#### AN EVENING OF COURTING WOODCOCKS AT LITTLE RIVER PARK Friday, May 12<sup>th</sup> at 7:30 pm

It's an early and spectacular sign of spring but one that many folks never see. Currently in brushy, undeveloped clearings; power line right-of-ways; old wood roads; and other wild places where there is a gap in the forest canopy, woodcocks are performing their unique and spectacular courtship displays. The performance begins after sunset, when the male woodcock stakes out a singing ground and begins wooing females with a nasal, buzzy, love song known as "peenting". Peenting is followed by the sky dance, as, wings whistling, the woodcock spirals high into the twilit sky, climbing up to 350 feet. A sharp, zig-zagging descent, accompanied by musical chirping, is the displaying woodcock's grand finale. He may repeat this ritual several times until all traces of sunlight have left the sky. The entire show may last no more than fifteen minutes or so.

Little River Park has an area with the type of open, shrubby-bordered habitat preferred by courting woodcocks. This area, which was being closed off by pine, cherry, black locust and other trees and shrubs, was recently rehabbed to keep it acceptable to woodcocks; young trees impinging on the clearing were cut and moved.

Please join us to watch the woodcocks perform and to learn more about the birds and their preferred habitat. Participants should dress for the weather. Feel free to bring a folding chair and binoculars. There is a short, easy walk - across a playing field - to the viewing area. All ages are welcome, but children must be able to watch quietly while the woodcocks are displaying as noises and moving around can disrupt the birds. While woodcocks are the main attraction, as daylight fades we have often been treated to barred owl vocalizations and the beautiful good-night songs of hermit thrushes, robins and cardinals.

This event is hosted by the Conservation Commission. Rain date is Saturday, May 13<sup>th</sup> at 7:30 pm.

#### **HIGHWAY UPDATE**


- GMI Asphalt was the low bidder this year at 62.80/ton (down from 64.50/ton last year). Below is a list of roads tentatively scheduled for paving this summer and how long it's been since they were last paved:
  - 1. Thurston Dr, Haley Ct, Margaret Ln, Depot Ln, Piper Ln, Davis Ln, Spencer Ln and Elder Osbourne Rd. All 12 years since last paved.
  - 2. Jenkins Rd, Little Hook Rd, Wiswall Rd and York Ln. 10 years since last paved.
  - 3. Public Safety Complex. 13 years since last paved.
- The beavers are back at it on a regular basis plugging the culvert at Thompson Mill Road and damming up the Gile Road swamp enough so that if left unchecked both roads will flood.
- Urban Tree is tentatively scheduled to cut down hazardous trees/limbs along town roads May 4<sup>th</sup>, 5<sup>th</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup>. The crew will focus on the most threatening trees first.
- The Highway Department has taken over the mowing of the playing fields at Little River Park on a trial basis this year. On another note (with the last field nearing completion), after nine years the major earth moving is finally completed at the park.
- The temporary spring weight restriction on the town roads has been rescinded for this year.

#### THE OPIOID CRISIS IN NH IS STILL GROWING

According to a report from the New Hampshire Drug Monitoring Initiative, statewide deaths due to overdose in 2016 were projected to increase by 7 percent over 2015. Strafford County had the most overdose deaths per capita, with 3.83 per 10,000. Drug-related emergency room visits jumped by 28 percent, while the life-saving drug Narcan was administered nearly 2,800 times last year, a 4 percent increase from 2015. The report had some positive news. The number of people seeking help spiked dramatically, with treatment admissions for heroin and opioid addiction jumping by 28 percent in 2016. While progress might be difficult to see, those on the front lines of the epidemic said they believe the coordinated response has never been better. – Josh EcElveen, Political Director, New Anchor, Reporter for WMUR


