Wednesday, September 21, 2016

Chairman James Sullivan called the meeting to order at 6:00 p.m.

II. ROLL CALL #1

I. CALL TO ORDER

In attendance: Councilors Donald Winterton, John Giotas, Timothy Tsantoulis, Adam Jennings (arrived at 6:28 p.m.), Robert Duhaime (arrived at 6:02 p.m.), Marc Miville, David Ross and Chairman James Sullivan. Absent: Councilor James Levesque.

Public Works – Recycle & Transfer Tab 8

DPW Director, Diane Boyce, came forward to respond to questions previously posed during the Council's last budget meeting. Director Boyce said that the expense under Professional Services reflects costs for specialized services. She said she is using the Town Attorney for land use questions. Councilor Winterton indicated that if the town moves forward with TIF, the town may need to conduct a public outreach program so he advised putting aside a small amount into the Planning Department budget account.

Councilor Ross said he asked in February, and still hasn't gotten an answer, what the per ton cost is to get rid of trash. He feels the town is going in the wrong direction relative to its collection/recycling program. Director Boyce said she hasn't been able to get a firm price but knows that traditional trash collection requires additional people. When asked by the Chairman if filling a position was more expensive than more gas costs, Director Boyce said it is certainly safer. Councilor Ross said that "a lot of people have dangerous jobs" but the Council is charged with being good stewards of taxpayers' money. He feels there are people that would do the job and as the trucks get older, the expense of maintenance will go up.

program. Further, he said people have a right to know the expense of the program since it was sold to them as a savings. Chairman Sullivan indicated that the information has been provided. Dr. Shankle agreed and said the matter goes back to the level of service provided. He continued, saying that "we could save a million dollars and everyone would have to bring their own trash to the landfill". Dr. Shankle said he wasn't sure money would be saved by privatizing the program. Councilor Ross stressed that it was "not the way it was presented to taxpayers". Councilor Tsantoulis said he doesn't want to go backward and that trash pick-up is a dangerous industry. He said many people wish they had the level of service that Hooksett has.

Councilor Ross asked about the engineering wages and benefits line. Chairman Sullivan said if the engineering wage line is not covered by engineering fees, the budget would fund the position at \$92,000. Councilor Winterton noted the intrinsic benefits of having our own town engineer. Forty-five presentations were made to the Planning Board; last year the number of presentations made was in the 20s. Revenue from building permits and an increased taxable base are some of the benefits directly related to having an engineer on staff. Councilor Miville said he agrees with Councilor Winterton. The Town Engineer is in and out of the office 50 times a day and every day is knocking on doors.

Councilor Winterton moved, second by Councilor Ross, to approve the FY17-18 Public Works Department budget of \$4,882,743. Motion passed unanimously, 8-0.

Regarding the Recreation Director position, Director Boyce said she thought the Council had decided to let voters decide whether the position was necessary. Sullivan stated that the recreation program is not self funded. Councilors discussed what a full-time recreation program might look like. Director Boyce said that would be Councilor Ross asked how the Recreation the job of the Recreation Director. Department's efforts would align with what HYAA does. Director Boyce said the programs will become self-funded but the director position would be funded by tax dollars. Councilor Miville feels the proposed salary of the Recreation Director is too high and only \$20,000 less than the engineer's salary. He said the Hooksettites want a pavilion. They never said they wanted a Recreation Director. Councilor Winterton said he was thinking the same thing but there is a new federal law impacting salaried managers and employers that could make the cost of overtime higher if a salary is below the law's threshold. Councilor Winterton suggested getting salary ranges of comparable positions before he will support the position. Dr. Shankle said the position will be salaried. He is not thinking of somebody new to the work. He wants somebody with experience.

Director Boyce said the sandpro was running now but "we're talking about a year from now". Councilor Ross asked if it had wheels, why wouldn't it be considered a vehicle and taken from vehicle funds. Director Boyce said it's a specialty piece and she really wanted to keep vehicle money for plowing. Public Works has an aging fleet that "we'll need to start replacing". Councilor Winterton supported Councilor Ross' suggestion.

Councilor Winterton moved, second by Councilor Ross, to remove from Warrant Articles and take funds from the Capital Reserve Fund – Public Works Vehicles. Motion passed unanimously, 8-0.

Director Boyce provided a couple of examples of pavilions. Chairman Sullivan remembered that Councilor Miville had previously mentioned the school pavilion where school children built a pavilion funded through donations. The Council discussed possible locations. Dr. Shankle suggested the matter be forwarded to the Parks and Recreation Committee for their review and recommendation to the Council. Councilor Jennings liked the idea.

Councilor Miville moved, second by Councilor Duhaime, to charge the Parks and Recreation Committee to investigate the matter and come to the Council with a recommendation. Motion passed unanimously, 8-0. Chairman Sullivan suggested that the Parks and Recreation Committee should coordinate efforts with the Hooksettites and the Conservation Commission.

Director Boyce said she wasn't adding anything new. Councilors discussed adding \$200,000 to the Public Works Vehicles Capital Reserve Fund. In the past, the voters approved the Warrant Article by 60 percent and 65 percent respectively. Councilor Miville said new members on the Budget Committee were not happy with groupings. Director Boyce said they always try to keep collection vehicles separate. Director Soucie reminded the Councilors that two funds cannot be combined.

Councilor Winterton moved, second by Councilor Ross, to move \$30,000 from the Automated Collection Equipment Fund and increase the total DPW Vehicles request to \$230,000 and reduce CR funding from \$170,000 to \$140,000 and direct that all further monies go to Public Works Vehicles. Roll Call #2: Councilor Duhaime-no, Councilor Miville-no, Councilor Ross-yes, Councilor Jennings-no, Councilor Giotas-no, Councilor Winterton-yes, Councilor Tsantoulis-no, and Chairman Sullivan-no. Motion failed 7-2 [Councilors Ross and Winterton opposed].

Fire Rescue --- Tab 7/Administrative Reorganization

Fire Chief Burkush and Captain Steve came forward to further the discussion about the fire department's reorganization structure. The reorganization eliminates an administrative position and adds an additional fire fighter. This will allow the department to utilize the floating fire fighter position from the contract and move the position around to cover long term leave to achieve overtime savings, and provide better service to the public. Job descriptions and a new organizational chart were provided. Councilor Winterton asked if the hope was to increase the call numbers. Chief Burkush said two call fire fighters will be brought along. In response to Councilor Tsantoulis, Chief Burkush said they are paid hourly and get no benefits. Councilors discussed options for funding overtime without increasing the budget. Chief Burkush said the salary savings from the deputy position totals \$62,000 and a fire fighter/paramedic salary at \$40,000 provides a difference of \$22,000 that can be applied to the overtime line. Councilor Winterton said the town brought in a new chief and he deserves the Council's support.

Chairman Sullivan asked if a paramedic can provide services that an EMT cannot. Captain Steve said only the paramedic can administer medication. The Chief said most shifts do have a paramedic on duty. Councilor Winterton thought there was a difference on what could be invoiced. The Captain said it depends on the skills; the town can't bill

just because they are a paramedic. Councilor Tsantoulis pointed out that quickly the ambulance is heading to a medical facility.

Councilor Winterton moved, second by Councilor Miville, to accept the Fire Department reorganization plan and authorize the transfer of \$22,000 to the department's overtime line. The motion passed unanimously, 8-0. Chief Burkush said he will implement the plan as soon as possible.

Discussion ensued about vehicle maintenance costs. Councilor Ross suggested that given the level of maintenance required, it may be worthwhile to get someone in house for the repairs. Chief Burkush said the Captain is certified to do that work. It requires testing and certification. Manchester had a hard time filling those same requirements and has done a lot of work on the vehicles. Chief Burkush said he's talked with Dr. Shankle and he'll work to try to resolve the vehicle maintenance problem. Dr. Shankle said they are now gathering data for each vehicle which has been very helpful and has raised awareness on how much is spent on vehicle maintenance.

Councilor Winterton moved, second by Councilor Ross, to include \$4,764 x 2 (50% fire/50% police). Motion passed unanimously, 8-0.

Councilor Duhaime again asked about the cost of telephones. Finance Director, Christine Soucie said the cost is greater for phones with voice mail. The Fire Department's emergency management phones are on a completely separate system. Councilor Winterton said he looks forward to being able to rebid the system. Director Soucie said rebidding can take place in 2017. Councilor Ross asked about the difference between the department request and Town Administrator's request for professional services. Director Soucie said they moved \$76,850 for dispatch cost to the Ambulance Fund. Chief Burkush said he will have a discussion with the Police Department.

Councilor Jennings moved, second by Councilor Giotas, to approve the Fire Department FY17-18 budget of \$3,758,092. Motion passed unanimously, 8-0.

Outstanding Budget Issues

Chairman Sullivan moved, second by Councilor Miville, to approve the Budget Committee's operating budget of \$8,423. Motion passed unanimously, 8-0.

Warrant Articles Tab 19

Councilor Ross moved, second by Councilor Winterton, to approve \$158,414 being placed on the ballot for the Fire and Police Union contract. Motion passed unanimously, 8-0.

Councilor Jennings moved, second by Councilor Duhaime, to approve \$120,000 being place on the ballot to include funding for fire apparatus, \$50,000, Air Packs & Bottles, \$20,000, and Emergency Radio Communications, \$50,000. Motion passed unanimously, 8-0.

196 Chairman Sullivan moved, second by Councilor Winterton, to approve \$50,000 being placed on the ballot for the replacement of Car #4. Motion passed unanimously, 8-0.

Councilor Winterton moved, second by Councilor Jennings, to approve \$50,000 being placed on the ballot for refurbishing Fire Engine 5. Motion passed unanimously, 8-0.

Councilor Jennings moved, second by Councilor Winterton to include on the ballot Warrant Article for CR Fund – Public Works Vehicles in the amount of \$200,000. Motion passed unanimously, 8-0.

Councilor Jennings moved, second by Councilor Miville, to include on the ballot Warrant Article for CR Funding in the amount of \$170,000. Motion passed 7-1 [Councilor Ross opposed].

Councilor Ross moved, second by Councilor Duhaime, to amend the previous motion to include on the ballot Warrant Article for CR Funding in the amount of \$140,000. Motion passed unanimously, 8-0.

Councilor Jennings moved, second by Councilor Winterton, to include on the ballot Warrant Article for Automated Collection Equipment in the amount of \$30,000. Motion passed unanimously, 8-0.

Chairman Sullivan moved, second by Councilor Winterton, to include on the ballot Warrant Article for CR Fund – Revaluation in the amount of \$30,000. Motion passed unanimously, 8-0.

Councilor Jennings moved, second by Councilor Winterton, to include on the ballot Warrant Article for CR Fund – Master Plan in the amount of \$10,000. Motion passed unanimously, 8-0.

Councilor Jennings moved, second by Councilor Duhaime, to include on the ballot Warrant Article for CR Fund – Improvements of Conservation Land in the amount of \$10,000. Motion passed unanimously, 8-0.

Councilor Winterton moved, second by Councilor Jennings, to close the Feasibility Study CR Fund and transfer the \$63,000 balance to the General Fund. Motion passed unanimously, 8-0.

Director Soucie asked if the Fire Union Warrant Article should be moved to the ballot and was told "yes".

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Revenues Tab 17

Director Soucie provided a Revenue Worksheet for information only; no action required at this time. She said Motor Vehicle Permit Fees continue to increase, primarily due to registering more expensive cars. Director Soucie highlighted a number of changes: the Highway Block Grant line, budget transportation that was approved in the family services budget, and the sewer fund was increased to match sewer requests. The Meals & Rooms Tax is collected by the state and distributed to each community based

on population. Councilor Ross asked why the plowing revenue went from \$21,000 to \$4,000. Director Soucie explained that a development agreement required the town plow even though these roads are not town roads. The agreement was changed disallowing this practice. Councilor Ross also commented on the ups and downs of the Construction Monitoring line. Christine Soucie mentioned that once the engineer was hired, the highway department no longer had to conduct the monitoring. It is now done by the Town Engineer. Councilor Miville noted the cable franchise fee of \$165,000 not targeted for General Funds.

Default Tab 18

Finance Director Soucie provided a Default Budget Calculation that continues to change. She said it was 1.33 percent higher than the Town Administrator's budget request.

Increases to the default budget include:

NHRS employer rates \$140,783 Manchester Water Works Hydrant Rentals \$10,856 Liability Insurance \$19,491 Road Improvements \$300,000

Decreases to the default budget include:

Reduce lease payment by \$20,583 Reduce elections by \$13,034 Removed immunization \$9,000 Reduced welfare \$25,000

Councilor Miville indicated that the Budget Committee would still have time to consider. Director Soucie said the Budget Committee has no function with the default budget but it will be included in committee members' packets. Dr. Shankle mentioned that the only outstanding items are the library and sewer presentations.

V. OTHER

Councilor Miville will be attending the NH Municipal Association's (NHMA) Legislative Policy Conference on September 23rd to provide input on a number of proposals. Councilors deliberated each item and voted as follows.

Item 1 -- To see if NHMA will support legislation to allow municipal library budgets to appear as a separate warrant article on the Town Meeting, SB2, ballot.

Councilor Ross moved, second by Councilor Duhaime, to vote in opposition to the proposal. Motion passed unanimously, 8-0.

Item 2 – To see if NHMA will support legislation to allow municipalities to borrow funds from either their Special Revenue Funds and/or Capital Reserve Funds for the purpose

of financing municipal building construction approved via warrant articles approved by the voters.

Councilor Winterton moved, second by Councilor Jennings, to vote in favor of the proposal. Motion passed 7-1 [Councilor Ross opposed].

Item 3 — To see if NHMA will support legislation that amends RSA 674 regarding Accessory Dwelling Units (ADUs) to prohibit either the principal dwelling unit or the ADU from being used for short term rentals which are defined as the rental of either the principal dwelling unit or the ADU for a period of less than thirty days.

Councilor Ross moved, second by Councilor Tsantoulis, to vote in opposition to the proposal. Motion passed 6-2 [Councilors Jennings and Winterton opposed].

Item 4 – To see if NHMA will support legislation that allows municipalities to adopt an additional surcharge under the meals and rooms tax on hotel occupancy within its municipality whereby the deposited funds would be collected by the Department of Revenue Administration and paid to the municipality into a capital reserve fund, revolving fund, or other special revenue fund to help defer additional costs municipalities face due to tourism.

Councilor Winterton moved, second by Councilor Giotas, to vote in support of the proposal. Motion passed 6-2 [Councilors Tsantoulis and Jennings opposed].

Item 5 – To see if NHMA will support legislation that defines short term rentals as a home business and permits municipalities to regulate and inspect these businesses for life safety issues.

Councilor Winterton moved, second by Councilor Jennings, to vote in opposition to the proposal. Motion passed unanimously, 8-0.

324 Item 6 – To see if NHMA will support a policy that requires the NH Department of
 325 Transportation to adopt, develop and implement a type II program for noise abatement
 326 on existing highways.

Chairman Sullivan moved, second by Councilor Winterton, to vote in opposition to the proposal. Motion passed unanimously, 8-0.

Item 7 – To see if the NHMA will support legislation to reduce local property taxes.

Chairman Sullivan moved, second by Councilor Ross, to vote in opposition to the proposal. Motion passed unanimously, 8-0.

Dr. Shankle introduced new project coordinator, Nick Germain. Mr. Germain said he was born in Leominster, MA but has lived in NH since he was a baby. He attended Keene State College. Mr. Germain said he understands he has tough shoes to fill and will do his best to do so. Chairman Sullivan, who also attended Keene State, welcomed Mr. Germain.

Chairman Sullivan reminded everyone of the RiverwalkTrail opening/ribbon cutting ceremony being held on September 28th. The Conservation Commission would like someone from the Council to attend. Councilor Ross volunteered to attend. VI. DELIBERATION VII. ADJOURNMENT Chairman Sullivan moved, second by Councilor Tsantoulis, to adjourn the meeting at 9:20 p.m. Motion passed unanimously, 8-0. Councilor Winterton moved, second by Councilor Jennings, to accept the consent agenda as presented. Motion passed, 8-0.

9. TOWN ADMINISTRATOR'S REPORT

In Town Administrator, Dr. Dean Shankle's absence, Donna Fitzpatrick said she learned this afternoon from Town Attorney, Matt Serge, that the mortgager of the junkyard property located at 18 Benton Road that the town cleaned up and placed a lien on for \$8,500, intends to sell the property through a short sale and has negotiated with the Town Attorney to provide the town with a \$6,000 purchase price. Attorney Serge doesn't believe the price will go higher and the Council must act immediately, or by October 7th, or the offer will be retracted. If the offer is rejected, Nation Star, the mortgager, may foreclose on the property.

 Councilor Ross said that was hard to accept and "we have a claim against the property". He said the town has expended town funds to make the property compliant, short sale or no short sale, the town is first in line on a lien or foreclosure. He said he is aware of people who are interested in the property, and he feels the town should not forfeit taxpayer money on this.

Councilor Tsantoulis agreed with Councilor Ross, and understood the town would be first in line upon the sale of the property. He does not think it is a good idea to negotiate costs and feels the town should get everything it is owed.

 Councilor Jennings asked how they can close on the property if there is a lien on it. Councilor Winterton concurred with the opinions expressed, and Councilor Miville asked if it was common to negotiate a lien. He said he never heard of a negotiation for a lien. He agrees with others. Chairman Sullivan asked if National Star forecloses, does the town lose the guaranteed \$6,000. Councilor Miville thought that in foreclosure, the lien stayed active and they owe the town \$8,500.

Councilor Winterton moved, second by Councilor Jennings, to authorize the Town Attorney to accept \$6,000 to satisfy the lien on the property located at 18 Benton Road and to sign all related documents on behalf of the Council. Motion failed, 0-8.

Diane Boyce, Director of the Public Works Department joined Donna Fitzpatrick to go over the water ban imposed by the Hooksett Village Water Precinct (HVWP) effective September 27, 2016. The water use restriction includes any outdoor uses of hoses and sprinklers, including 1) irrigation of lawns, gardens, flowers, and plants (hand watering permitted); 2) washing of vehicles with a hose; 3) filling of pools; and 4) washing of exterior building surfaces, parking lots, driveways, and sidewalks. Director Boyce said fields, flowers, and trees are being hand watered. Councilor Ross said it was "about time" and the ban should be publicized. Administration will let the HYAA and the Garden Club know that the town will comply with the ban.

Councilor Winterton moved, second by Councilor Levesque, to direct Dr. Shankle to adhere to the water ban issued by the Hooksett Village Water Precinct and comply with suggestions issued. It is expected that all HVWP users of Hooksett conserve water in this time of drought and at other times. Motion passed unanimously, 8-0

101 Councilor Ross said that Manchester is asking for voluntary restrictions and it would be 102 inequitable to not issue similar restrictions on the Central Hooksett Water Precinct (CHWP) 103 customers as well. Chairman Sullivan thought that was a good point but noted that the 104 Council has no authority over the CHWP. He suggested the Council send a letter 105 encouraging CHWP users follow the lead of the HVWP.

Councilor Ross moved, second by Councilor Jennings, to authorize Dr. Shankle to recommend to CHWP that they follow the lead of the HVWP regarding the water ban. Motion passed, 6-2 [Councilors Winterton and Tsantoulis opposed].

Chairman Sullivan suggested that staff, too, be urged to conserve water. Donna Fitzpatrick stated that the CHWP on a yearly basis restricts water use on Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays from July 1 to September 15.

Chairman Sullivan moved, second by Councilor Winterton, to direct Dr. Shankle to encourage staff to comply with the mandatory water use restriction as is recommended by the HVWP. Motion passed unanimously, 8-0.

Councilor Miville said he attended the NH Municipal Association's Legislative Policy Conference on September 23rd. In addition to the seven policies discussed with the Council prior to the conference, an additional 21 policies were discussed. Councilor Miville provided a breakdown of the policies and results of the discussion. If no notes were included, the policy was approved by consent.

14.a Budget Reviews

Library – Tab 15

Library Trustees, Mary Farwell and Mac Broderick, and Librarian, Heather Rainier, came forward to review their FY 2017-18 budget. They indicated that the increase in the wage request is due to the new FLSA regulation regarding exempt and non-exempt employees. The salary of one current full time exempt employee is very close to the threshold. In order to retain her as an exempt employee, her salary will need to be increased. The second area of growth in the wage request is to increase the salary of an employee that was not part of the pay equity study completed in 2014. The position was not included in the pay equity study because it was finalized after the pay equity study was submitted and based on the budget from the prior year. The third area of increase is needed to increase the coverage in the children's room by 10 hours per week for a part time employee.

Councilor Winterton pointed out that this was the second meeting where they are faced with an item beyond "our control" as mandated by the federal government. Mary Farwell said the employee qualifies in every other way to be exempt, and one other employee will be affected and the trustees will have to manage that. Councilor Miville asked if another employee won't get exempt status. Mary Farwell said the children's librarian will no longer be salaried; she will be paid hourly.

Mac Broderick stated that additional coverage in the children's room by 10 hours per week for a part time employee is necessary. He said attendance at library events this year increased 45% with more than 9,000 children and family member visits and attendance at early literacy and STEAM activities, Storytimes, and educational events. There is a lacking presence in the Youth Services Department covering all the hours the library is open. Mr. Broderick also indicated that the next big challenge is FTEs. The library continues to be one of the libraries in the state that has the lowest FTE count given the size of the town and all the library has to offer and it is a year to start addressing that.

Councilor Ross noted that the budget reflected only a five percent increase over last year's budget which seems reasonable. Councilor Jennings asked about the Books and Materials line going up by \$8,000 and was informed that circulation has doubled and to update their collection, they need to replace many older, worn-out books.

Councilor Ross moved, second by Councilor Winterton, to accept the FY 2017-2018 Library Budget of \$747,026. Motion passed unanimously, 8-0.

Councilor Miville asked about the need for a part-time, ten-hour-a-week employee and was told they could use someone for more hours; this person will just be putting out fires. Chairman Sullivan said he was enthralled with the library programs and services and finds the increase since four or five years ago has doubled and is incredible. He complimented the library trustees and staff. Councilor Miville said the library is a huge treasure but some people are saying it may be too much. Heather Rainier said there is data indicating the per dollar investment turning into a 50 to 100 percent return on investment. Councilor Miville asked if two computer purchases was a need or a want. Heather Rainier said these have been postponed for a while and the current computers are a lot older than first thought.

Chairman Sullivan said the library budget presented is well thought out and pragmatic and a testament to everyone associated with the library.

Wastewater Tab16

Bruce Kudrick, Superintendent of the Sewer Commission, came forward and went over details of the FY2017-2018 Sewer Commission Budget. He said the budget is fully funded by User Fees. One employee is going for a higher grade and if it passes, the funds are included in the budget. They have no control over the health insurance increase. Electricity costs increased because of increased usage and stronger flow. There is a slight increase in fuel costs

Councilor Winterton moved, second by Councilor Tsantoulis, to approve the 2017-2018 Sewer Commission budget of \$2,075,593 as presented. Motion passed unanimously, 8-0.

Councilor Winterton congratulated the commission and the superintendent for keeping the ratepayers in mind. Councilor Tsantoulis asked who provided the electricity. Mr. Kudrick said "Eversource" and they were approached by another supplier who wanted the commission to run generators more often so it wasn't saving money. Councilor Tsantoulis said they may want to take a look at that again. In response to Councilor Miville, Mr. Kudrick said they are working with their accountant and they are trying to keep the rate in line "so that what we're making is what we spend". Councilor Ross brought up the heating expense and asked why there was such an increase. Other particulars of the budget were discussed to include, water, pump stations, sand, and gravel, to name a few.

Chairman Sullivan moved, second by Councilor Tsantoulis, to recommend \$15,184,556 together with those budgets approved tonight, for a total of \$18,007,175 as the 2017-18 operating budget to be presented to the Budget Committee. Motion passed unanimously, 8-0.

15.a Purchase of 100' steel walking floor trailer for Recycling and Transfer Division.

At the May 10th Town Meeting, residents voted to approve the purchase of a 100 yard steel walking floor trailer for the Recycling and Transfer Division. The old trailer was used as a trade-in to reduce the price. \$60,000 approved by the town for the new trailer is to come from the Solid Waste Disposal account. Any additional funds necessary will come from the 2016-17 budget.

Councilor Jennings moved, second by Councilor Levesque, to accept the bid from M&T Solutions for the purchase of a 100 yard steel walking trailer in the amount of \$60,685.75 (to include trade-in). Motion passed unanimously, 8-0.

Councilor Ross moved, second by Councilor Winterton, to hold the Halloween trick-or-treat date and time to Sunday, October 30th from 6:00 to 8:00 p.m. and direct the Police Chief to provide coverage as necessary. Motion passed unanimously, 8-0.

15.c Employee Appreciation Letter 2016 Letter - Employee Appreciation.pdf

Donna Fitzpatrick indicated that annually the Council hosts an employee appreciation picnic which has been approved to take place on Friday, October 7th. Ms. Fitzpatrick said that local businesses donate food items for lunch and gift cards to be distributed to employees at the event via a raffle. Only one donation has been received so far. Council members were asked to reach out to business owners that they may know to get donations and to attend the luncheon if they are able.

Councilor Jennings moved, second by Councilor Tsantoulis, to approve the 2016 Employee Appreciation Letter, as presented. Motion passed unanimously, 8-0.

16. SUB-COMMITTEE REPORTS

Councilor Winterton said the TIF Committee met and was attended by Councilor Miville, representatives from the Central Village Water Precinct, the Sewer Commission, the town planner and engineer, the Chairman of the Planning Board. It was nice having all those people in the same room. Councilor Winterton said things are coming together and it is expected that the committee will make a presentation to the Council on October 26th. A warrant article will likely be necessary. He said he couldn't be happier with what the committee has done so far. He said they are considering bringing on a PR firm to help with the discussion going forward. Councilor Winterton recommended reading an article in the Town and City publication on how Tax Increment Financing (TIF) can help development.

Councilor Levesque said the Transfer Committee met last night. The cost of recycling went down \$2, from \$26 to \$24.

Councilor Ross said it was a big day for the Conservation Commission with the grand opening of the trail which was well attended. People were very interested and excited. Councilor Ross said they had a board depicting how each trail was constructed. He will provide an electronic copy which gives people a better understanding of what it takes to build a trail. Kathie Northrup was there. Rowing Club members came over to ask questions. A warrant article will be brought forward by the Commission.

Councilor Miville attended an Economic Development Committee meeting on September 20th. The UNH Extension survey group will be coming to the Council at some point to go over their findings and strategies on how to proceed. There were three people at the presentation. He suggested Joan Duffy and Dr. Shankle determine who is on the committee and who is not.

Councilor Giotas attended his first Heritage Commission meeting. He said it went well. They voted on t-shirts. Chairman Sullivan was unable to attend but said that a full set of activities kicking off History Month will get posted to the website.

Chairman Sullivan mentioned that he had spoken to the Hooksettites about the pavilion and they are happy to be involved when ready to make a presentation.

Councilor Tsantoulis commented that there have been no nominations for Youth Achievement Award lately.

The owners of the Boston Winery have agreed to participate in helping create a new winery at the Hooksett project, styled similarly to the one in Boston. Rather than on the waterfront however, this winery will have an old-world agricultural motif situated next to the antique barn (along with an authentic Concord Coach), within a botanical garden that will include a major collection of rare lilacs.

Uniquely, customers at the Boston Winery can actually participate in the wine-making process by pre-buying a barrel or half-barrel of wine. When the grapes arrive in the fall, a feast and intimate concert is typically held to celebrate the grape harvest. From that point the customers are contacted when certain segments of the wine production take place. 






The Syringa Plus Nursery is a company that propagates the lilacs for such places as the Arnold Arboretum in Boston, and the National Arboretum in Washington, D.C. Syringa Plus has now moved their nursery to the development, as well as over 300 different lilac cultivars, and is committed to being the propagator for this monumental botanical project. The first planting is scheduled to occur in the fall of 2014. The Beijing Botanical Gardens have sent executives to the Hooksett site, and have offered to send some of their unique lilac and crab-apple cultivars for inclusion within the Gardens, some of which will be the first of its kind to be introduced in the United States. The lilacs and botanical gardens, as well as a 10 acre scenic pond, will completely surround and be connected by trails within the complex, and will not only serve as a beautiful and scenic landscape for the hotel and conference center, but will become its own attraction.

One of the main collections of lilacs will be located in and around the antique barn on the property, affectionately known in the region as "The Postcard Barn'. The barn was built in the 1860's and will also feature a Concord Coach manufactured around the same period. This particular garden will be named the Katie Bentley Garden, and maintained by a 501c3 charity called the Katie Bentley Memorial Charity. This will be partially financed with donations received through an annual lilac festival to be held on the grounds of Granite Woods. Proceeds will be raised for the chartered purpose of this children's charity, as well as for homeless and abused kids in Merrimack County.

Another collection of lilacs and other botanicals will be in and around a wetland area in the middle of the project, and will be highly visible from the interstate. A large grouping of lilacs and crabapples will likewise surround the 10 acre pristine pond, along with a covered bridge.

Representatives of the International Lilac society (ILS) from both China and Russia have committed themselves to this Project, and plan to have on display in the gardens both rare and popular lilacs from their regions of the world. The International Registrar for crab-apples has likewise expressed an intention to introduce some new varieties for display within the gardens.

The concert venue will be designed to hold weekend summer events of around 3000 attendees, with perhaps 3 festivals that would likely accommodate up to 10,000 people (with the help of additional parking from the Ritchie Brothers facility). The developer has enlisted the help of two notable and accomplished people in the music industry. One was formerly involved in the production and management of a very popular New England music festival, while the other has managed a couple internationally famous music bands.
