

In vernal pools throughout Lee, wood frogs are out and quacking. Having spent the winter under leaf litter in the forests where they live, these small, cryptically marked, terrestrial frogs have emerged from hibernation and are making their way to vernal pools to breed. The only North American amphibian able to live above the Arctic Circle, the wood frog has mastered cryogenics - that is, it is able to withstand the freezing of 45-60% of its body during hibernation. During the winter each frog becomes, in effect, a frogcicle, lying quiescent, without respiration or heartbeat, until spring. With the return of warm temperatures, the frogs thaw and soon after begin migrating to the pools where they were born. Their breeding season is brief - usually little more than a week - during which they find a mate and lay eggs before returning to their woodland habitats. AN EVENING OF COURTING WOODCOCKS

Saturday, April 25th 7:30 pm Littlle River Park

It's an early and spectacular sign of spring, but one that many folks never see. Currently, in brushy, undeveloped clearings, power line right-of-ways, old wood roads and other wild places where there is a gap in the forest canopy, woodcocks are engaged in fabulous courtship displays. The performance begins after sunset when the male woodcock stakes out a singing ground and begins wooing females with a nasal, buzzy, love song known as "peenting". Peenting is followed by a sky dance: wings whistling, the woodcock spirals high into the twilit sky, climbing up to 350 feet. A sharp, zig zagging descent, accompanied by a musical chirping, is the displaying woodcock's grande finale. He may repeat this ritual several times until all traces of sunlight have left the sky. The entire show may last no more than fifteen minutes or so.

Please join us at Little River Park to watch this unique rite of spring. Participants should dress for the weather and be prepared to stand, as the ground is likely to be too damp for sitting. There is a short, easy walk across a playing field to the viewing area. All ages are welcome, but children must be able to stand quietly while the woodcocks are displaying as noises and moving around can disrupt the birds.

OLIVER CROMWELL GILBERT

This is the true story of an escaped slave, who came from Maryland and while on his journey through the Underground Railroad, spent some time in Lee. Oliver Gilbert had an interesting life and was proud of his accomplishments. His great-great-grand daughter says that "he would be dancing now" with the publication of his story. Jody Fernald, a researcher at the UNH Library, with the assistance of Oliver's great-great-granddaughter, Stephanie Gilbert, has written the known details of Oliver's life. Oliver Gilbert's story has made it possible for the Cartland House in Lee to be the only documented "station" on the Underground Railroad in New Hampshire.

This book is published by the Lee Heritage Commission and is on sale now at Town Hall and Library for \$10.

TROUBLESHOOTING EMAIL FILTERS

If your emails to receive the E-CRIER have repeatedly ended up in your spam folder then your internet provider may have stopped those emails from coming into your spam folder all together. You will need to sign up again and indicate that this is not spam.

If this is not the case, then your provider is blocking these emails and you will need to call them and ask for a 'whitelist'. This will essentially turn off their filter so you can receive these emails.
