RESULTS OF RECOUNT FOR SELECTMAN'S RACE FINAL!

On Monday March 19th, the Board of Recount, which consists of the Moderator, Town Clerk and the Board of Selectmen held a recount of the votes cast in the recent race for the open Selectman's position. Although the results were very close, David Cedarholm was the winner, with a total of 223 votes; Carol Dennis received 219 and Benjamin Genes had 136.

Mr. Cedarholm has accepted the position of Selectman and is expected to be sworn in by the Town Clerk on Monday. He will join Chairman LaCourse and Selectman Griswold at the upcoming Selectmen's meeting on Monday, March 26th at the Public Safety Complex.

Join the Lee Conservation Commission's 2nd Annual FROG WALK in the Lee Town Forest

They're Back! Just in time for the first week of spring, the wood frogs are out and quacking. Having spent the



winter under leaf litter in the forests where they live, these small, cryptically marked, terrestrial frogs have emerged from hibernation and are making their way to vernal pools to breed.

The only North American amphibian able to live above the Arctic Circle, the wood frog has mastered cryogenics - that is, it is able to withstand the freezing of 45-60% of its body during hibernation. During the winter each frog becomes, in effect, a frog-cicle, lying quiescent, without respiration or heartbeat, until spring. Once the weather warms enough for them to thaw, they begin migrating to the pools where they were born. Their breeding season is brief - usually little more than a week -

during which they lay their eggs in vernal pools and then return to the woods. As usual, these little creatures are wasting no time - some have already laid eggs.

Anyone interested in learning more about these remarkable creatures and observing them in their breeding pools is invited to participate in the 2nd annual Frog Walk in the Town Forest. Sponsored by the Lee Conservation Commission, two walks are scheduled for this weekend: Saturday, March 24 at 9 a.m. and Sunday, March 25 at 9:00 a.m. (rain date, Monday, March 26 at 6:00 p.m.). All ages welcome. We will meet behind the library. Long sleeves and long pants are strongly advised.

From the LEE FIRE & RESCUE DEPARTMENT Burn Permits

Per RSA 227-L:17, the State of New Hampshire requires that anyone who wishes to burn clean, ordinary combustibles such as leaves, brush or untreated lumber, or have a camp or cooking fire to have written permission from the landowner and a written fire permit from the local forest fire warden or local fire department in the town or city where the fire will be kindled. This includes backyard fire pits or chimeneas.

Pearl Harbor, A First Person's Account. Harold Ward's Extraordinary Perspective on World War II

Even before he settled in Lee, NH as a young man in the late 50's with his wife Virginia, Harold Ward had witnessed some of the 20th Century's most dramatic events. Harold grew up in Harlem during the great depression. Before World War II, he enlisted in what was still a segregated and racist US Navy, and served as a mess assistant on the USS San Francisco. On December 7, 1941 his ship was docked in Pearl Harbor awaiting overhaul. His battle station as a lookout gave him a front row view of the surprise Japanese attack.
