**Watch Courting Woodcocks on Earth Day
at the Joe Ford Wildlife Sanctuary
Friday, April 22nd 7:00 PM – Earth Day
Saturday, April 23rd 7:00 PM**

What better way to celebrate Earth Day and springtime than an evening spent viewing sky dancing woodcock at the beautiful Joe Ford Wildlife Sanctuary. With moonrise occurring at 8:05, we'll be able to enjoy a view of the sanctuary bathed in the ethereal light of the full, Sprouting Grass Moon, whose bright light may entice the woodcock to extend their spectacular courtship performance well past twilight time.

We'll also keep an ear out for barred owl duets, the gorgeous song of the hermit thrush and cardinal pairs calling to each other as color drains from the world.

Join us for an evening at the Joe Ford Preserve on Garrity Road and experience some of the sights and sounds of early spring. The viewing area is a short walk along the field edge, which is somewhat rough and mounded; sturdy shoes are suggested. Spring evenings can still be quite cool, so check the forecast, and dress accordingly. Feel free to bring a folding chair and binoculars if you have them. This event is sponsored by the Lee Conservation Commission. All ages are very welcome, but children must be able to stand or sit quietly as noises and sudden motion may disrupt the woodcock and other critters. Joe Ford Wildlife Sanctuary is located about 1/2 mile on the right from Mast Road. The entrance is through a white board fence. There will be an event sign posted. Parking permitted along roadside.

LEE POLICE DEPARTMENT NOTICE

The PD has been experiencing issues with houses not being properly numbered when responding to calls. This is a serious issue for First Responders and victims who need our help and we cannot locate a residence. In 2012 the Board of Selectmen adopted the "Enhanced 911 Emergency Response Ordinance" which reads in part: "Any building or structure for which a number has been assigned, shall have the number affixed to a post, or equivalent, a minimum (3') high next to the driveway leading to the house so that the number is visible from both directions. The alphabet shall not be used to represent the number in word form; all numbers shall be represented using block figures." The penalty after being issued a warning letter is \$10.00 per day for each day of non-compliance. We are asking that residents of Lee comply with this ordinance. We will be issuing warning letters and fines if needed in an attempt to get this issue taken care of. The Fire Association can provide the proper signage for \$25.00 or materials can be found at your local hardware store.

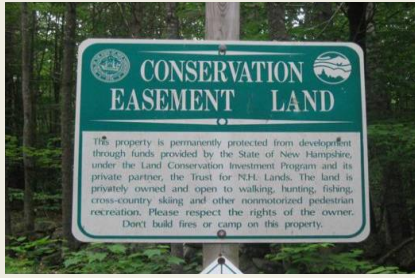

The Past in Postcards *Cardboard Clues to History*

- Postcards are labeled. Often the publisher prints a picture title, or the sender explains what's in the picture.
- Postcards are dated. Postmarks tell us when a postcard was mailed, if not when it was printed.
- Postcards sometimes contain a story; a peek into the life of a town resident or visitor.
- Postcards are collectable. They were printed individually or by the dozens, and are still collected and traded one hundred years later.

This postcard of the Old Union Meeting House in South Lee, NH was published by James B. Walker, but printed by the Frank W. Swallow Postcard Company of Exeter, N.H. The Old Union Meeting House was located near the intersection of Route 152 and Fox Garrison Road in South Lee and served as a common church for the various religious denominations in town. It was originally built in the late 18th century – early 19th century and was renovated in 1891. It seated at least 250 people on its main floor and in its roomy gallery. During the early 1900's the Meeting House was used by different church groups for Sunday morning and afternoon services, while during the week it became a town gathering place for local entertainments and activities. Sadly, however, the building was torn down in 1928 when its usefulness seemed at an end.

Frank Swallow and his "Swallow girls" printed hand-colored postcards in the first half of the 20th century. Swallow claimed to be the "first to introduce the Souvenir Post Card to One-Half of New England" and marked his cards with a picture of a swallow bird. Rather than send his postcards to Germany for color printing, he employed an assembly line of local women to hand-paint the cards with water colors.
