

Fairhaven Board of Selectmen November 23, 2015 Meeting Minutes

Present: Chairman Geoffrey Haworth, Vice Chairman Charles K. Murphy, Sr., Clerk Robert Espindola, Executive Secretary Jeffrey Osuch, and Administrative Assistant Anne O'Brien.

Chairman Geoffrey Haworth called the meeting to order in the Town Hall Banquet Room at 6:36 p.m. The meeting was audio recorded by the Selectmen's Office and video recorded by the Government Access channel.

MINUTES

- Mr. Murphy motioned to approve the minutes of the November 9, 2015 meeting, open session. Mr. Espindola seconded. Vote was unanimous. (3-0).
- Mr. Murphy motioned to approve the minutes of the **November 9, 2015** meeting, **executive** session. Mr. Espindola seconded. Vote was unanimous. (3-0).

OXFORD-ROGERS TAG SALES

The Board discussed the recent tag sales at Rogers School and Oxford Schools. The surplus furniture and equipment brought in approximately \$12,000. The Board thanked the volunteers who made the tag sales possible.

TOWN HALL SIDEWALKS

Change Order #1 – The Board reviewed Change Order #1 for the Town Hall Sidewalk project in the amount of \$17,305.83. Mr. Murphy motioned to approve Change Order #1 in that amount. Mr. Espindola seconded. Vote was unanimous. (3-0).

Requisition #3 – Mr. Murphy motioned to approve Requisition #3 in the amount of \$70,126.23. Mr. Espindola seconded. Vote was unanimous. (3-0).

NON-UNION REVIEW

Mr. Murphy said that he still has not received feedback from the Personnel Board regarding Jeff DuPont's review of non-union positions. He will contact the Personnel Board members again and try to get an answer in time for the December 8 meeting.

EVERSOUCE GAS PERMITS

Mr. Murphy motioned to approve Eversource gas permits for 366 Main Street, 18 Kane Street, 35 Hacker Street and 31 Brook Drive, all previously approved by the BPW. Mr. Espindola seconded. Vote was unanimous. (3-0).

BELL COMMITTEE APPOINTMENTS

Mr. Murphy motioned to appoint Helena Oliveira, Debra Lambalot, and Kathy Groh to the Fairhaven Bell Committee as Associate members. Mr. Espindola seconded. Vote was unanimous. (3-0).

WELLNESS COMMITTEE APPOINTMENTS

Mr. Murphy motioned to appoint Jennifer Polochick, Anne O'Brien, and Lindsay Gordon to the Wellness Committee. Mr. Espindola seconded. Vote was unanimous. (3-0).

CLE WORK ORDER #4

The Board reviewed CLE work order #4 for the Union Wharf Bulkhead project in the amount of \$36,092. Mr. Murphy motioned to approve. Mr. Espindola seconded. Vote was unanimous. (3-0).

GOVERNMENT ACCESS COVERAGE

The Board reviewed the list of Boards and Committees who are currently recorded and telecast by the Government Access channel 18. The Board agreed that it would like to see the Capital Planning Committee meetings recorded and televised. Additionally, it would like to see some of the smaller advisory committees (Bell Committee, et. al.) have occasional meetings televised to generate interest and keep the public informed.

Mr. Haworth recommended sending a memo to the chairmen of the various boards and committees to see if televising would be feasible and/or desired. Mr. Murphy motioned to send a memo to that effect. Mr. Espindola seconded. Vote was unanimous. (3-0).

POLE HEARING

At 7:00 p.m., the Chairman opened a hearing for a pole location on Huttleston Ave north of Arsene Street. The public notice was read into record by the Chairman. See Attachment A. The meeting was opened to public comment. There was none.

Mr. Murphy motioned to approve the one pole at Huttleston Ave north of Arsene Street. Mr. Espindola seconded. Vote was unanimous. (3-0).

TAYLOR SEAFOOD

At 7:05 p.m., the Board met with Todd Stressinger of Washburn Oysters/West Island LLC, and Attorney Joseph Michaud for a hearing on the Taylor Seafood building.

Mr. Stressinger informed the Board that they had completed a rodent survey and found no issues. The building was removed and only a concrete slab remains.

Mr. Murphy thanked Mr. Stressinger for his part in the quick action to remove the building. He said that the need to enforce the bond as part of the MOU with Taylor Seafood would not be needed as a result of the building's removal. Mr. Espindola agreed.

Mr. Haworth opened the hearing to public comment. There was none.

The Board expressed satisfaction with the resolution on the building and Mr. Stressinger stated that they would begin permitting on their proposed hatchery "in earnest". Mr. Taylor's current aquaculture permit is valid until 2017. Mr. Murphy motioned to consider the conditions of the MOU met and the aquaculture license in good standing. Mr. Espindola seconded. Vote was unanimous. (3-0).

TOWN ADMINISTRATOR HIRING

At 7:14 p.m., the Board met with the Town Administrator Screening Committee members: Chairman Mark Sylvia and members Phil Washko, Robert Baldwin, Kathy Lopes, Kevin McLaughlin, and David Darmofal. Not present: Henry Pietrzyowski. The TASC was present to give their recommendations for the position of Town Administrator.

Mr. Sylvia briefly described the process they followed in interviewing the candidates and coming up with the three finalists. The three finalists are Gregory Enos (Assistant Town Manager in Whitman, MA), Michael McCue (current Town Administrator in Rochester, MA) and Mark Rees (former Town Manager for Portland, ME).

The Board thanked the members of the TASC for their work. The Board set a date of December 5, 2015 to interview Mr. Enos, Mr. McCue and Mr. Rees. The Saturday meeting will be public and televised.

NEEDIEST FAMILIES FUND

At 7:25 p.m., the Board met with Kristen Lancaster of the Standard-Times Neediest Families Fund to hear more about a fundraiser event at the Seaport Inn on December 6 to benefit the Fund. She requested the Board of Selectmen to be in attendance at the event – the Selectmen will make every effort to attend. The Board thanked Ms. Lancaster for her presentation and wished her luck with the event planning.

At 7:33 p.m., the Board took a five minute recess.

TAX CLASSIFICATION HEARING

At 7:38 p.m., the Board met with the Assessors Pam Davis, Ron Manzone (Ellis Withington was not present) for the annual Tax Classification hearing. Also present were Assistant Assessor Del Garcia and Finance Director Wendy Graves. Ms. Graves presented the recommendations of the Board of Assessors to the Board of Selectmen.

Recommended: 1.75 shift deferential; a residential factor of 0.871709; a split tax rate; and the recommendation against the adoption of a residential exemption for primary residences and a small commercial business exemption. The recommended residential tax rate for 2016 will be \$12.19 per \$1,000 and the recommended commercial tax rate for 2016 will be \$24.46 per \$1,000. The residential rate went up slightly and the commercial rate went down slightly.

Mr. Murphy motioned to not adopt the Residential Exemption, per recommendation of the Board of Assessors. Mr. Espindola seconded. Vote was unanimous. (3-0).

Mr. Murphy motioned to not adopt the Commercial Business Exemption, per the recommendation of the Board of Assessors. Mr. Espindola seconded. Vote was unanimous. (3-0).

Mr. Murphy motioned to set a split tax rate (residential: \$12.19/commercial: \$24.46) with a 1.75 differential and a residential factor of 0.871709. Mr. Espindola seconded. Vote was unanimous. (3-0).

SPRING STREET AUTO

At 8:01 p.m., the Chairman continued a hearing for Spring Street Auto. The hearing was continued from September 28.

Atty. Michaud was present on behalf of the Dussaults. Atty. Michaud stated that the site was cleaned of debris and was in full compliance with the terms of the license. Mr. Murphy said that he had visited the site and found it to be in compliance with the exception of some debris (tires) that had been dumped there by someone else.

Atty. Thomas Crotty was present and stated that a lot of the original issues related to clean-up had been resolved, except for some unregistered vehicles.

Atty. Michaud said that the vehicles on the premises were being worked on by his clients and that they would be placed for sale once fixed. Atty. Michaud and Atty. Crotty disagreed on the status of the cars, with Atty. Crotty asserting that the vehicles are unregistered and there for scrap parts, which is in violation of the Dussaults' license.

The Board addressed the second part of the hearing notice: the back taxes owed by the Dussaults on 99 Spring Street, which at the time of the meeting was \$64,477. Discussion continued on payment plans and term lengths. Atty. Michaud said that Mr. Dussault was comfortable with a monthly payment of about \$1,200. He said that the interest rate was 16% so his client was eager to pay off the owed taxes.

Mr. Haworth said that regardless of payment plans made with the Tax Collector that the Board of Selectmen should enter its own agreement with the Dussaults, and he cited the expenses that had been borne by the Town, including the use of Town Counsel. He said the process had taken too long and that he wanted to see a separate agreement made with the Selectmen to bring the taxes on 99 Spring to full compliance. Additionally, Mr. Haworth said that he wanted to see the language "tightened" on the Dussaults' license for the 2016 renewal season so that the Board does not have to hold another hearing for the Dussaults in the coming year as well.

Mr. Espindola agreed, but stated that he would like to have Town Counsel look at the general language for all auto repair and dealer licenses in Town.

Mr. Haworth informed Atty. Michaud that he did not want to see the Dussaults subletting to anyone again. He presented a lease, obtained from the Police Department, that proved the Dussaults had not been operating the dealership/repair shop at 99 Spring Street, as was stipulated in their license.

Al Benac was recognized. He said that the Dussaults have not done their part. He said he thought the Town should force him to sell the business and property to pay what was owed in back taxes.

Doug Brady was recognized. He said that he always pays his taxes and that it was not fair that someone could operate a business without paying their taxes. He said that he thought a new

agreement should have "teeth". A tax lien is already recorded on the property. Mr. Brady said that he thought the Dussaults should pay for the legal fees that have been incurred by the Town as well.

Mr. Murphy motioned to continue the hearing pending Atty. Crotty's recommendations for closing the hearing. Mr. Espindola seconded. Vote was unanimous. (3-0).

REMOTE PARTICIPATION

At 8:36 p.m., the Board met with Kathleen Sturtevant to discuss her request to enact Remote Participation. Ms. Sturtevant is an elected member of the Board of Public Works and would like to continue her term via remote participation while she is in Florida for the winter months (December to April). Ms. Sturtevant stays current on the meetings via telephone but cannot take a vote because remote participation has not been accepted by the Board of Selectmen for use. The only Board presently allowed to use remote participation is the Commission on Disability because it is partly a State agency.

Atty. Crotty explained remote participation, stating that the Chairman must always be physically present and that a quorum of voters must also be physically present. He said he did not, at the time of the meeting, know the restrictions that the Board of Selectmen may place on the use of remote participation.

Mr. Osuch said that he did not think that remote participation was a good idea. He said it could easily be abused by members not wanting to attend meetings for various reasons. Mr. Espindola agreed, saying that appointed and elected officials have a duty to be physically present at public meetings to represent their constituents.

BPW superintendent Vincent Furtado was recognized. Mr. Furtado said that he thought it was "admirable" that Ms. Sturtevant wants to continue her service to the Town.

Mike Sylvia was recognized. He asked if the Town could accept remote participation on a case by case basis. Mr. Haworth said that he contacted the Division of Open Government on that question and that if it is accepted for one person, it has to be accepted for all. Mr. Haworth said that he could not support the request presently.

Dan Freitas was recognized. He asked if remote participation can be revoked if abused. The answer was not immediately known at the time of the meeting but Atty. Crotty said that he would find the answer.

Mr. Murphy said that before he took a vote, he wanted to know the revocation clause for remote participation. Mr. Espindola said that the Board could consider a referendum vote from Town Meeting to see where the voters stand with the use of remote participation. No action was taken. The topic will be addressed again at a later meeting.

OXFORD SCHOOL PROPOSALS

The Board has received questions from various Town departments for the respondents to the Oxford School RFP to follow up on (Sherwood Construction and Stratford Group).

Nick Costa presented a petition to the Board that requested a favorable vote for the Stratford Group's senior housing proposal. See Attachment B.

ANIMAL CONTROL BUDGET

The Board reviewed a letter from the Animal Control Officer regarding the Animal Control budget. ACO Kelly Massey informed the Board that she is close to exhausting her gasoline budget, her veterinary budget, and that she received an unforeseen expense in the maintenance of the building when the boiler broke. Mr. Osuch said that with the remaining budget, she will not be able to operate until May.

The Board expressed satisfaction with Ms. Massey's performance as the ACO. She is more actively patrolling than previous ACOs, and she has a deal with the Mattapoisett Animal Hospital for lower medical fees for animals, which is the reason for increased gasoline usage. The veterinary line has been exhausted due to an increase in surrenders and adoptions. In upcoming years, the revenue from the increased adoptions should be commensurate with the expenditures, but in the meantime, Ms. Massey was seeking \$23,000 to carry the budget to the next fiscal year. Additionally, she seeks \$400 for gasoline and \$944 to cover the cost of the broken boiler.

Mr. Espindola said that Ms. Massey has inherited the budget and has been proactive about keeping track of what remains in her budget.

Mr. Osuch said that Ms. Massey is a far more proactive in her position than previous ACOs, and has taken more surrendered animals and adopted out more animals than ever done before. He said that it appears the revenue will be considerably higher in following years as a result.

Mr. Murphy motioned to recommend the transfers of \$23,000 to Animal Control: Veterinary; \$400 to Animal Control: Gasoline; and \$944 to Animal Control: Building Maintenance; and forward to the Finance Committee. Mr. Espindola seconded. Vote was unanimous. (3-0).

SOCIAL DAY HIRING

The Board reviewed a letter from Council on Aging director Anne Silvia requesting the appointment of Julio Morales to the Social Day program to meet the program's staff quota. Mr. Haworth said that he did not want to hire anyone without first meeting them. Mr. Murphy said that he understood the need to meet new employees but that he supported the appointment in this instance because the Social Day program is in serious need of staffing.

The Board agreed to meet with Ms. Silvia at their next meeting to discuss the appointment. Mr. Haworth requested Julio Morales be present at the meeting as well, if possible.

OTHER BUSINESS

In Other Business:

- Mr. Murphy said that he looked forward to the annual Turkey Trot and high school football game and wished everyone a Happy Thanksgiving
- Mr. Espindola said that the selected bid for the Good Energy purchase was .949 cents per kilowatt hour and that all Town consumers would be automatically included unless they specifically opt out
- Mr. Haworth said that the Oxford and Rogers School "tag sales" were a success

At 9:39 p.m. Mr. Murphy motioned to enter Executive Session pursuant to MGL Ch. 30A § 21 to discuss a Worker's Comp claim and a personnel disciplinary issue. Mr. Espindola seconded. Vote was unanimous. (3-0). Roll call vote: Mr. Murphy in favor. Mr. Haworth in favor. Mr. Espindola in favor.
