

FROM THE CONSERVATION COMMISSION Frog Walk, Saturday, April 19<sup>th</sup> 9:00 am



After a long, snowy and difficult winter, signs of spring are beginning to appear. Robins, red winged blackbirds and phoebes have returned; various snake species are emerging from their hibernacula; and any day now the quacking of wood frogs will fill the forests where their breeding pools are found. Having spent the winter under leaf litter in the forests where they live, these small, cryptically marked, terrestrial frogs emerge from hibernation very early in the spring and make their way to vernal pools to breed. Their breeding season is brief - only a few weeks in which to mate, lay eggs and return to the woods. Wood frogs may not sport the brilliant colors of tropical frogs, but they are every bit as remarkable. The only North American amphibian able to live above the Arctic Circle, the wood frog has mastered cryogenics - that is, they are able to withstand the freezing of up to 45% of its body during hibernation. During the winter each frog becomes, in effect, a frogcicle, lying quiescent, without respiration or heartbeat, until spring.

Anyone interested in learning more about these remarkable creatures and observing them in their breeding pools is invited to participate in a Frog Walk in the Town Forest sponsored by the Lee Conservation Commission. We will meet beside the Library. **All ages welcome.** Rain date, Sunday, April 20<sup>th</sup>, 9:00 am.



#### AN EVENING OF COURTING WOODCOCKS Friday, April 25<sup>th</sup> 7:30 am Little River Park

It's an early and spectacular sign of spring, but one that many folks never see. Currently, in brushy, undeveloped clearings, power line right-of-ways, old wood roads, and other wild places where there is a gap in the forest canopy, woodcocks are engaged in fabulous courtship displays. Their performances begin after sunset, when male woodcocks stake out a singing ground and begin wooing females with the nasal, buzzy calls known as "peenting." Peenting is followed by the sky dance - a wonderful, spiraling flight during which woodcock's wings twitter, culminating in a fluttering, zig-zagging descent. The ritual is repeated again and again until all traces of sunlight have left the sky. The entire show may last no more than fifteen minutes or so.

Please join us at Little River Park to watch this unique rite of spring. Participants should dress for the weather and be prepared to stand, as the ground is likely to be too damp for sitting. There is a short, easy walk - across a playing field - to the viewing area. All ages are welcome, but children must be able to stand quietly while the woodcocks are displaying as noises and moving around can disrupt the birds.

In September of 2012 the Town of Lee adopted an ordinance, <u>Enhanced 911 Emergency Response Ordinance</u>. This ordinance outlines how to properly place numbers on your property. This policy coincides with the renumbering and renaming of some roads in town that was completed to better assist emergency personnel to locate the homes of the residents of Lee. # FROM THE CONSERVATION COMMISSION EMERALD ASH BORER ALERT

An invasive insect, the emerald ash borer (EAB), is a bright, metallicgreen beetle native to Asia and Russia. Likely introduced in shipping crates with ash supports, its first reported North American sighting was in Michigan in 2002. Since then, the larvae of this beetle have destroyed tens of millions of ash trees in the forests and neighborhoods of twenty-one states.

With recent reports of EAB in Canterbury, NH, as well as sightings in Concord, NH and Andover, MA, the chances of an infestation in Lee are quite likely. March is a good time of year to look for ash tree "blonding" caused by intense woodpecker activity as these birds search for EAB borers.

#### LIBRARY TRUSTEES' CORNER

Why is the new Library Community Center 12,500 square feet? Isn't that more than our town needs?

The size of the proposed library community center was determined through the use of several public library planning guides, including the 2006 report prepared by library building consultant Patience Jackson (available at the Lee Library) and what is commonly called The Wisconsin Study. This 2009 study recommends that library planning should be done for current and future (20 years is recommended) needs. The existing Lee Public Library building is 3,200 square feet, far below all national guidelines. Components of modern libraries include collection space, reader seating space, public access computer stations, meeting room and program space, small group study areas, children and teen areas and staff work space. Based on these needs and the current size of the collection, the recommended size for the new facility is 12,700 square feet for a town with Lee's characteristics. The floor plan of the new Lee Public Library Community Center includes community space that can be used even when the library itself is closed. Architectural standards for accessibility in new construction, contained in Title III ADA (Americans with Disability Act 1990) Accessibility Guidelines are also followed. Our current library building has been out of compliance for almost a quarter century! There is no logic in spending money to build a facility that Lee will have outgrown before it's even built. We need to have the foresight to envision and meet Lee's needs well beyond its 250<sup>th</sup> anniversary in 2016.



## BITS of HISTORY from The NEWMARKET ADVERTISER

#### April 15, 1904

During the past week the frogs have been celebrating their release from their long captivity, right merrily.

#### April 22, 1904

It was quite a surprise, Saturday morning, to find the earth covered with six inches of snow, after the roads had become dry, and some of our more enterprising farmers had commenced to plough and others were contemplating a speedy beginning. The RFD came in a sleigh Saturday and one sleigh was seen at church Sunday; we fear it run hard on its return, as the snow disappeared quickly leaving the roads quite muddy, although now (Tuesday) they are none the worse for the snowfall.
