


The answer to last week's trivia question: Lee's "Malfunction Junction" is the intersection of the Cartland, Lee Hill, and Thompson Mill roads. The "Word Sense" online dictionary defines "Malfunction Junction" as meaning "a traffic jam or any location noted for such congestion". They also point out that the phrase originated from the 1973 Schoolhouse Rock! segment, "Conjunction Junction", so this is a relatively contemporary name for that intersection of three roads in Lee that must have — at some point in the past — been a hopping busy place!

Several online resources point out that several places in the United States — usually at the intersections of some major highways — that have also earned the nickname "Malfunction Junction".

Powder Major Farm and Forest Successfully Protected

Working with the towns of Madbury, Durham and Lee, along with hundreds of volunteers and donors, the Society for the Protection of NH Forests (Forest Society) bought a 192-acre property at the juncture of the three towns on February 20th to create the Powder Major's Farm and Forest, a recreation and conservation area that protects both natural and historical resources.

The Forest Society will manage the Powder Major's Farm and Forest as a community resource, with an extensive trail system -- open to the public for recreation -- and frontage on the Oyster River that will preserve drinking water quality and the highest quality wildlife habitat of its kind in the state. 
