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A powerful 30-second TV public service announcement aimed at hunters has been distributed to commercial stations in the Portland, Bangor, and Presque Isle markets. The PSA, originally produced for North Carolina Operation Lifesaver, warns hunters to stay clear of railroad tracks as pathways into and out of the woods. 

Among the speakers were Amtrak Police Department's head of Northeast operations and the Association of American Railroad's director of security; what to say and not to say

during presentations; the latest in trespass prevention technology; and an update on nearby Canada's Operation Lifesaver activities.

know we're available to speak at their schools about railroad safety.

-More Maine law enforcement received training in grade crossing crash investigation through a course held over the line in Andover, Massachusetts and sponsored by the Federal Railroad Administration, Pan Am Railways, and Operation Lifesaver. Those attending included officers and deputies from Saco, N. Berwick, and the York County Sheriff's Office.
