SUPERVISORS of the CHECKLIST

The Lee Supervisors of the Checklist will meet in public session on Saturday, March 2, 2019 at the Lee Public Library, 9 Mast Road, from 11-11:30am. This will be the last day to accept voter registration applications. No additions or corrections shall be made to the checklist after this session until town Election Day, March 12. Prospective voters are required by law to show proof of identity, age, U.S. citizenship, and domicile in Lee. A driver's license, passport, birth certificate, or mail are all useful things to bring as proofs of these requirements. Voter registration applications are also accepted at the town clerk's office during regular business hours up to and including March 1, 2019.

The scheduling and use of those rooms is determined according to the Meeting Room Policy, which includes an application for using the rooms.

Municipal Composting in NH *by Dean Rubine*



Greetings from the LSC! This week we're talking about ways to not throw food waste in the municipal solid waste bin. We estimate a quarter to half of our landfilled trash is food. It stinks up the trash, it costs Lee taxpayers \$80 a ton to discard, and it emits methane, a potent greenhouse gas.

We've already written about the best way to discard food waste: composting at home. After finding a space and getting a compost bin, you can throw most of your food waste in the bin, mix in some brown carbon like leaves, turn occasionally and nature does the rest. When the compost is cooked, you can use it in your garden, give it away or chuck it in the woods.

For a variety of reasons some folks can't compost at home, so we naturally wonder why we can't do municipal scale composting at the transfer station. In fact we already collect and compost yard and farm waste at the transfer station, but NH regulations regarding meat and dairy disposal prevent residential food waste being added. We're behind some other states. MA banned commercial organic waste from landfills in 2014. VT passed a law in 2012 that phases out all food waste from landfills by 2020. Local municipalities have gone even further.

Our local history is at the center of the issue. In 2006 UNH began composting large amounts of food waste at Kingman Farm in Madbury. In 2011, the meat and dairy regulations were enforced and Kingman Farm stopped giving away compost. In 2014 our own Senator Martha Fuller Clark sponsored a bill to update the regulations to allow community scale composting of food waste, including meat and dairy. It passed and went into effect in 2015, but we're still waiting for the NH DES to issue the rules. Expect sites to appear in a couple of years.

If you can't compost at home, there are companies which will collect your compost at a cost more than it costs Lee to landfill and truck it out of state. Oyster River School District is a customer.

The best way to keep food out of the waste stream is not waste it at all, but that's another article.

REMEMBER THAT LEE HAS A SNOW CASTING ORDINANCE!

This means that you cannot throw, "cast," place or deposit snow or ice onto any plowed street or public way. [CLICK HERE](#) to read more. The fine for this violation can be up to \$100.00. The Lee Police will also be strictly enforcing RSA 265:79-b Negligent Driving or otherwise known as "Jessica's Law" for drivers who do not clear the snow off of their vehicles. The fines are \$250-\$500 for the first offense and \$500-\$1000 for subsequent offenses.

Please be sure that no vehicles are parked on a roadway during snow removal OR during a storm.

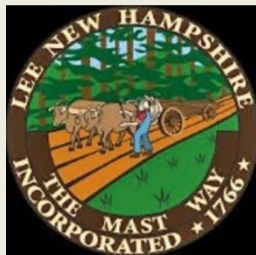

NH State Historic Register Plaques

In 2018 the Lee Heritage Commission successfully worked to add several buildings on the town-owned land next door to the old Parish House to the State Register of Historic Places, including the 1846 Town Hall, 1915 Town Tool Shed with Tramp Room, and 1874 Lee Historical Society building (former South Lee Freight House). Also on site is the former 1897 Center School which is part of the Lee Library building. Clearly, the idea of preserving town buildings, while re-developing an identifiable “Town Center” is a goal that has been shared by many Lee residents for quite a few years now. In order to help Lee residents and visitors identify these historic buildings, the Lee Heritage Commission has recently designed historic markers to place on buildings in town that have been placed on the NH States Register of Historic Places, both those owned by the Town and those that are privately owned. The plaques will be placed on these buildings in the spring.

TIMELY TOPICS FOR WINTER

- If you burn wood in your home, have chimneys inspected and cleaned yearly to prevent chimney fires. When burning wood do not burn wood that is green or unseasoned. [CLICK HERE](#) for more Heating Safety Tips

- Clear snow from all outside vents and gas meters.

WHEN SECONDS COUNT...

Can the Police, Fire, or Ambulance find your home when you need them for assistance with an emergency? Can they find it at night? Can they find it during a snowstorm?

Having your name and number on a mailbox is just not enough. Some mailboxes are clustered together. The numbers are small and the location may not mark the entrance to your driveway.

The Lee Firemen's Association, in a joint effort with the Lee Fire Department, has started a program to install reflective house number signs at driveway entrances to assist all emergency responders in locating your home in a time of need. The cost for each sign with a post is \$30.00 and it will be installed by the Lee Firemen's Association.

POLICE NOTICE

SCAM! SCAM! SCAM!

Please do not become a victim. WHEN IN DOUBT, DON'T GIVE IT OUT.

An old scam has resurfaced. Residents are being contacted by "Publisher's Clearing House" about having won the jackpot. The stipulation is that the resident must pay \$7,500 in advance. This is a scam. You will never have to pre-pay the "FDIC" for your winnings.

IMPERSONATION OF A SOCIAL SECURITY ADMINISTRATION EMPLOYEE

We sometimes receive reports where individuals have been contacted by someone pretending to be an SSA employee. The intent of this type of call is to steal your identity and/or money from your bank accounts. The caller generally asks you for personal information such as your Social Security number, date of birth, your mother's maiden name, or your bank or financial account information. The impersonator may state that "the SSA computers are down" or may refer to enrollment in the Medicare prescription drug program. It is possible that an SSA employee may contact you to follow-up on a previous application for SSA/Medicare Part D benefits or to follow-up on other business you initiated with SSA. If you are unsure as to the authenticity of someone who claims to be an SSA employee, please call SSA's toll-free number, 1-800-772-1213, to verify the reason for the contact and the person's identity prior to providing any information to the caller.

If you wish to report a call from someone you suspect is impersonating an SSA employee, please provide us with the following details:

Caller's alleged name, telephone number, time and date the call was made, information requested by the caller and any other identifying information or details about the content of the call. Please note that there are also "robocalls" from people claiming to be from the Social Security Administration.

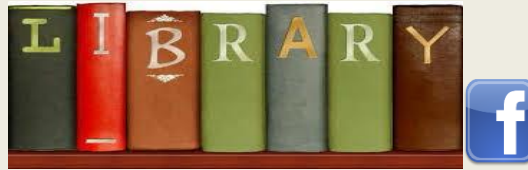
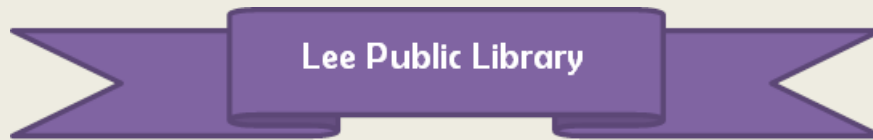

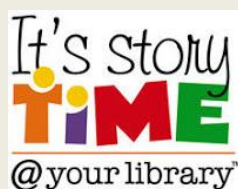

Oyster River Cooperative School Board News

Voters at the February 5th Deliberative Session unanimously endorsed the proposed 2019-2020 budget. It totals \$47.5 million and represents a net increase of about 3.5%.

The main drivers increasing the budget this year are:

- Salary increases (mostly required by agreements with unions)
- \$755,000 to improve safety at Moharimet (after a major safety improvement at Mast Way last year)
- \$800,000 to develop detailed designs, plans and costs for a proposed new middle school building—in preparation for a March 2020 vote.
- Two new positions, one in elementary special education and the other in high school counseling.

The Moharimet safety project received a \$100,000 state matching grant.

Final action on the budget will come on March 12th when district voters will vote in their town polling locations. There will also be an election of two at-large Board seats.
