The Lee Historical Society and the Library present YOUR HIT PARADE: 25 YEARS PRESENTING AMERICA'S TOP POPULAR SONGS By CALVIN KNICKERBOCKER Wednesday, May 6th 7:00pm at the Public Safety Complex

During 2009 Calvin Knickerbocker developed this 65 minute presentation. Popular music has evolved over the years. Major shifts seem to occur about every 10 years. "Your Hit Parade" chronicled the changes in popular music from its debut in 1935 to its "death by Rock and Roll" in 1959. This program summarizes the origin of the show, its own evolution over the years, the well-known vocalists who performed its songs and the influence of musical trends which affected it. It covers the effect of the show's sponsor, Lucky Strike cigarettes, whose president monitored and controlled almost every aspect of the show. The show began using unknown and uncredited singers. The rise in popularity of vocalists caused "Your Hit Parade" to schedule famous singers from the late 1930s on. Most important of these was Frank Sinatra, who was a regular during two periods, 1943-1944 and 1947-1948. The era from the early 1940's to the mid-1950s was truly a "Golden Age of Vocalists." Much of this program is devoted to playing excerpts from recordings of songs played on actual broadcasts during the years of "Your Hit Parade" reign.

This program is sponsored by the NH Humanities Council and is free and open to the public. Refreshments will be served at the end of the program.

OLIVER CROMWELL GILBERT

This is the true story of an escaped slave, who came from Maryland and while on his journey through the Underground Railroad, spent some time in Lee. Oliver Gilbert had an interesting life and was proud of his accomplishments. His great-great-grand daughter says that "he would be dancing now" with the publication of his story. Jody Fernald, a researcher at the UNH Library, with the assistance of Oliver's greatgreat-granddaughter, Stephanie Gilbert, has written the known details of Oliver's life. Oliver Gilbert's story has made it possible for the Cartland House in Lee to be the only documented "station" on the Underground Railroad in New Hampshire.

This book is published by the Lee Heritage Commission and is on sale now at Town Hall and Library for \$10.

TROUBLESHOOTING EMAIL FILTERS

If your emails to receive the E-CRIER have repeatedly ended up in your spam folder then your internet provider may have stopped those emails from coming into your spam folder all together. You will need to sign up again and indicate that this is not spam.

If this is not the case, then your provider is blocking these emails and you will need to call them and ask for a 'whitelist'. This will essentially turn off their filter so you can receive these emails.
