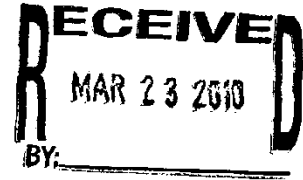

It is with regret that I must tender my resignation from the Hooksett Town Council. My first apology is to my constituents in District 4 who elected me for a second three-year term, of which remains 2 years.
