Dear Municipal Officials:

Greetings. Please accept these documents as the preliminary draft warrant for the Special Town Meeting to be held on October 22, 2015. I am presenting this initial draft at the opening of the warrant, and I will present a complete version of the warrant at the closure date of August 26. The Select Board will make decisions as to which articles will remain, and which will not. My purpose in providing you with an early draft is to provide an outline of the essential business that needs to occur to finish the FY 2016 budget as well as several projects that are important to the Town of Hadley.

The articles presented below help advance the Town's ability to provide public services. Each of the articles presented below should be reviewed to ensure that the Town's core mission is supported.

The Proposed Articles

Article 1 (FY 2016 Budget Adjustment):

The first article makes the final adjustments to the FY 2016 budget.

The majority of the changes will relate to changes to pay rates that are being negotiated with union personnel and to pay rates to non-union personnel.

The Select Board seeks an increase of \$4,000 to install and operate web-based meeting management software as the next step in placing more of their meetings on-line and conducting their business more efficiently and transparently. Currently, the Select Board is examining the vendor BoardDocs, and their product BoardDocs LT. More information about the company and their products can be found here: https://www.boarddocs.com/

The increase covers a \$1,000 set up and training fee and an annual subscription of \$3,000 for BoardDocs LT.

The Finance Committee recommended restoration of funding for OPEB contribution, and I have included \$245,000 as a planning number to keep the Town on track with its OPEB contribution strategy, contingent on the availability of funds. Partial funding of the FY 2016 OPEB contribution was achieved at the Annual Town Meeting by the approval of the enterprise administrative charges amounting to \$31,649.

Better figures will be developed over the next few weeks.

Language ratifying the union contracts is also included. This language will be withdrawn, if the collective bargaining agreements are not ready.

Article 2 (Capital Stabilization):

The second article would place the FY 2015 meals tax revenue, amounting to \$300,000, into the Capital Stabilization Fund for later appropriation at the Annual Town Meeting to be held on May 5, 2016.

The Town's policy is to use the meals tax funds for the capital program. The Town's practice is to place the prior year's meals tax funds in a special capital stabilization fund in the fall town meeting, and then to allocate those funds for capital projects and purchases at the following annual town meeting. This practice ensures that budget decision makers are assured of the amounts available for capital projects where direct expenditures are needed.

The Select Board has begun discussing a change in policy to the effect that a certain percentage of the annual levy would be dedicated to the capital budget. At the time of this writing, this option is still being considered.

Article 3 (Capital Expenses)

This article is reserved for the Capital Planning Committee recommended capital projects. The revised capital expenses are due August 3, and the Committee will develop recommendations in August and September.

Article 4 (Route 9 Water Lines)

Several years ago, the Massachusetts Department of Transportation planned to widen Route 9 from Goffe Street to East Street, and the Town borrowed money to replace and upgrade the water lines in the project area. The Department subsequently decided to postpone the project, and the Town canceled the borrowing.

MassDOT held a public hearing on June 9, 2014, during which they described the project in detail and outlined an implementation schedule. Construction is expected to begin in summer 2016. The Town will need to borrow from water revenues to take advantage of the Route 9 project. Replacing water lines in conjunction with the road surface project will save costs in mobilization, construction, and engineering.

Massachusetts Department of Transportation has developed its 75% complete plans. The estimated cost for the water lines within the MassDOT project area is expected to be \$425,000 based on engineer's estimates.

In addition to replacing the water lines within the MassDOT project area, the Town is considering replacing the water lines to the east of the project area: from the vicinity of the Farm Museum to the East Street intersection. This is expected to cost an additional \$825,000.

The total combined costs for the expanded project are expected to be \$1,250,000.

The Town has requested that this project be listed in the FY 2015 Environmental Bond Bill, and as of the time of this writing, several attempts were made to ask Governor Patrick to release the bond money. I recommend that the Town contact Governor Baker and renew our request.

The impact on the Water Enterprise Fund needs to be thoroughly reviewed and understood. Currently, debt service within the water enterprise fund is about 15% of net operating revenues. There is room for growth of water debt service, but only consistent with adopted policy and taking into account overall capital needs within the water enterprise fund.
