Present: Chairman Lisa J. O'Donnell, Selectman Andrew C. Spinney, Selectman Peter D. Phippen, Town Administrator Brendhan Zubricki, and Selectmen's Assistant Pamela J. Witham.

Also Present: Virginia Antell, Susan Gould-Coviello, Michael Flynn, David Gabor, Jeffrey Jones, Tina Lane, and Richard Ross.

Chairman O'Donnell called the meeting to order at 6:00 p.m. in the 2nd floor stage conference of the Town Hall and announced that the Board would hear Public Comment. No one offered any comment.

Mr. Zubricki began the presentation of his Town Administrator's Report for the period September 8th through September 21st, 2018, regarding the following:

<u>Future OSHA Compliance</u>: Mr. Zubricki reported that both he and Board of Health Agent Erin Kirchner had attended a recent overview seminar sponsored by the Town's insurance agent regarding the new Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) requirements from the Massachusetts Department of Labor Standards (DLS) that will go into effect in February 2019. The BOH Agent is willing to oversee the Town's compliance in this matter with occasional help from consultants and current office personnel and with additional training, thereby avoiding the need to hire an OSHA compliance officer.

Preservation of the Town-owned Central Schoolhouse, 28 Main Street: Mr. Zubricki reviewed the work being planned by the Essex Historical Society and the Essex Shipbuilding Museum regarding the repairs to the Central Schoolhouse at 28 Main Street. It is hoped and anticipated that funding for the work will be provided by the Society, CPA funding, and grants, and will include replacing the roof, replacing the furnace, painting the exterior, and other miscellaneous repairs. The building is used by the EHS&ESM for displaying artifacts, including ship models on loan from the Smithsonian Institute, and archival storage of documents pertaining to the Town's history. The Board was in favor of the proposed repairs, contingent upon the Society consulting with the Historical Commission regarding the repairs. Any repairs that propose the use of Town funds will be contracted for by the Selectmen.

<u>Fall Town Meeting Warrant, Special Election Warrant, Meeting Guide</u>: The Board reviewed Mr. Zubricki's first draft of a guide to the articles on the Fall Town Meeting Warrant. The guide is intended to offer residents more in depth information, as well as the Board's opinion, regarding the more complicated articles on the warrant. Mr. Zubricki will revise the guide, based on the Board's comments, which included a decision to comment on select articles.

In other business, a motion was made, seconded, and unanimously voted to approve the weekly warrant in the amount of \$726,709.08.

A motion was made, seconded and unanimously voted to exempt from Section 20 of Chapter 268A of the General Laws, the contracts and amounts for the individuals listed below contained within the 9/20/18 warrant pursuant to subsection (d) of said Section.

A motion was made, seconded, and unanimously voted to approve the minutes for the Selectmen's July 11, 2018 Open Meeting and Executive Session.

A motion was made, seconded, and unanimously voted to accept the resignation of Gayle McKinley from the Economic Development Committee.

Mr. Zubricki suggested that the Board table discussion of an application for an Emergency Management Performance Grant, pending receipt of the documents from the State, and the Board agreed.

A motion was made, seconded, and unanimously voted to approve a Notice of Intent (NOI) developed by the Department of Public Works regarding the Town's compliance with the Municipal Separate Storm Sewer System (MS4) Permit program, administered by the United States Department of Environmental Protection (EPA).

The Board discussed a request from the Youth Director to place an EYC mailbox on Town Hall grounds. It was agreed to deny the request. At present, residents may drop off items for the EYC at the Town Hall during business hours or they may send them by regular mail. The EYC Director will also be informed that she can work with s software vendor to provide on-line services.

Mr. Zubricki reported that one nomination had been received for Volunteer of the Year and one nomination received for Employee of the Year. The Board was in favor of both nominations and asked Mr. Zubricki to order the awards which will be presented at the Fall Town Meeting.

A motion was made, seconded, and unanimously voted to approve and sign the Warrant for the 2018 State Election.

Concerning Conomo Point Matters, the Board signed one-year lease renewal offers to twenty Conomo Point tenants. The Board had previously voted in favor of offering these lease renewals.

Mr. Zubricki reported that there was no need to move to Executive Session since there had been no new developments regarding Drinkwater, as Trustee of the Drinkwater Essex Realty Trust vs. Town of Essex, Land Court Civil Action No. 18-MISC-000391.

The Board reviewed and approved a proposed Selectmen's meeting schedule for the remainder of the calendar year and for early 2019.

The Board reviewed a request for a building permit for the replacement of floorboards on an exterior porch at 130 Conomo Point Road, Map 108, Lot 65, DRW Trust. Selectman Spinney, moved that the Board of Selectmen, in its capacity as Conomo Point Commissioners, approve a building renovation request made by Thayer McKenzie, to renovate the existing structure on the

premises located at 130 Conomo Point Road (Map 108, Lot 65), subject to the following terms and conditions:

- 1. The work shall be done in accordance with the terms and conditions set forth in Sections 2 and 3 of Article IX and Article X of the Land Lease commencing on January 1, 2017 (the "Lease"), which terms and conditions are expressly made part of this approval.
- 2. The work shall include upgrade of the septic system serving the premises in accordance with the criteria of the Board of Health, if deemed necessary by the Board of Health and any prescribed work has not yet been completed.
- 3. The renovated dwelling shall be considered the "Improvements" for purposes of the Lease.
- 4. The Lessee acknowledges that nothing in this vote is intended to convey or imply any right, title or interest in the Town's property, or any portion thereof, and that nothing herein is intended to extend the term of the Lease or to waive the Town's right of termination pursuant to Article XI thereof, and further that the Town expressly reserves the right to assert ownership of the newly constructed dwelling in accordance with Article V of the Lease.
- 5. The Lessee shall sign a written acknowledgment of his agreement to these conditions, which acknowledgement shall be countersigned by the Town Administrator on behalf of the Board.
- 6. The renovation may, which currently only includes replacement of exterior floorboards, may not be expanded in scope without seeking approval from this Board, which may be denied.

(See Building Permit Application dated September 11, 2018, and initialed by the Chairman, September 24, 2018, for the specific alterations requested.)

The motion was moved, seconded, and unanimously voted.

Mr. Zubricki reported that Dan Mayer has offered to organize Conomo Point residents, along with the President of the Conomo Point Association to maintain the planting bed/drainage swale at the new Conomo Point Park starting next season.

Chairman O'Donnell entertained a motion to approve a written request for the transfer of all interests in the leasehold for the property at 111 Conomo Point Road (Map 108, Lot 76) from Cozy Cottage LLC, 277 Royal Poinciana Way 218, Palm Beach, FL 33480; to Brooke and Robert Carroll, adding that nothing in this approval is intended to convey or imply any right, title or interest in the subject property, or any portion thereof that was not already held by Cozy Cottage LLC. The motion was moved, seconded, and unanimously approved.

Chairman O'Donnell also entertained a motion to approve a written request for the addition of the following people to the leasehold for the property at 113 Conomo Point Road and 0 Conomo Point Road (Map 108, Lots 74 and 75): Aude C. Sisk, Dr. Geoffroy C. Sisk, Adelaide (Sisk) Ness, and Jean-Charles A. Sisk; and further, that nothing in this approval is intended to convey

or imply any right, title or interest in the subject property, or any portion thereof to the parties being added that was not held by those already on the lease. The motion was moved, seconded, and unanimously approved.

Concerning a proposed Special Election, a motion was made, seconded, and unanimously voted to hold a Special Election on November 6, 2018, concurrent with the State Election; a motion was made, seconded, and unanimously voted to open the warrant for the November 6, 2018 Special Election; a motion was made, seconded, and unanimously voted to add ballot questions to the November 6, 2018 Special Election warrant per the draft warrant presented at this meeting, or as revised (which is attached hereto); a motion was made, seconded, and unanimously voted to close the warrant; a motion was made, seconded, and unanimously voted to approve the warrant; a motion was made, seconded, and unanimously voted to sign the warrant; and, a motion was made, seconded, and unanimously voted to transmit the ballot language for the November 6, 2018 Special Election to the Town Clerk.

At 7:30 p.m., Town Moderator Jeffrey Jones; Finance Committee Vice-Chair Michael Flynn and FinCom members David Gabor and Richard Ross; and, Town Accountant Virginia Antell joined the Board. Those present reviewed and discussed at length each monetary item on the Fall Town Meeting Warrant. The Summary of Monetary Articles will be revised based on the discussion and made available to residents at the Fall Town Meeting in October.

Susan Coviello joined those present to request that the Board proclaim October 7 through 14, Cape Ann Plein Air Week. The Board was in agreement, and a motion was made, seconded, and unanimously voted to approve and sign the proclamation. Ms. Coviello thanked the Board and left the meeting.

Virginia Antell, Michael Flynn, David Gabor, Jeffrey Jones, and Richard Ross left the meeting.

A motion was made, seconded, and unanimously voted to hold the Fall Town Meeting on Tuesday, October 16, 2018 at 7:30 p.m. at the Essex Elementary School; a motion was made, seconded, and unanimously voted to open the warrant for the October 16, 2018 Fall Town Meeting; a motion was made, seconded, and unanimously voted to add articles to the warrant for the October 16, 2018 Fall Town Meeting per the draft warrant presented at this meeting (which is attached hereto); a motion was made, seconded, and unanimously voted to close the warrant; a motion was made, seconded, and unanimously voted to approve the warrant; and, a motion was made, seconded, and unanimously voted to sign the warrant.

There being no further business before the Board, a motion was made, seconded, and unanimously voted to adjourn the meeting at 8:32 p.m.

ARTICLE 1

During the moratorium period, the Town shall undertake a planning process to address the potential impacts of recreational marijuana in the Town, and to consider the Cannabis Control Commission regulations regarding Recreational Marijuana Establishments, and shall consider adopting new Zoning Bylaws in response to these new issues.
