



A 27-year-old friend had just died of a drug overdose.

Franklin Mayor Ken Merrifield was started in to get the phone call — he still mai a message from ner on his voice mai.

"If not hims else," said Merrifield, "I thought we could put the office of mayor to work to prevent the same circ instance, for omeone else," So he created the Franklin Mayor's Drug Task Force.

But what would be effective - and hour would the work be funded? The task force turned to the Capital Region Community Prevention Coalition for help.

New Hamp shire has 13 regional prevention networks, which the Foundation raspet to fund as part of a 10 year, \$12 million investment in substance abuse prevention in the state.

The coalition provided guidance, helped with community-wide strategic planning, identified key community risk factors and

took a lead row in uniting a proportion to at earned a \$625,000 to receive act.

Now Franklin has installed a permanent prescription only tare-back receptable for medications that could entirp be modabused, collecting more than 50% pennols so far. Young people have been engaged through the Franklin Yearth Institutive.

Community members have testified before the New Hamp like Legislature. The police chief has been an local radio, raising awareness during promiand graduation servers.

On April 25th, 2013, Assistant Deputy Medical Examiner Virginia Chapman responded to a scene at a residence in Franklin. The decedent was on the 4th floor of the apartment building. He was morbidly obese and had been dead for a week.

Members of the Franklin Fire Department and Franklin Police Department went above and beyond that night to assist ADME Chapman and the funeral director with the removal of the body.

The fire department responded initially when the body was found. They agreed to return to help with the removal and were called back prematurely. They added their input as to what resources they could offer. They returned a second time for the actual removal, offering the use of their powered stretcher and another piece of equipment. Each time they returned, they responded with not only the duty crew, but also with others who had volunteered to help. They had no responsibility to assist but were gracious in their willingness to help with a very difficult situation.

ADME Chapman was impressed with the level of professionalism and the dignity that your members were able to afford the decedent and she has asked that the department be recognized for the assistance they provided.

On behalf of The New Hampshire Office of Chief Medical Examiner, I would like to offer my sincere thanks and appreciation to you and your department for assisting with this very difficult removal.
