LIBRARY TRUSTEE'S CORNER

I like the library the way it is. Why do we need a large new building?

The existing library building is 3,200 square feet. There simply isn't enough space in our current library to adequately serve the population of Lee. For every new book the library acquires, one has to be weeded out. Our ability to offer programs is hindered by the lack of space. Instead of a Children's Room, we have a "Children's Corner". Instead of a Teen/Young Adult area, we have a Teen bookshelf. The meeting room is in the basement and is only accessible by a steep staircase. The current library has already been expanded twice. Because of its proximity to the bog, there's no room to build yet another addition. The size of the proposed library community center was determined through the use of several public library planning guides, including the 2006 report prepared for Lee by library building consultant Patience Jackson (available at the Lee Library) and what is commonly called The Wisconsin Study. This 2009 study recommends that library planning should be done for current and future (20 years is recommended) needs. There is no logic in spending money to build a facility that Lee will have outgrown before it's even built. We need to have the foresight to envision and meet Lee's needs well beyond its 250th anniversary in 2016.

BITS of HISTORY from The NEWMARKET ADVERTISER 1898

One who likes plants would be agreeably entertained by spending an hour in George Dudley's green house, which contains a wealth of bloom and beauty. His plants are vigorous and healthy, with quite a variety to choose from. Among his geraniums, I saw quite a number of newer strains, with large flowers and fine coloring; but the plant that particularly attracted my attention was the 'blue lily of Japan' with its mammoth flower of pale blue, making it 'a thing of beauty, which is a joy forever.' Mr. Dudley is always courteous and pleasant, seemingly pleased to show visitors his stock, whether they buy or not, so no one need hesitate about taking in the pleasure.
