone silt fencing and hay bales to catch any sediment before reaching a storm drain. Recently, the conservation office was informed that the dewatering was diverted with a hose directly into a storm drain that leads to Town Cove. Baxter Nye Engineering was immediately contacted by the conservation office and as a result the engineering company immediately conducted a site visit, corrected the dewatering operation and submitted a site inspection report. The Town of Orleans conservation office was also contacted regarding the dewatering and e-mailed a copy of the site inspection report. The Orleans conservation office responded and did not seem concerned. The dewatering is a temporary operation for the concrete wall and will cease as soon as possible. Site inspections will be conducted daily by the conservation office to ensure the dewatering operation is in compliance with the protocol until completion which is estimated for April 4, 2014.

This letter confirms the decision of the Eastham Board of Selectmen, which met with you on Monday March 17th, not to grant your request to move an aquaculture grant located in Town Cove in front of 700 State Highway. The location of this aquaculture grant was last discussed by the Board in December 2010, at which time the licensees agreed to move the grant slightly to the north to accommodate your needs for boating access to Town Cove. Because this grant has been in continuous use for several decades and because there is no acceptable alternative location for this grant, the Board decided it could not accommodate your request as an upland property owner at the expense of the shellfishermen who earn a livelihood shellfishing at this location. Town staff will discuss with the licensee flagging the pipes so they are visible at high tide. Attached, as requested, are catch reports.

Project Description and Protocol: Nauset Light Beach stairway emergency replacement Cape Cod National Seashore, Spring 2014



This project is to replace the stairs at Nauset Light Beach, which is co-managed by the Seashore and the Town of Eastham. The stairs were damaged and washed away by major storms in January and February 2014. Large ocean wave surges at high tides swept the bottom section of stairs and the stabilizing sandy slope away from the foundation post footings. Unfortunately the stairs were replaced last year, and need to be replaced again. This project is necessary for the safety of about one million beachgoers utilizing the beach per year.

The work will necessitate a full reconstruction due to the lack of safe footings. The scope is to completely replace the stairs, landings and railings that were lost. The new stairs will be constructed to building codes and will include landings and handrails, and a seating area and overlook at the top. The stairs will be designed and constructed in "breakaway" sections, toenailed together, with the intent that future storm damage will be isolated to the lower section(s). Salvaged materials will be used as possible. Recycled plastic lumber will be used for non-structural elements.

The existing boardwalk route will be used for the modified location of the stairs to the beach. The plan is to follow the existing boardwalk to its current endpoint. From there it will run parallel to the bluff, and may necessitate a slight cutting back of the dune for the boardwalk extension to an un-vegetated area for a platform and stair landing that will be at a safe setback. At the low point of the bluff, a replacement platform of 8' x 16' or smaller will be constructed that will serve as a viewing spot and the starting point of the stairs and landings down to the beach. Stairs will be laid out in a switchback configuration to closely follow the slope of the bluff. This will keep the foot of the stairs as close to the base of the bluff as possible.

To minimize site disturbance, park maintenance personnel or a contractor will replace the boardwalk elements manually. New stair sections will be constructed off-site to the extent practical. Trucks and equipment will access project areas on paved surfaces and boardwalk areas to the work site. Pressure treated lumber will not be used. Any mechanical equipment used will be taken off site each day. This work is being conducted at the top of the coastal bank and down the bank to the beach. All work is desired to be completed by May 23, 2014.

Due to concerns about Federally Threatened piping plover species nesting, after April 1 US Fish & Wildlife Service needs to consult and approve the construction activity. Shorebird monitors will be required to escort and oversee construction activity.

The alternative of doing nothing leaves one of two ocean beaches in Eastham without access. As the facilities are on a 40-60 foot high bluff, the only safe route to the beach is via wood stair structures. Beach stairs necessitate anchoring the stairs within the base flood elevation as the beach interface with the Atlantic Ocean is a Velocity zone; this is unavoidable. Without the stairs there would be more damage to fragile natural resources as beachgoers try to get to the beach by walking through dunes and down bluffs. This is a courtesy notification for work on the coastal bank as per the national seashore's letter of January 2005 (attached).

In recent years Cape Cod National Seashore has consulted with the local Conservation Commission about various park projects. The intent of this consultation has been to provide information to the towns about project activities within the seashore and to seek input on those activities. The seashore has recently received clarification from the Department of the Interior Solicitor's Office of our legal responsibilities associated with state and local regulatory requirements and process. Based on this input from our legal counsel, we are modifying our approach to consulting with the town Conservation Commissions on certain kinds of activities. Although our approach will change, our intent is to continue to ensure that towns are kept informed and can be involved in our decision making on projects of mutual interest.

A fundamental aspect of the federal-state regulatory relationship is that Federal Agencies are exempt from all state and local permitting requirements, except when Congress clearly indicates that the sovereign immunity of the Federal Government is waived. One instance of such a waiver relates to activities resulting in the discharge or run-off of pollutants as presented in Section 313 of the Clean Water Act codified as 33 United States Code Section 1323 (a). Thus, when federal actions "result in the discharge or run-off of pollutants" and there are state and local (e.g., Conservation Commission) permitting processes regulating these, the park is subject to those permitting requirements (see enclosure noting the statutory definition of "pollutant"). In other words, the park is required to consult with the Conservation Commission on any activity that may "result in the discharge or run-off of pollutants." The park is also subject to Massachusetts Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) requirements for water pollution discharge permits, including subsurface permits, such as those issued for septic systems.

In terms of activities occurring in wetland areas, the state Wetland Protection Act, Chapter 131, Massachusetts General Law, Section 40 is far broader in scope than discharge control. The

interests protected through this law include storm damage control, wildlife protection, and other interests beyond pollutants discharge. The sovereign immunity of the Federal Government has interests beyond pollutants discharge. The sovereign immunity of the Federal Government has not been waived for any of the above mentioned interests. As a result, the park is exempt from the requirement of consulting the Conservation Commission (i.e., filing a Notice of Intent) for the requirement of consulting the conservation commission (i.e., filing a Notice of Intent) for the requirement of consulting the coastal bank or related issues, except when the discharge of pollutants is a projects affecting the coastal bank or related issues, except when the discharge of pollutants is a concern, even though the activity would otherwise be subject to the review authority of the conservation Commission if the same activity were being conducted by a non-federal entity on non-federal land.

Further, Standard Condition No. 8 requires filing of the Order of Conditions within the chain of title of the property at the Registry of Deeds. However, this provision is not connected to the "discharge or runoff of pollutants," so the Federal Government does not need to comply with this "discharge or runoff of pollutants," so the Federal Government does not need to comply with this condition. Rest assured that the property will be protected regardless of such registry filing.

Please be advised that in the future we will send informational letters to the town about proposed projects that may have a mutual interest, and we welcome your timely input. We will also be conservative in our interpretation of the type of activities that fall within the waiver and when appropriate will file Notices of Intent when it is warranted. 

A native shrub of eastern North America which most often occurs in poor, sandy or gravelly, infertile soils, such as along roadsides. Easily grown in average, medium, well-drained soil in full sun to part shade. Description:

This project replaces the heavily damaged Nauset Marsh Trail bridge that was removed from town land in 2013 with a timber plank boardwalk that is supported by cedar logs on-grade.



Current Conditions:

Citizens installed a temporary fix due to the routinely inundated walking surface at the edge of the Salt Pond marsh (see photo below). This alternative concept is similarly low-tech, with some built-in environmental and safety improvements for boardwalk sections extending approximately 80 feet.




Work/Construction Protocol, Staging and Performance Standards:

About eight 10-foot sections of boardwalk will be installed. The seashore proposes to install 6' long cedar logs to stabilize the walking surface, and install approximately 4 stainless steel helical anchors for each section to allow for the boardwalk sections to rise and fall with tidal fluctuations during storm conditions. Rough-sawn timber planks (not pressure-treated) will be used for the boardwalk surface, 3"x8" by 10' long. About 16 cedar log footings and 32 helical anchors will keep the walking surface from floating away, while also providing a stable walking surface. The walking surface will have five planks with 3" gaps between them for two-way foot traffic.

The former bridge pilings will be removed. The boardwalk will be assembled without the use of heavy equipment at the marsh. Battery-powered tools will be utilized on site. Materials will be brought in by pick-up truck; the truck will access the site via the town landing off Route 6 and will drive along the shoreline of the pond for a distance of about 1900 feet (see above); access will occur at low tide.


The log footings of the boardwalk will be installed within the footprint of the existing path along the edge of the marsh grass at or above mean high water. The trail cannot be relocated to the upland because that area is privately-owned, so the boardwalk protects the salt marsh from trampling while allowing the public to cross the edge of the marsh without wet feet.


The total project area is about 480 square feet within the edge of the salt marsh, which is a reduction of 200 square feet from the 137' long by 5 foot wide bridge that the boardwalk replaces.

The statutory Interests of the Mass Wetlands Protection Act will not be impacted by this proposal. No protected species are present in the project area, as previously confirmed by seashore's Natural Resource Management staff. The project will improve the conditions of the site, not impeding tidal water flow and allowing sunlight penetration. The site will be accessed by an existing pathway that has been previously disturbed and degraded by foot traffic. The replacement boardwalk area is confined by the existing path, clearly delineating a previously disturbed work limit area.


Red cedar boardwalk logs from Skiff Hill area, Eastham






Please see below the proposed scope of work for the Sandy Meadow Trail CPA project. The scope of work has been reviewed by the Director of Public Works and the Open Space Committee. We will move forward after approval of the Town Administrator / Board of Selectmen

Summary: The project requires altering the hiking trail located within the southwest corner of town-owned property at Sandy Meadow into a 700 linear foot long, universally accessible nature trail.

Scope of Work: A continuous, unobstructed path for universal accessibility.

Guidelines: Using the guidelines from Accessibility Guidebook for Outdoor Recreation and Trails, Trail Planning and Management Fundamentals and Interagency Trail Data Standards (ITDS); the 700 foot universally accessible trail will connect directly to a loop of current undeveloped trails on the Sandy Meadow property.

Design and Construction Parameters: Technical specifications for trail construction and maintenance, based on the Designed Use and Trail Class for a universally accessible trail.

Design parameters include:

- Tread Width
- Surface
- Grade
- Cross-Slope
- Clearing
- Turn around / rest area
- Parking spaces

The Trail: A Universally Accessible Trail is a route that is designed, constructed, and designated for recreational pedestrian use or provided as an pedestrian alternative offering service to a diverse range of visitors including: hikers, runners, pedestrians, those with strollers, or are mobility impaired, and those in wheelchairs.

Trail Width: The width of the trail tread is 60 inches, allowing for passing along the trail. The edge of the trail will be protected by an 18 inch apron on both sides. Further, many people will use the natural tactile change between the trail surface and the surrounding ground surface to distinguish between the edge and the surface of the trail

Trail Length: 700 linear feet long, from the trailhead at the parking area to the T-Shaped turn around / resting area at the end of the trail.

Trail Surface: Compacted Crushed fines / stones. These crusher fines interlock together forming a hard firm surface.

Trail Grade: The trail grade is consistent with the vertical distance of ascent or descent of a trail expressed as a percentage of its length, commonly measured as a ratio of rise to length. That requires the trail comply with one or more of four separate provisions for trail grade: up to 1:20 (5%), up to 1:12 (8.33%), up to 1:10 (10%), and up to 1:8 (12%). Trail grade of up to 1:20 (5%) is permitted for any distance.

Trail Drainage: In addition, the trail design must ensure proper drainage. A trail grade of up to 1:7 (14%) is permitted into and out of a drain dip where the cross slope does not exceed 1:20 (5%).

Trail Resting Area: A T-Shaped resting area will be located at the end of the 700 foot trail. The resting area must be 60 inches long and wide to accommodate a person using a wheelchair.

Trail Clearance: The trail will provide at least 80 inches of headroom.

Trailhead Parking: Two parking spaces will be located south of the trailhead. One parking space, closest to the universally accessible trailhead, will be designated for handicapped parking and be located near the accessible trail entrance. The parking space will be at least 8 feet wide with a level access aisle not less than 5 feet, connected to the trail. The other space will be 8 feet wide and available to visitors. Both parking spaces will be 20 feet in length.
