

Answer to last week's Trivia Question: As near as we can tell, the first automobile owner in Lee – mentioned in *The Newmarket Advertiser* – was Guy Glidden of the Wadleigh Falls neighborhood in Lee, who bought a Stanley automobile (also known as a "Stanley Steamer". (With thanks to Ruth Eifert for suggesting piece of Lee history for our trivia questions!)



Guy Ghdden has taken the initiative in town, having been to the Hub, and invested in a natty automobile of the Stanley pattern



While we can't be sure exactly which model Stanley it was that Guy Glidden purchased in 1904, this is a photo of a 1904 Stanley Steamer. Stanley automobiles were driven by steam, rather than by using an internal combustion engine. The vehicles were light weight and fast. For example, "On August 31, 1899, Freelan O. Stanley and his wife Flora drove their Stanley-designed Loco mobile #93 up the 7.6 mile, 4,725 foot vertical rise, Mount Washington carriage road in two hours and 10 minutes (including a stop to take on water), far less than the usual six hours it too to climb the mountain in a horse drawn stage!"



# Welcome to Downstream! Your Estuaries Partnership News for March 2018

Nor'easter Season. There's no mistaking that it is still winter, despite some strangely beautiful, warm days back in February. And our coastal communities have been feeling the brunt of the strong winter weather. During Nor'easter Riley Hampton, NH saw a 10.3 ft. high tide with 1.8 ft. storm surge. Waves crested seawalls, seaweed littered Route 1A, and the Seacoast saw multiple road closures. Then, to add insult to injury, Nor'easter Quinn hit our region last night and it continues to all snow. Hoping everyone stays safe if you have travel at today.

At PREP this month, we are gearing up for some new initiatives including partnering with the <a href="Trash Free Waters Program">Trash Free Waters Program</a> at US Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) and <a href="Stormwater Funding Roundtables">Stormwater Funding Roundtables</a> with the <a href="EPA Office of Research and Development">EPA Office of Research and Development</a> and the <a href="Consensus Building Institute">Consensus Building Institute</a>. You can learn more about our first meeting for Trash Free Waters - Piscataqua in the Feature Story below. Earlier this week we also gathered with our partners from the <a href="Salmon Falls Watershed Collaborative">Salmon Falls Watershed Collaborative</a> to look back on successes from the last year - including a new property (<a href="Gauthier's Farm">Gauthier's Farm</a>) conserved by the <a href="Southeast Land Trust">Southeast Land Trust</a> with 1.4 miles of frontage on the Salmon Falls River in Rochester, NH. Although the snow is still falling, spring truly is just around the corner and planning for the 2018 field season has begun. Here's to counting down the days until spring, and the promise of nice, and warmer weather this weekend.
