## 4.0 Student Representative

Mr. Richard Barone, senior, informed the Committee of the happenings at the high school, which included the following:

## 6.1 MSBA Site Visit

Mr. Hipp asked the Superintendent to update the Committee on the MSBA site visit. Dr. Tyrell state that we are continuing the MSBA process and the next step is the site visit. A meeting was held today with the Superintendent, Phil Lemnios, Town Manager, Bart Kelly, and Assistant Building Commissioner and staff members to discuss what will happen at the MSBA site visit. She said that in the spring we should hear whether we will move forward to the next step. She also said that we don't have the percentage of reimbursement right now but think it will be 50% for the middle school project, which is \$900,000.

Dr. Tyrell stated that some of the students receiving awards are playing in the soccer game now so she would like some items taken out of order to accommodate the students and their parents.

### 7.6 Testing Presentations

Dr. Tyrell stated that in her 10 years in Hull these scores are the strongest scores we have had. She said that MCAS was taken in grade 5 and 8 science and technology, grade 9 introductory physics and grade 10 ELA and Math. The PARCC assessment was taken in grads 3 reading and grades 3, 4, 5, 6, 7 and 8 ELA and math. Dr. Tyrell presented the following achievement levels:

Ms. Kuehn stated that the PARCC and MCAS scores across most levels did improve.

Ms. Kuehn compared Hull with our District Analysis Review Tools (Dart) districts, which are the schools that are most like us demographically. This showed a great improvement in our scores.

Dr. Tyrell presented the Student Growth Percentile – SGP

Each student's rate of change in performance is compared to others

- o Median student growth above range ELA grades 4,5, 6, and 7
- o Median in growth range ELA grades 8 and 10
- o Median student growth above range mathematics grades 6
- o Median in growth range mathematics grades 4, 5, 7, 8 and 10
- o Median student reduction mathematics grades 10

Ms. Judith Kuehn, Assistant Superintendent discussed the response to data.

The Superintendent said that the DESE has levels of accountability ranging from 1 to 5, with 1 being the top level and 5 being at the bottom. The 2016 Accountability Levels for Hull are as follows:

Hull High School – Level 2

Memorial Middle School – Level 2

Jacobs Elementary School – Level 1

Dr. Tyrell congratulated all students, staff and parents for the work that has been done to bring the schools scores up and that everyone should be very proud of themselves.

Advanced Placement Examinations and SAT Scores

Mr. Michael Devine, Hull High School Principal, presented the following information on AP and SAT Exam scores:

- Advanced Placement (AP) exams overview
- Hull High School 2016 AP scores
- Number of Hull High School students taking AP exams (2012-2016) in 2016 = 75
- Percentage of Students Taking at Least one AP Exam (2012-2016) in 2016 = 24%
- Number of AP Exams Taken (2012-2016) in 2016 = 139
- Number of Students Earning a 3 or Better (2012-2016) in 2016 = 49
- Percentage of Students Earning a 3 or Better (2012-2016) in 2016 = 65
- AP Trends continue to increase the number of students enrolled in AP courses, continue to see a rise in AP scores
- Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT) overview
- Mean SAT Scores (2013-2016) in 2016 = critical reading -507, mathematics 513, writing 502
- Mean SAT Scores Comparison (2016) above the national average in all areas
- SAT trends

Mr. Devine responded to School Committee questions and comments. He explained the waiver system that has increased opportunities for students to take AP courses and has not led to lower AP test scores. The Committee thanked Mr. Devine and the staff.

#### 7.1 M.A.S.S. Academic Excellence Awards

Each year the Massachusetts Association of School Superintendents provides an award to a senior from every school district in the Commonwealth. The criteria for the selection of this award include cumulative average, class rank, and leadership. This year Dr. Tyrell presented two awards this year to Richard Barone and Luis Gonzalez. Dr. Tyrell read a long list of both students' accomplishments during their high school years.

School Committee and Superintendent congratulated Richard and Luis.

## 7.2 National School Development Council Award (N.S.D.C.)

Dr. Tyrell asked the two students who received the MASS award to stay at the podium. She presented the *National School Development Council (NSDC) Academic Growth and Student Leadership in Learning (NSDC) Awards* to Richard Barone and Luis Gonzalez.

#### 7.3 National Merit Commended Students

Mr. Michael Devine, Hull High School Principal, presented certificates to three high school seniors named *National Merit Commended Students* by the College Board. This is in recognition of earning scores in the 99<sup>th</sup> percentile of all juniors who took the PSAT in the fall of 2015. The three students receiving the award were Richard Barone, Aiden Leahy and James Rosado. Mr. Devine added that because this is national it is amazing to have three students in a school the size of Hull.

Mr. Devine also presented the *National Academy of Future Scientists and Technologists Award of Excellence* to Richard Barone.

## 7.4 Hull High School AP Scholars

Mr. Michael Devine, Hull High School Principal, presented a certificate of achievement to eleven (17) Hull High School students. The College Board has named the following students AP Scholars in recognition of the scores they earned on the 2016 Advanced Placement examinations:

Granted to students who receive scores of 3 or higher on three or more AP Exams.

School Committee and Superintendent congratulated students, teachers and parents. Dr. Tyrell said that the whole school community and town should take pride in what is happening in the Hull Public Schools.

#### 7.7 FY16 Year End Actuals

Mr. David DeGennaro, School Business Manager, said that we were fortunate to have some late retirements that let us pay for unexpected special education costs and the lunch program overage. He stated that the closing went very smoothly, which he accredited to central office staff. He commented that Hull has a lean budget with no extras in it. Mr. Twombly agreed then shared his concerns that the rising out-of-district tuitions will be unsustainable. Ms. Peters added that out-of-district tuitions are an ongoing conversation at Budget Subcommittee meetings. Mr. Hipp thanked Mr. DeGennaro and Dr. Tyrell for getting the actual to the Committee early. He said he is grateful that we have the actual hard numbers itemized so if anyone has questions we have the information.

#### 9.0 Old Business Items

## 9.1 Sub-Committees

Mr. Hipp stated that he is the Hull School Committee member appointed to the South Shore Vocational Technical School (SSVT) Subcommittee, which held their preliminary meeting on September 19, 2016. On September 20, 2016 the committee met at SSVT and had a tour of the school. The Committee was put together to decide if whether or not to join SSVT or not. Mr. Hipp said Dr. Hickey, SSVT Superintendent, told Committee that the way enrollment works now is member towns students who have scores above 60 (this includes several criteria including grades, standardized test scores, etc.) will be accepted first, then non-member students who score above 60. No one that scores under 60 is admitted. He stated that this year there are 160 incoming freshmen. Ms. Hipp stated that the price to become a member town would be approximately \$34,000 but if a non-resident student was to be accepted into the school the cost would be just under \$17,000 including transportation. Mr. Hipp added that if we were a member town we would also have to pay for any repairs or other expenses. He added that there is a lot to look at when making the decision of whether to become a member or not. Mr. Hipp informed the School Committee that he thinks it is unfortunate that the SSVT Committee scheduled the next meeting for this exact time with the full knowledge that we had a School Committee meeting. He added that it is quite concerning since the votech budget is part of the school budget, not the entire town budget. Committee members had questions and concerns regarding the SSVT membership. The Superintendent said this is the beginning of the process that could take a few years to hash out and Mr. Hipp added that he would keep this board updated as new information comes out.

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Ms. Peters informed the Committee of the Capital Outlay Committee meeting to be held, tomorrow night, October 18, 2016 at Town Hall.

Ms. Peters and Ms. Fleming will be scheduling the first meeting of the Community Outreach Subcommittee.
